Stocks Again Moved Upward When General Motors and New York Central Touched New High Loints This Morning

YEW YORK, March 26 .- The upward movement in stocks continued today bringing a great many securities higher than they have ever sold before. General Motors soared \$7.50 a share to a new high price of \$197.50, this representing a gain of more than a billion dollars in the aggregate quoted value of the corporation's outstanding stock in less than four weeks.

Railroad shares, under the leadership of the New York Central which was selling at \$175 for the first time in its history, joined the broad upward movement of all securities.



full information concerning reguations regarding pre-emptions is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, 'How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberfeet per acre west of the Coast Range and 5,000 feet per acre east of that

Applications for pre-emptions are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner.
