Airplane Crashed Near Butedale and Mechanic Partridge Dies Result of Injuries Received When on Way Here

The Boeing airplane under charter to the Department of Fisheries met with an accident near Butedale yesterday as a result of which the mechanic W. G. Patridge is dead and Pilot Luke is in the hospital here, although not seriously injured.

It seems that the plane was flying low near Butedale in the course of its fisheries patrol duties when it suddenly took a nose dive and struck the water and was badly wrecked. A boat operated by William Swanson happened to be nearby and at once went to the rescue. The two injured men were extricated and taken to Butedale where first aid was administered and then they were sent to the hospital here, Partridge dying while on the way.

The accident occurred two miles south of Butedale. The fishing boat bringing the dead man and the injured pilot arrived at 2.30 this morning.

Partridge suggered a broken back as well as having both legs fractured. He is survived by a widow in Vancouver and the remains are in the hands of the B.C. Undertakers. Luke suffered injuries to his head and shock. His wife

was at Butedale and came here with him. Partridge's body will be forwarded tonight on the steamer Prince Rupert to Vancouver where interment will take place.

ON THE LAST LAP

With the closing of this week we turn to the final lap of the election race with both candidates still going strong. Judging by the Liberal headquarters talk, the Liberal candidate is about two miles in the lead and judging by the Conservative headquarters opinion their candidate is likely to at least nose in.

Looking at it from a more or less impartial height, we suggest that there will be no change. The people still have confidence in Hon. T. D. Pattullo and seem likely to return him on Wednesday with a pretty substantial majority. This will be a wise thing to do for it is better to have a man on the government side than in opposition.

That the MacLean government will be returned is a forgone conclusion. The people seem to be satisfied with the work they are doing and are ready to continue them in office.

GIVE MACLEAN A CHANCE

The sporting spirit of the electorate is that Premier Mac-Lean, who only recently assumed the reins of office after the death of Premier Oliver, should have a chance to show what he can do. We have known him as finance minister and he has promised exceedingly well. His record is excellent. Now he is being given an opportunity to prove himself at the head of a strong government. To snuff him out just at the opening of his career does not appeal to the sporting instincts of the people of the province.

WELCOME TO DURBAN

The Daily News is pleased to join with the rest of the community in welcoming the officers and crew of the cruiser Durban now in port. The British flag looks good to us all and we should like to see it fly at a permanent naval station here. If that is not possible we hope the ships will visit Prince Rupert as often as possible. The oftener the better.

BIG MISSOURI DEAL

Semi-official announcement that the Big Missouri deal with the Consolidated Mining and Smelting Company will be completed within a few days is good news to the Stewart district in that it indicates there is at least one good mine up the Salmon River in addition to the Premier and that work on it is likely to proceed at once in order to make it a real shipping mine.

The Rufus Argenta deal having fallen through because of unfortunate circumstances, doubtless others will take up the property and make it a success.

Everything points to great development in the Portland Canal district and the policy of the government in helping to build roads and trails is one that will further tend to make the district prosperous.,

DEPUTY MINISTER OF FISHERIES

A deputy minister of fisheries has been appointed at Ottawa distinct from the deputy minister of marine, so that from this time on there will be a distinct department of fisheries. This should tend to lend importance to the industry and should insure greater attention to fishery problems than has been given in the past.

W. A. Found was not wholly a success as director of fisheries but under the present system of promotion in the departments, the logical move was to make him deputy minister. At any rate there is a directorship now open and it is possible a man acceptable to the fishing industry may be appointed to that position.

INCLEMENT WEATHER

While people of this district have not exactly enjoyed the inclement weather of late, it is noticed that we are not alone in having bad rains. Yesterday only one baseball match was played because of the rain. The previous day there was an outdoor boxing match postponed because of rain and for the past week or more there have been intermittent rains in different parts of the continent.
