





# MY KITCHEN NOTEBOOK

### How Much We've Learned About the Feeding of Babies

by mary Blake

When I hear the young mothers of today discussing carrots and spinach and orange juice and cereal, I wonder how any of us of an older generation ever managed to live through our first two or three years, without the elaborate feeding programs which exist

But much as these wise young mothers know that is new in the feeding of babies, there is one basic fact that doesn't change. For the haby just starting out in life, Nature has provided the perfect food in mother's milk. The breast-fed baby has a better chance from the start than the artificially-fed baby, and avoids the experiments that are necessary and the set-backs that so often occur in finding the best substitute for mother's milk
