**RUN ON BOOKS FOR** THE HOLIDAY SEASON

Circulation High For Month of July Before Closing For Holidays

There was a big demand for holiday books just before the library closed so that patrons would have reading matter to carry them through. Of the 3,-577 books taken out during the month of July 2,415 were fiction, 306 nonfiction, 169 were distributed under the duplicate pay system. The average daily circulation for the month was 170.3. There were 31 new borrowers, 15 cards were cancelled, leaving a list of borrowers numbering 2,-
