

She belongs to the Ropner Line and is similar in size and build to other ships of the same tine which have been here this season.

STOCKS SELL IN EAST

So much attention have the B.C. mining stocks attracted of late that a number are now being listed on the Toronto curb market. That is an indication that they are really being considered seriously outside the province. That they will be much more in demand by outsiders soon is pretty safe prophecy. As money is still needed to carry on development work at many of the properties, the interest taken by outsiders in local securities should be a distinct advantage.

ARE PRICES TOO HIGH?

In a letter to the local board of trade read at the meeting Friday the general manager of the Consolidated Mining and Smelting Company mentioned the inflation of mining stocks and suggests that many of them are much over-valued. Doubtless this is true for the poor stocks are boosted up along with those that have merit and the public knows very little about what is being purchased. That is where the gamble in connection with mining stocks comes in.

CAN IT CARRY GRAIN?




