## PREMIER ADVERTISES B. C. IN EAST

### MILD FORM OF INFLUENZA SWEEPS THROUGH COUNTRY

#### King Has Not Occupied Himself With Affairs of State During Past Two Weeks of Long Illness

LONDON, Dec. 18.—The long and patient struggle to save the life of King George witnessed another of its tremulous fluctuations in the last 24 hours, but the latest advices indicated an upward turn again. It is understood from well informed quarters that they regarded the latest bulletin as indicating the slight set-back reported last night to be merely temporary. It was said it represented part of the ebb and flow to be expected.

It is now two weeks since the King has been allowed to occupy himself with the affairs of state. He has not even been allowed to see, as he insisted on doing in the first fortnight of his illness, bulletins which the doctors issued to the public. There have been periods of unconsciousness since operations of last Wednesday, but the patient also has been able to sleep, for the first time in weeks, without sedatives.

The King's physicians issued the following bulletin at 8:10 p.m. today: "The King has passed a quiet day and the progress noted this morning has continued."

It was officially stated at 3 p.m. that the improvement noted in the King's condition in this morning's bulletin has continued.

The Tuesday morning bulletin states as follows:—"In spite of the King having passed a disturbed night there is a slight improvement in both the general and local conditions."

Westminster Man Invents a Machine Said to be Fool Proof and Will Rise Vertically

NEW WESTMINSTER, Dec. 18.—A heliplane, said to combine the principles of the helicopter and aeroplane, which the inventor claims will ascend vertically and is accident proof and will revolutionize aviation, has been invented by John E. Hess, a resident of this city. Patents have been granted in Canada and applied for in every country of the world.

#### Premier Tolmie Tells Toronto People About Rapid Growth in B. C.

TORONTO, Dec. 18.—Premier Tolmie made a plea for a better understanding between the east and west, in addressing the Canadian Club here yesterday. Sketching the growth of British Columbia the premier of the province said that in a decade it had become one of the most important parts of Canada. Forty-six per cent of the fish production of Canada came from British Columbia and more than half of the standing timber in Canada was west of the Rockies, he said. British Columbia manufacturing had increased 300 per cent in the past ten years.

#### Youth Hanged Self in Jail

Arrested After Running Amuck and Shooting Some Pigs Near Princeton

PRINCETON, Dec. 18.—Gordon Rodgers, transient youth, employed for the past seven weeks at Horrocks' ranch here, hanged himself with a piece of wire in the jail here yesterday. Apparently he was insane or crazed by liquor and ran amuck last Friday, killing three pigs with a gun and wounding three others. He forced Horrocks at the point of a gun to drive back to town for a bottle of rum and was arrested in Princeton.

#### SMALLPOX SPREADS IN WESTERN ALASKA

CORDOVA, Alaska, Dec. 18.—Smallpox which had been raging in the towns of Kotzebue and Norton Sound is reported in radio messages from Anvik to be spreading up the Yukon into the interior.

#### POLICE CHIEF FOR VANCOUVER

W. J. Bingham of Calgary, Formerly of London, England, Metropolitan Force, Gets Job

VANCOUVER, Dec. 18.—W. J. Bingham, resident of Calgary, 25 years on the metropolitan police force in London, is appointed chief of the police in Greater Vancouver, succeeding W. H. Long, his duties to commence on January 1. Mayor-Elect Malkin said that Bingham was to take charge with no instructions from the commission other than to enforce the law.

#### LIBERAL ELECTED JOLIETTE, QUEBEC

MONTREAL, Dec. 18.—C. E. Forland, official Liberal candidate, was elected in Joliette constituency yesterday by 2263 votes over Rene Guilbault, Independent Liberal. There was no Conservative candidate.

#### C.P.R. OFFICIAL DIES

MONTREAL, Dec. 18.—Captain J. T. Walsh, for many years manager of the Canadian Pacific Steamships, died today.

#### STARR TOWED INTO SEWARD

SEWARD, Dec. 18.—The Alameda with the Starr in tow arrived yesterday from Dark Island. The passengers had been transferred to the Alameda and suffered no ill effects. The motorship Discovery had also gone to the assistance of the Starr and with the assistance of three gasboats towed the Starr 19 miles offshore to the Alameda. En route to Seward the hawser broke several times in rough weather. The speed of two knots an hour was the only progress made. It is understood that a freighter is leaving Seattle to tow the Starr there and that the San Juan Company is dispatching another boat to replace the Starr.

#### TOLMIE SEES RAIL HEADS IN MONTREAL

MONTREAL, Dec. 18.—Hon. Dr. S. F. Tolmie, premier of British Columbia, had an appointment today with E. W. Beatty, K.C., president of the Canadian Pacific Railway. It is understood he will also see Sir Henry Thornton, president of the C. N. R.

#### NO TROUBLE

LONDON, Dec. 18.—The Afghan legation stated today that it had received advice from Kabul denying reports that King Amanullah and Queen Souriya had taken refuge in a fort after the army had revolted. The legation declared that the King and Queen are residing at the palace as usual and that no revolt took place in the army.

#### Almost Half Million Cases of Flu in Number of States and Death Rate Slightly on Increase

Hospitals Closed to Visitors and School Population Windies Considerably

TORONTO, Dec. 18.—Four deaths over the week-end constituted the influenza toll of this city and all hospitals are closed to visitors, also many private schools. It is estimated that 10 per cent of the children of local public schools and ten per cent of the teaching staff are absent through illness. Many working men in business houses and factories are confined to homes. Fifty-seven members of the police force of the city are laid up. Thirty patients were treated in the Toronto jail hospital.

A public school at Brampton closed yesterday with thirty per cent of 700 pupils and five teachers absent.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18.—Public health officials today estimated that 403,000 new cases of influenza had developed in 20 states and New York City last week.

#### HAMPERS FOR CHRISTMAS

These hampers are not sent out indiscriminately, but investigation is made of the actual need. It is found that often those needing more are the ones least inclined to say anything about it. Part of the Christmas dinner fund will be used for these hampers. Receipts so far have just about reached the hundred dollar mark, but a good deal more is necessary to make proper provision for the occasion.

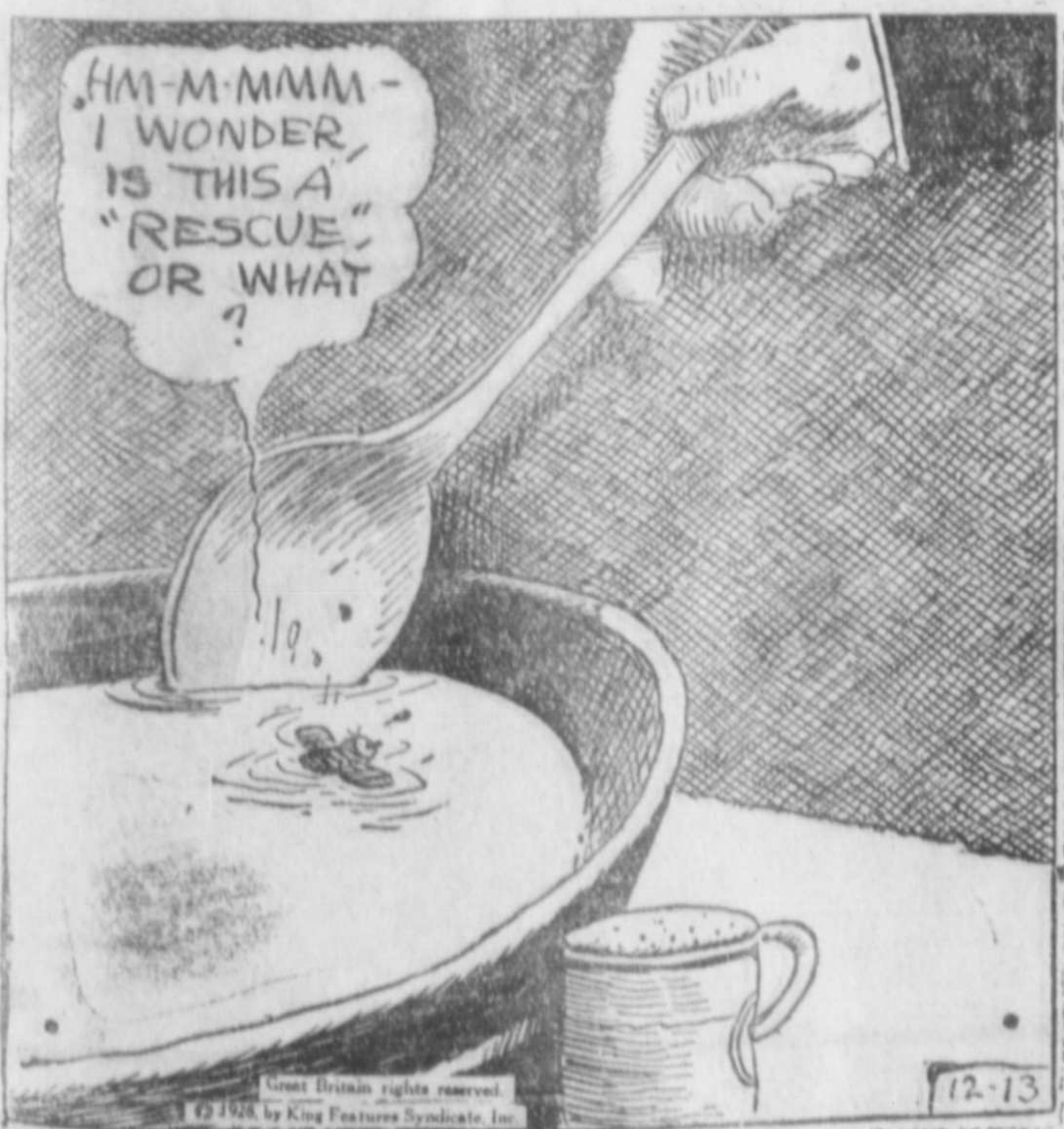

#### CONDITION OF THE KING

Canadians will all be glad to know that King George is improving and is now likely to recover. Since Canada has become a nation with independent status within the Empire advising the King direct in regard to Canadian affairs instead of through the British cabinet, a greater interest has been taken in His Majesty and in affairs of state. He is King of Canada as well as King of Great Britain and Ireland, and as such we naturally are keenly interested in all that pertains to him. We hope he will fully recover and will long continue to carry on his duties in the constitutional and satisfactory manner in which he has always done so.

#### FORMING OPINIONS

The Daily News is constantly being asked for advice in regard to the big problem now before the ratepayers of the city, that of choosing which big company shall control the power franchise for the next 25 years in Prince Rupert. It does not seem that it would be wise for us to do so, because we know no more about it than does the average man on the street. We believe the franchise should be sold, but it is absolutely for the people to decide to which concern. When they have chosen we shall be prepared to advocate the passing of the bylaw which will follow.

The companies concerned are putting up their own arguments, presumably the same arguments that were presented to members of the city council. These should be read carefully and all should vote on Thursday.

#### PEACE RIVER LANDS

Premier Tolmie is following in the footsteps of his predecessors and is pressing the claims of British Columbia at Ottawa. Already the former provincial government had secured a promise from the Dominion government that the Peace River block and the B. C. railway lands would be transferred to B. C. This promise is now to be implemented and Dr. Tolmie is to be congratulated on having been able to induce the government to carry out its policy in spite of the change of government in this province. Once the province has those lands it can negotiate in connection with the P. G. E. if it wishes to do so.

agreement between the deputy and the minister of agriculture over the administration of the department.

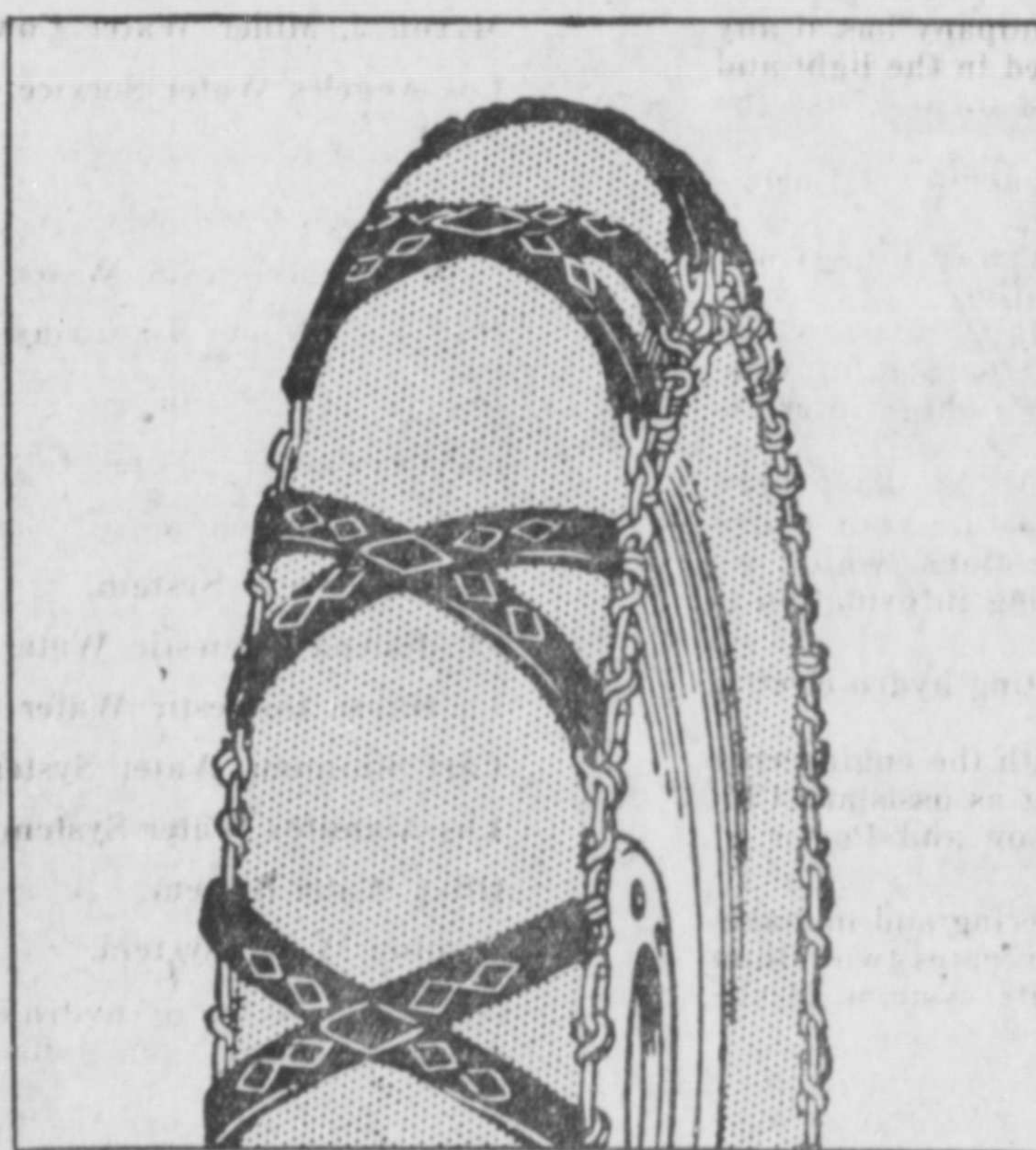
#### DUE TOMORROW

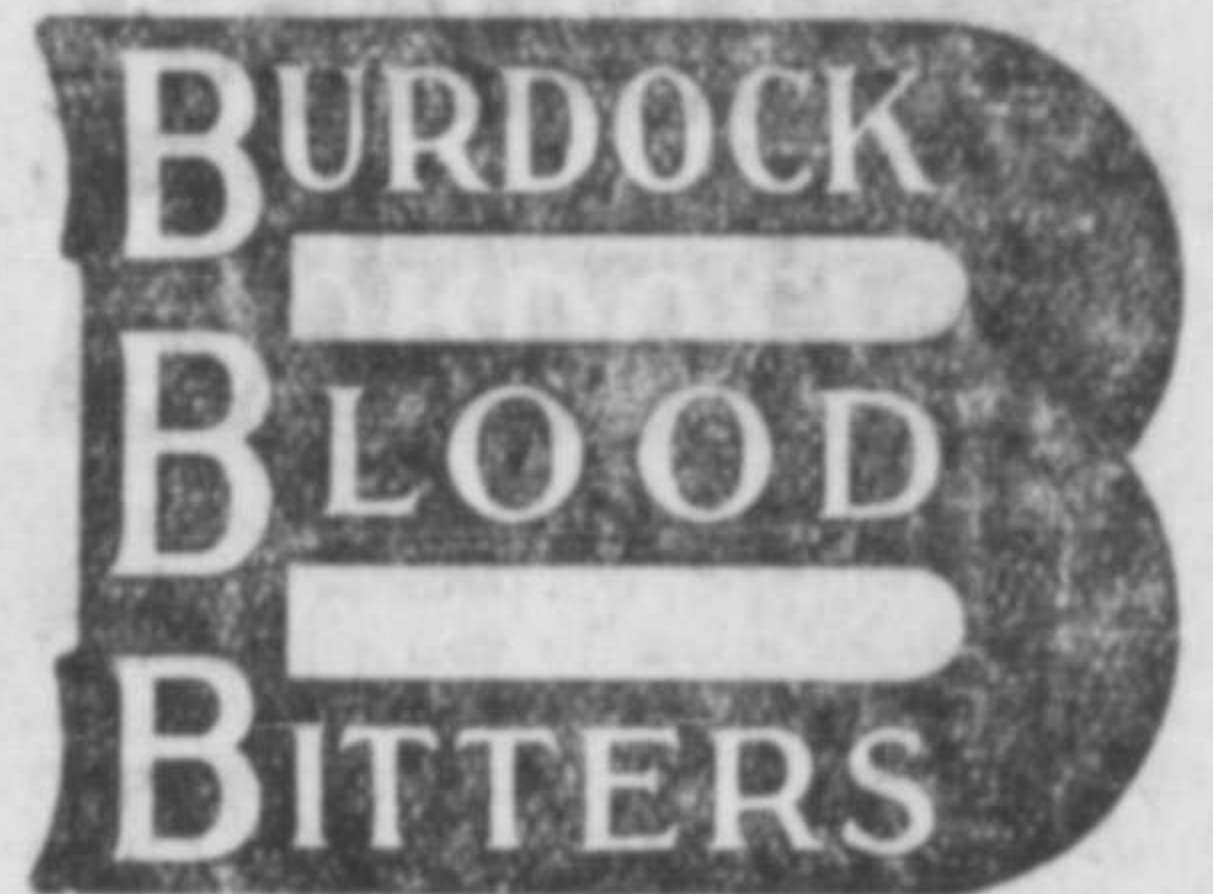
