## ROYAL MESSAGE CANADIAN PEOPLE GRAIN SHIP LEAVING WITH RECORD CARGO FOR EUROPE

### Queen Mary's Message to People of Canada in Reply to Premier

LONDON, Dec. 26.—Queen Mary sent the following reply to a Christmas greeting sent by Premier Mackenzie King to King George:

"Please be assured that the message of greeting which you so kindly sent, in behalf of the King's government of Canada and people of the Dominion, will be highly appreciated and valued by the King when his progress to recovery has sufficiently advanced for him to receive it personally. Expressions of the love and devotion of the Canadian people, knowledge of their prayers and sympathetic solicitude during the past anxious weeks and messages and the note of joy and thankfulness to God for the hopeful condition of the King touched me profoundly, and on this Xmas morning my children and I thank you from our hearts.

"I look forward to the day when the King will be cheered and strengthened by this testimony that the heart of Canada is with him in weal and woe."

### CUT OFF HEAD OF A WOMAN

Albertan Shoots Man in Leg After the Murder and Then Tells Wife

EDMONTON, Dec. 26.—Between two and three o'clock Christmas morning Harry Ewaschuk, 55 years of age, went to the home of Mrs. John Hyszkus, some six miles from Laford, Alta., shot her in the head twice, in front of her thirteen year old daughter, and then severed the woman's head with a knife and carried it away with him. He next visited John Triska, aged 22, whom he shot in the leg and who is in hospital in a critical condition at St. Paul, suffering from loss of blood.

Ewaschuk then went home, told his wife what he had done and committed suicide. The cause of the slayer's actions is unknown.

### Military Honors to be Emblazoned on Colors of Local Regiments

OTTAWA, Dec. 26.—Following five years of labor for battle honors, the committee of the department of national defence has presented to the government its recommendations for emblazoning on the colors of Canada's militia regiments, honors won by the Canadian corps during the Great War. The recommendations have been endorsed and instructions issued to all military districts to have the commanding officers of the militia regiments submit to the minister of national defence a list of honors they desire to have embroidered on the standard.

Allotment of battle honors to the militia has been a task of great delicacy, but regard has been had to the principle that a regiment should bear on its colors the names of battles in which men from the countryside associated with that regiment fought and bled.

### LONDON KEPT QUIET XMAS

LONDON, Dec. 26.—Mindful of the sick King in Buckingham Palace, London celebrated Christmas in a subdued spirit yesterday, which, though lacking in external gaiety, was, perhaps, no less sincerely happy. Like Queen Mary, many citizens tasted the quiet joy of a united family. Thousands were tempted out by the sunshine and mild temperature.

### REFORM MOVE IN S. ARMY

Salvationists May Depose Bramwell Booth, Head of the Organization, It is Said

NEW YORK, Dec. 26.—The New York Times says Commander Evangeline Booth, chief executive of the Salvation Army in the United States, sailed secretly for England on the Olympic recently on a journey that may end with the removal of her brother, General Bramwell Booth, as international head of the Army, and her election.

A reform element within the Salvation Army, which for eight years has been seeking to persuade General Booth to give up his autocratic rule, says the Times, has caused the calling of the high council of the Army in London on January 8, to decide whether General Booth should be removed on the ground of unfitness to continue his duties.

General Booth is 72 years old and has been in failing health for some years.

Under the constitution of the Army, General Booth is the sole ruler and upon his death can pass the leadership to any one of his choosing by placing the name in a sealed envelope, to be opened after his death.

Bramwell Booth is understood to have enclosed the name of one of his seven children in an envelope. If Bramwell Booth is deposed, the high council will appoint his successor. Commander Booth, says the Times, has not put herself forward for the post, but she will be urged for the place by other American delegates.

Commander Booth sailed under a fictitious name in order to avoid publicity, but the Times says the fact that she sailed was confirmed by George W. Wickersham, attorney for the Salvation Army in the United States.

The meeting of the high council will be the first ever held. It was called as a result of a written demand by seven commissioners as requested by the constitution. All the signers have their headquarters in London. The meeting will be attended by 63 countries and colonies. The council can remove the presiding head by a three-fourths vote and by a two-thirds vote elect a successor.

### Largest Grain Shipment Ever Carried on One Steamship Being Taken by Rossington Court Today

With a cargo of 9930 tons, the largest grain shipment ever dispatched from the port of Prince Rupert, the British steamer Rossington Court, Prince Rupert's fourth grain ship of the season, will sail this evening from the Alberta Wheat Pool's Prince Rupert elevator. The vessel goes from here to Panama, where she will receive orders for the delivery of her cargo to the United Kingdom or continent. Good speed was made in loading the Rossington Court, which has been in port only since last Friday.

With deliveries of grain from the prairies rather slow, the elevator is closed down today for "Boxing Day." No further boats for loading at Prince Rupert were announced up to noon today, although it is expected some will be along soon, the elevator being almost full.

Grain shipments from Prince Rupert this winter continue to be slow. This time last year the eighth ship of the season was loading here.

### KING MAKING SLOW PROGRESS

LONDON, Dec. 26.—It was stated in authoritative circles this morning that there was a slight improvement in the King's condition. He was continuing to make very slow progress, but confidence grew as the King's recovery was assured. Although the path to health might be long and strewn with difficulties, the King as announced to have spent a restful Christmas. Queen Mary and her children paid a brief visit to the sick room.

No newspapers were published Christmas Day or today.

Last night's bulletin on the King reads: "The King passed a quiet day, his local condition is improving and his strength is maintained."

The following official bulletin was issued tonight: "His Majesty had a quiet day, slow progress in general and local condition is maintained. No bulletin will be issued until tomorrow evening."

### PROPER TRIALS MEXICAN COURT

MEXICO CITY, Dec. 26.—Abolition of summary executions has been ordered by the new president. He announced that every person apprehended in open rebellion would be turned over to authorities for formal trial.

### STRUCK STRIKER, UNDER ARREST

DRUMHELLER, Dec. 26.—Gottlieb Raimier, night watchman at the Rosader Mine at Wayne, is under arrest charged with murder, following the death of James Lafferty, one of the strikers of the Wayne Mines. It is alleged that Raimier struck Lafferty with a club. The latter was found dead in bed on Tuesday morning.

### CHRISTMAS AT BETHLEHEM IS WELL OBSERVED

BETHLEHEM, Dec. 26.—Christmas was observed here by a large number of visitors as well as the local inhabitants, who thronged the Church of the Nativity, said to be erected on the spot on which Jesus was born. The watch-night service was the great event, bells pealing and anthems being sung at midnight.

### WILL ROGERS COMMENDS SALVATION ARMY WORK

NEW YORK, Dec. 26.—Will Rogers, the famous American writer and entertainer, stated in his Christmas message that if the people spent as much at Christmas time in Salvation Army work as they did on telegraph tolls the world would be far better than it is.

### TORONTO MAN KILLED WIFE, THEN HIMSELF

TORONTO, Dec. 26.—After apparently having called his three young sons from their sleep, John Williamson, aged 36, shot his wife Marguerite some time during the night and then committed suicide, according to the police reconstruction of the double shooting.

The police were called by John, aged 8, and Alex, aged 6. The third child, five years of age, remained in the house. John said his father first shot his mother through the head, and then through the chest, afterwards turning the gun on himself. No quarrel was heard before the shooting.

A draft of \$12,000 was found on the body of Williamson. His occupation is believed to be that of a dry goods broker.

### U. S. FLEET WILL PAY TEST VISIT SOUTH AMERICA

WASHINGTON, D.C., Dec. 25.—One hundred and twenty-five of the United States biggest war-craft will roll down the west coast of South America to Callao and Valparaiso next February.

The United States fleet, commanded by Admiral H. A. Wiley, is scheduled to sail from Balboa, Canal Zone, after the annual fleet concentration February 21, the plans being dependent upon diplomatic exchanges with the governments over the use of Peruvian and Chilean ports.

As the cruise is a test of the self-sustaining efficiency of the gigantic fleet, submarines and other small and slow speed craft will not make the voyage.

### XMAS DINNER AND HAMPERS

Salvation Army Sent Out Cheer to Eleven Families and Dinner to Number

There were eleven fat hampers sent out by the Salvation Army to families needing help through sickness or other causes. They were delivered by two members of Toc H, who kindly gave their services. They contained a plentiful supply of groceries, meat, toys and books, some of the hampers being good for a whole week's supply.

The number at dinner was not as large as was expected, indicating a very healthy condition in the city. A very enjoyable time was spent, the best of everything being supplied.

Piano music was supplied by A. Cracknell throughout the afternoon. Two members of Toc H, J. Underwood and Alf Slocum, lent very valuable aid, and others who took part included Sergeant-Major Martin, George Almon, Mrs. Joyce, Miss Dorothy Montgomery, Sergeant-Major Alexee and overseas everything were Adjutant and Mrs. Kerr.

While preparations were made for a great many more than came, it was cause for congratulation that the number present was not so large as expected. Food not used is being distributed to needy families.

### FAMOUS SURGEON DIES

### KING'S FRIEND DIED TODAY

LONDON, Dec. 26.—Lord Lambourne, one of King George's oldest friends, died at Bishops' Hall, near Romford, Essex, today, aged 81. He was an enthusiastic horticulturist and a keen rival of the King at horticultural shows, the two often exchanging banter on the respective merits of their estates in Essex and Norfolk.

### 20 FAMILIES LEFT KABUL

British Military Planes Carried Women and Children to Safety

PESHAWAR, India, Dec. 26.—Members of 20 European families were evacuated during Christmas Day by the British military airplanes from Kabul, Afghanistan. Those brought here included nieces of French Minister Feit and relatives of French and German professors and engineers.

### TUG ROOSEVELT SAFE IN NORTH

SEATTLE, Dec. 26.—Radio advices from the coast guard cutter Unalga early today said that the disabled tug Roosevelt, in tow of the gasboat Attu, was safely in the shelter of Cape St. Elias.

The steamer Starr, which the Roosevelt had been towing when she was disabled in heavy seas, is holding her anchorage in the vicinity, with the Northwestern standing by. The Roosevelt carries 16 men.

CHICAGO, Dec. 26.—It was officially announced that for every four murders perpetrated here a policeman lost his life.

## ANOTHER COAST TO COAST RACE

Fifty Thousand Dollars to Be Given in Prize Money to 15 Leading Runners

It is announced that on account of the great interest taken in the transcontinental footrace last March, the event is to become an annual one. The second race will start from New York City on or about March 31, but the Pacific coast finishing point has not yet been decided upon. Apparently the promoters are open to bids. There will be 15 prizes offered, varying all the way from \$25,000 down to \$700, aggregating \$50,000, and there will be an entry fee of \$300 and each will pay his own expenses. Last year there were 10 prizes aggregating \$48,000.

The Kispiox Indian Band, which is one of the best in the province, gave several musical selections during the evening and received well merited honors.

Mr. Burnett spoke in high terms of praise of the work of Miss L. Morrice who has taught the Kispiox Indian School for six and a half years and has resigned her position and leaves for her home in North Vancouver, much to the regret of the natives.

Robert Tomlinson, a former missionary of Kispiox, acted as interpreter and gave an eloquent address in the native language, which was heartily enjoyed by the older of the natives.

Indian children sang very sweetly and gave several very interesting dialogues. Native women, supervised by Mrs. Burnett, Miss A. Menzies, Field Matron, also were very active during the evening.

A richly laden Christmas Tree was soon stripped of its contents and all the children and parents were made happy by generous presents.

Like the wise men of old the Indians marched up the aisle and presented their gifts to the church for the missionary and maintenance fund and all were happy when the full quota was reached.

The Rev. T. H. Wright received the money which Rev. A. A. Burnett enrolled the names and amounts donated in the record book of the local church.

A couple of autos came from the hospital with the nurses and their friends who thoroughly enjoyed the evening's proceedings and said that the event was just like the stories you read in books.

This was certainly a very happy and successful event. Kispiox Indian Mission is having a very successful year, and 1928 fades into history as one of the very best years in its career.

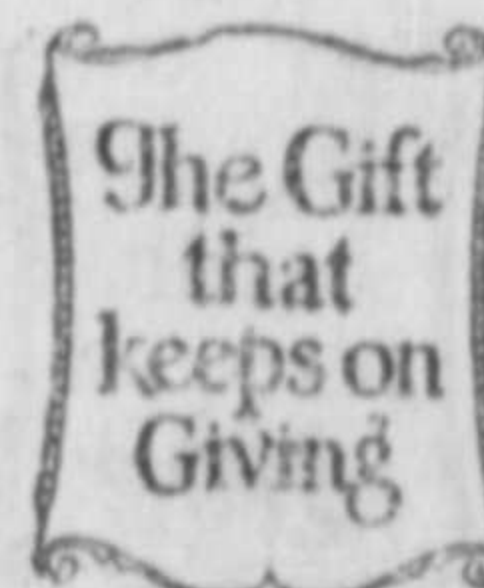

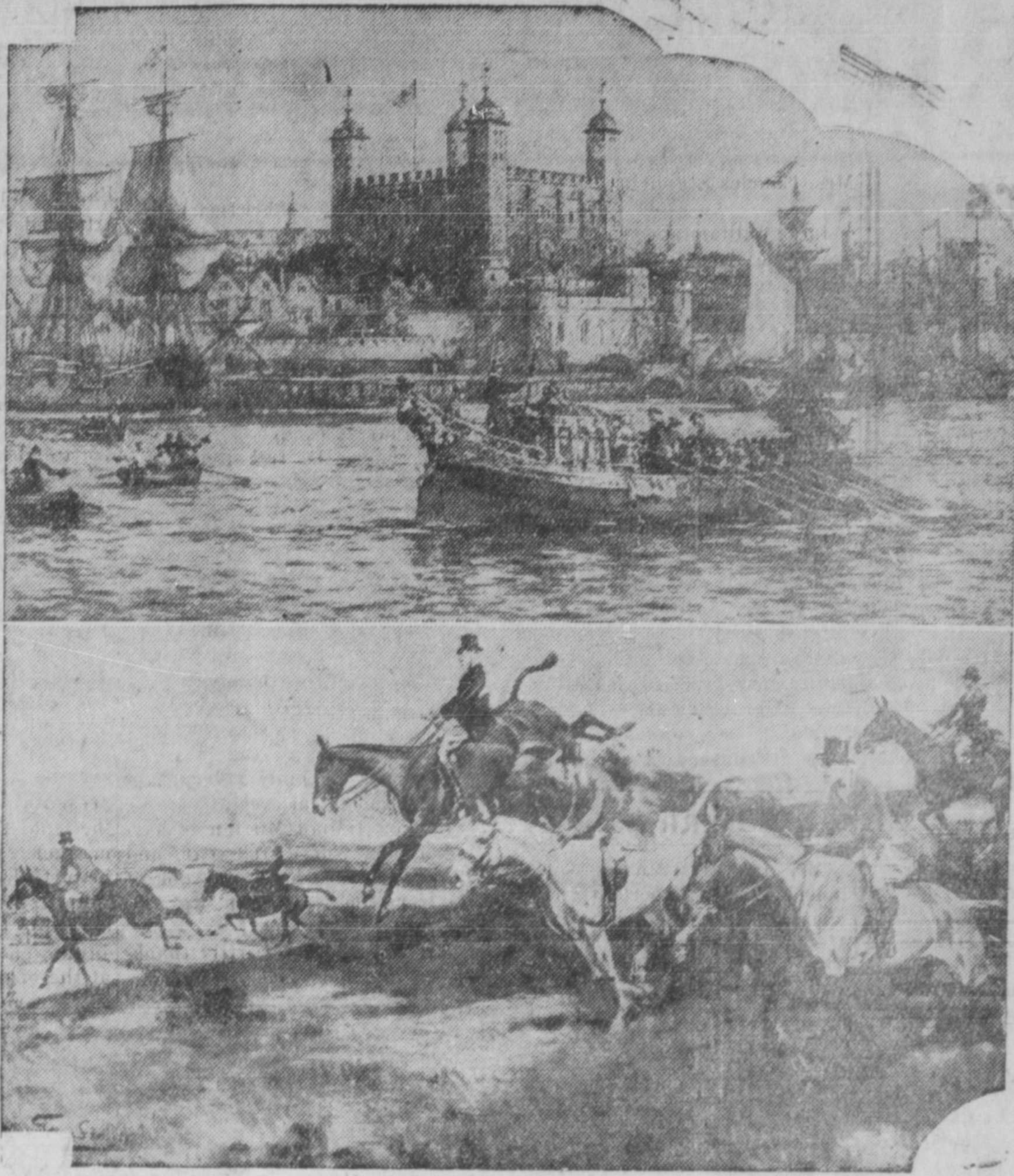

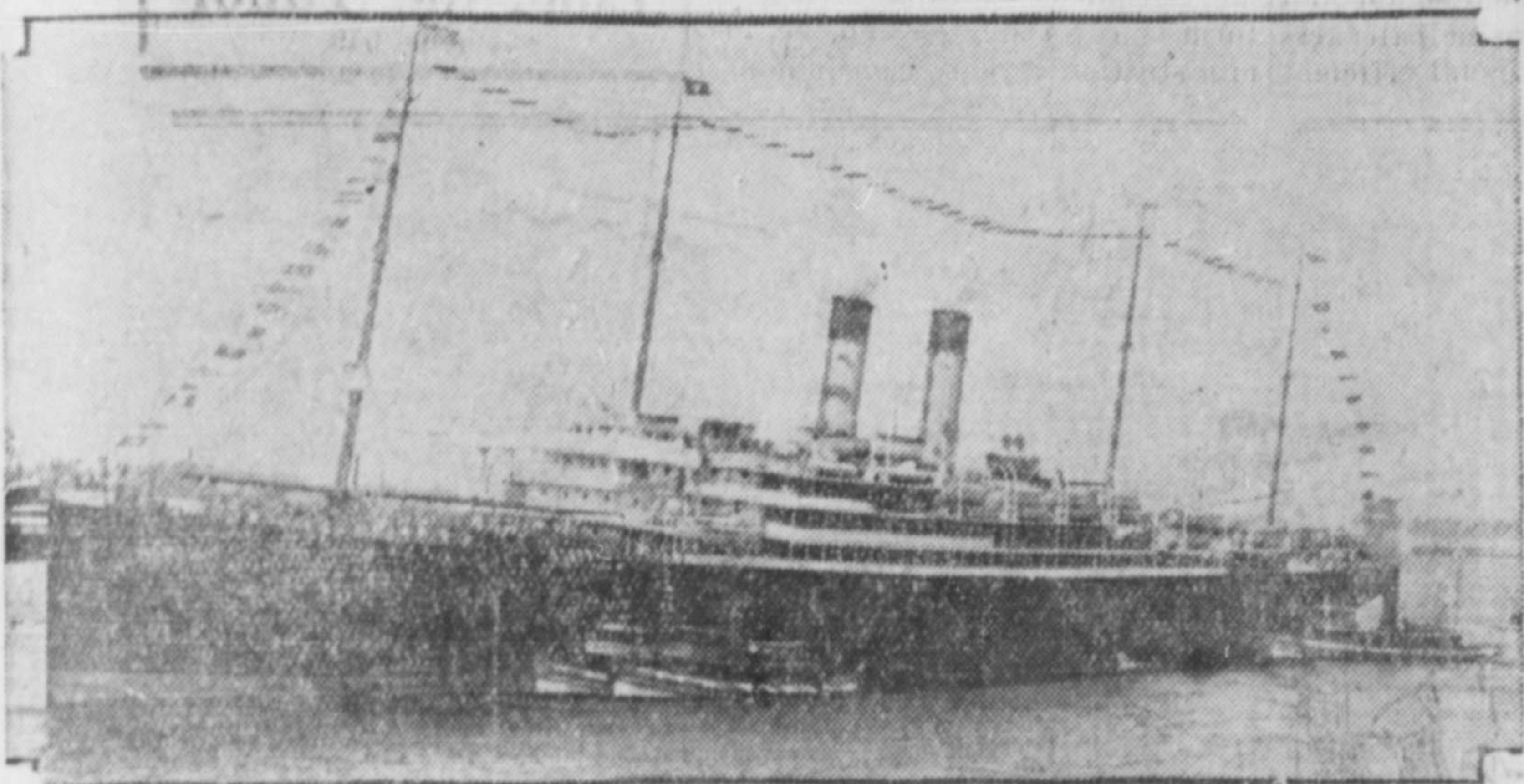

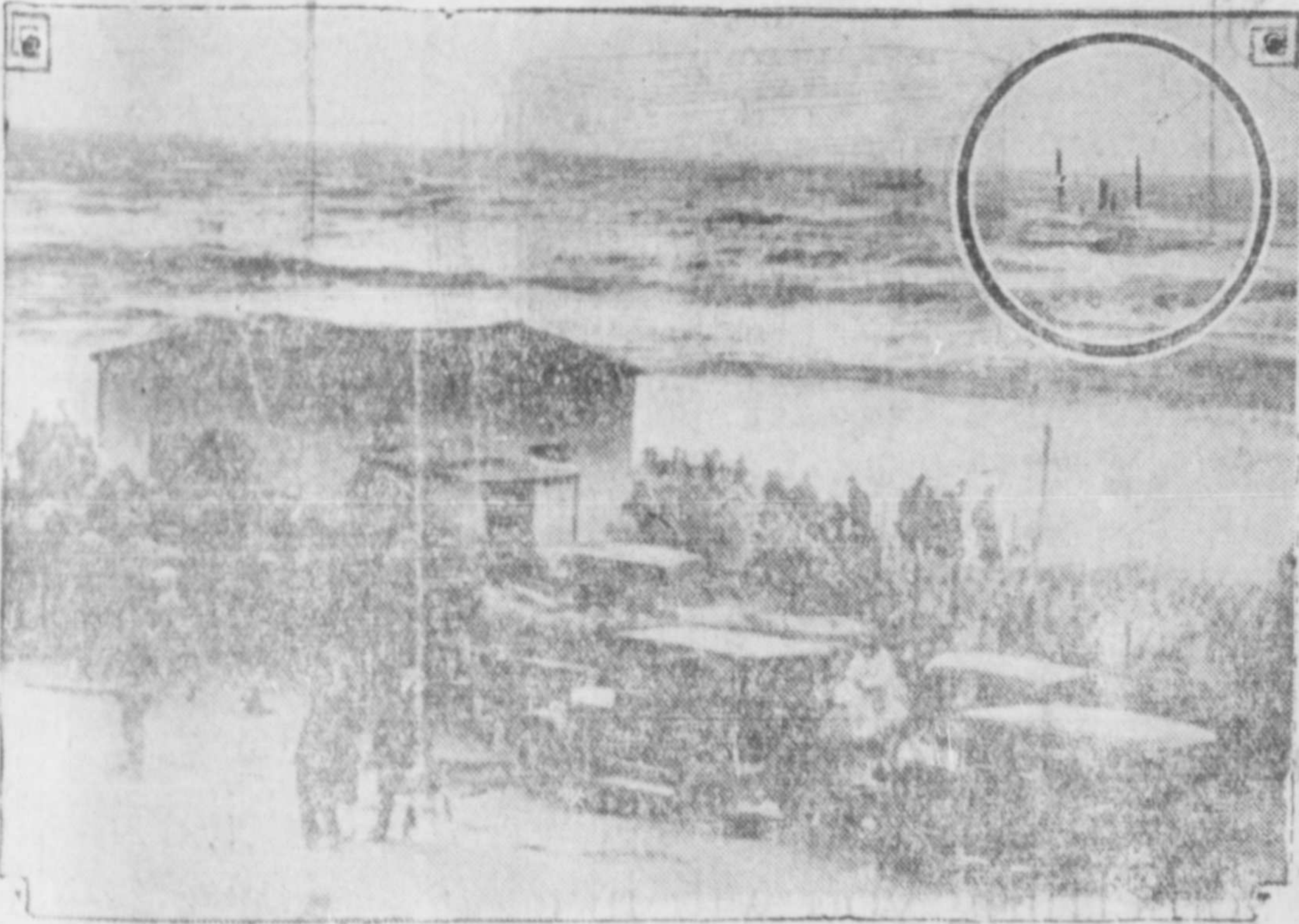

LINER WHICH WENT AGROUND NEAR COBH HARBOR



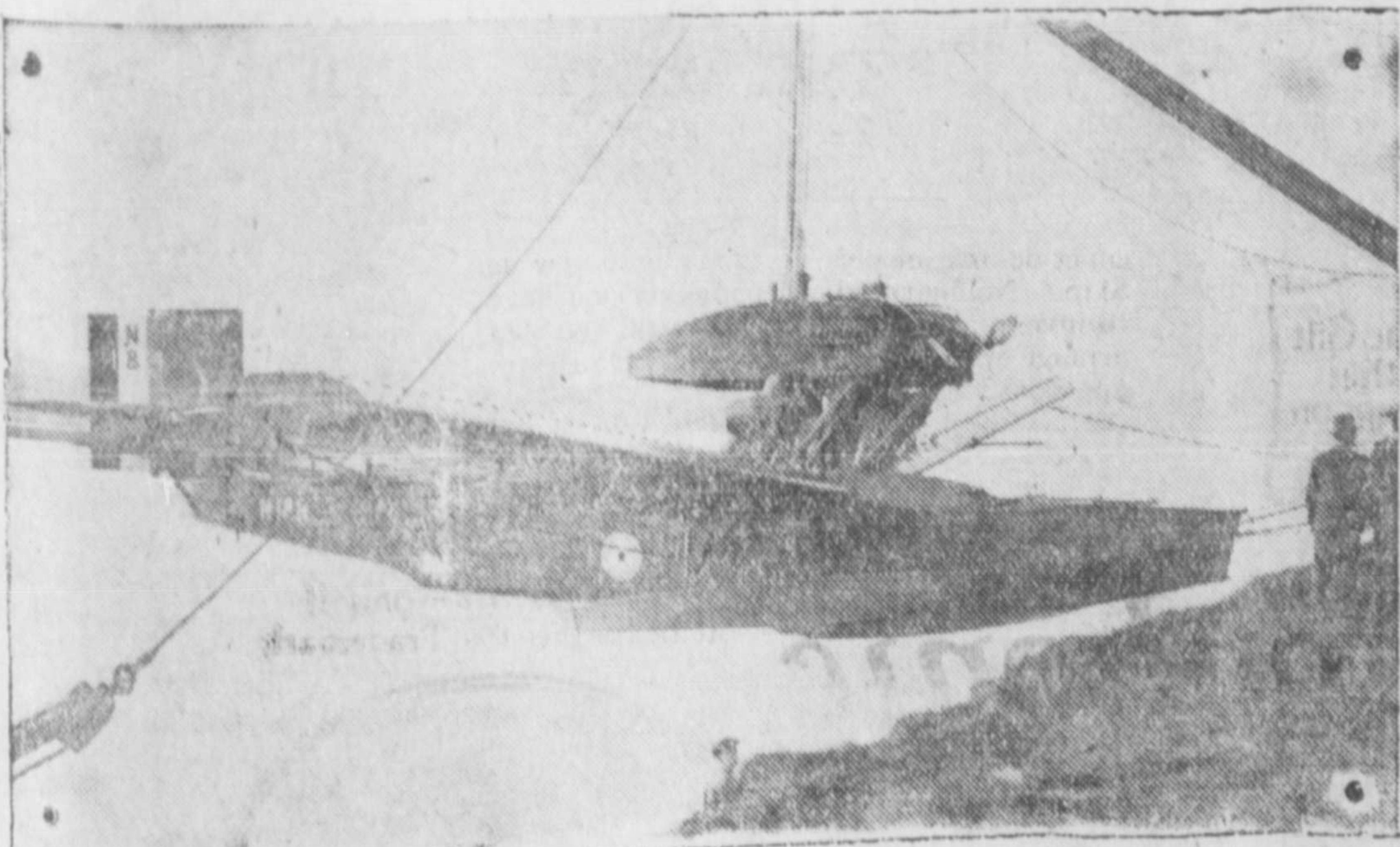
White Star liner "Celtic" which recently struck a rock in Cobh Harbor, Ireland.

# Radio Broadcasting and Reception

## POSSIBILITY OF A RADIO TRUST

(Seattle Post Intelligencer)  
 Senator Dill of Washington sees danger of a radio trust—and so must every radio fan who thinks. The radio commission is constantly allowing more and more stations to use huge power, blanketing smaller stations.

If this sort of thing goes on, the air will be dominated by a few high-powered stations, which ultimately will form themselves into a trust to monopolize broadcasting channels. The danger of this needs no explanation.

On the other hand, the average fan is against the jamming of the air with a surplus of stations, so close together that there is difficulty, especially in cities, in separating them.

There is, probably a middle course that will be approximate satisfaction and justice. It is to be hoped the Washington senator can prevail upon congress to take it.

## WOMEN ARE NOT BROADCASTERS

None Found Suitable for the Work on Account of Poor Voices

LONDON, England, Dec. 25. — Women, who have invaded many of the spheres formerly held exclusively by men and have succeeded therein, are now faced with a new challenge—the British Broadcasting Corporation says it is not the corporation's intention to employ women as announcers. At present there are a few women employed part time before the microphone in London announcing programs during the afternoon, in the children's hour, and at some provincial stations, and these will be retained, but the corporation states that it is not its policy to employ women for broadcasting work.

In an interview an official of the British Broadcasting Corporation said: "The British Broadcasting Corporation has tested recently a large number of women applicants for the positions of announcers. There are no vacancies for announcers, male or female, and the B.B.C. does not contemplate appointing women to full-time announcing posts in the near future. Among those women tested no suitable candidate was found. This was possibly due to the limitations of the microphone and possibly to the limitations of those who were tested."

Answering several questions, an official supplemented the above statement by saying that the women who were given a trial before the microphone came from all parts of the country and that they were well educated. The test took place two months ago and consisted of readings from books to which the officials listened in. No members of the general listening-in community, numbering close upon 3,000,000, were privileged to hear the efforts of the candidates.

There was no direct answer to the question: "Are women banned for ever as announcers to the B. B. C.?" The reply being: "We have no vacancy for an announcer."

The official refused to commit himself when he was asked: "In the event of there being a vacancy will the B.B.C. give equal consideration to the applications of women and men?"

The B.B.C. contend that while a candidate must be able to appear before the microphone it is essential that an announcer should have executive ability to discharge heavy responsibilities at unexpected moments. He sometimes has complete charge of the studio and has to make quick decisions and be a good disciplinarian.

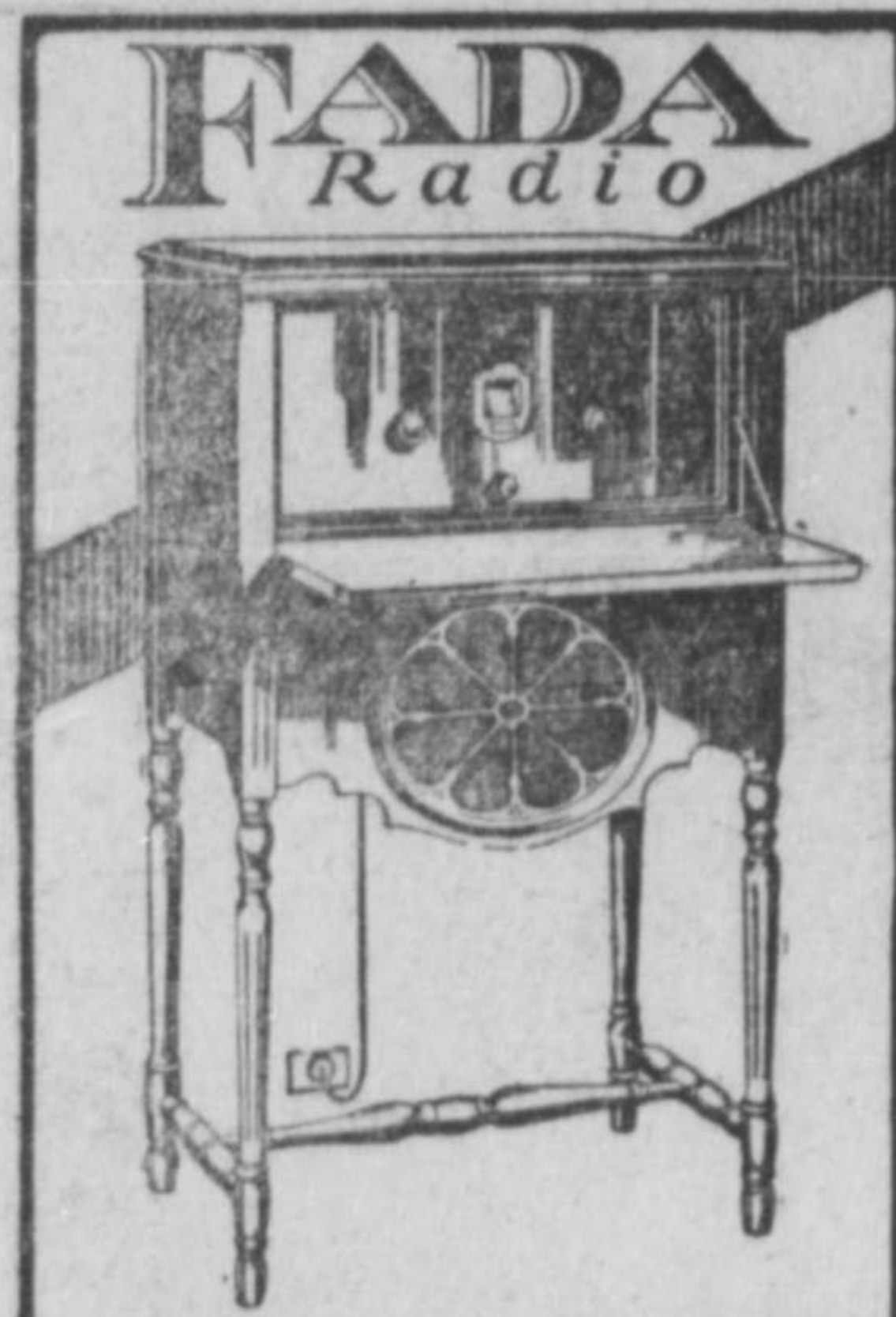

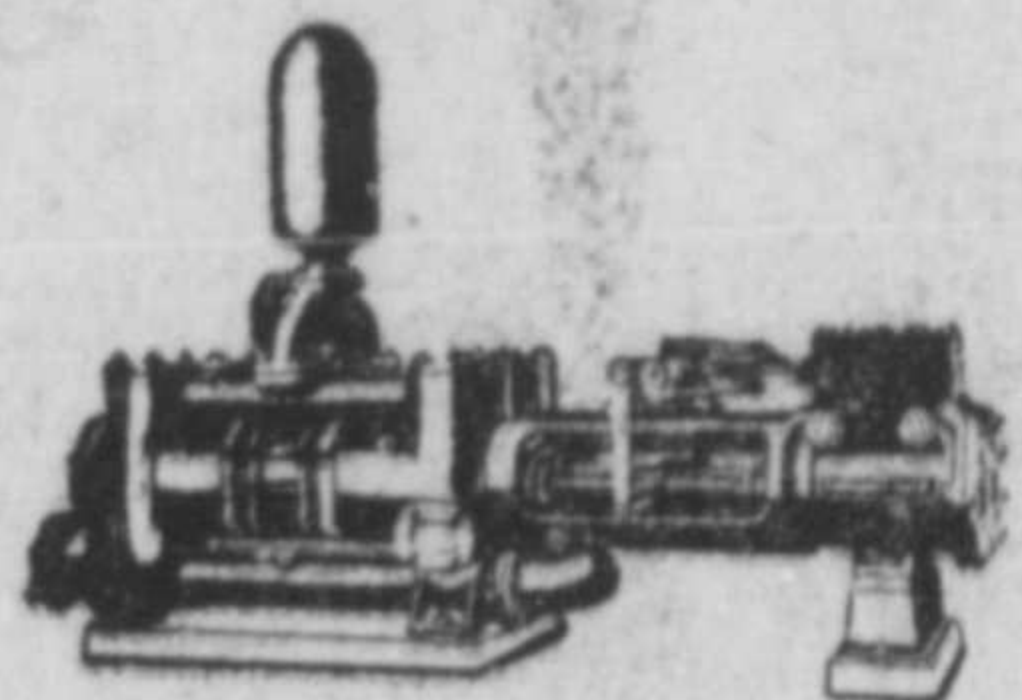

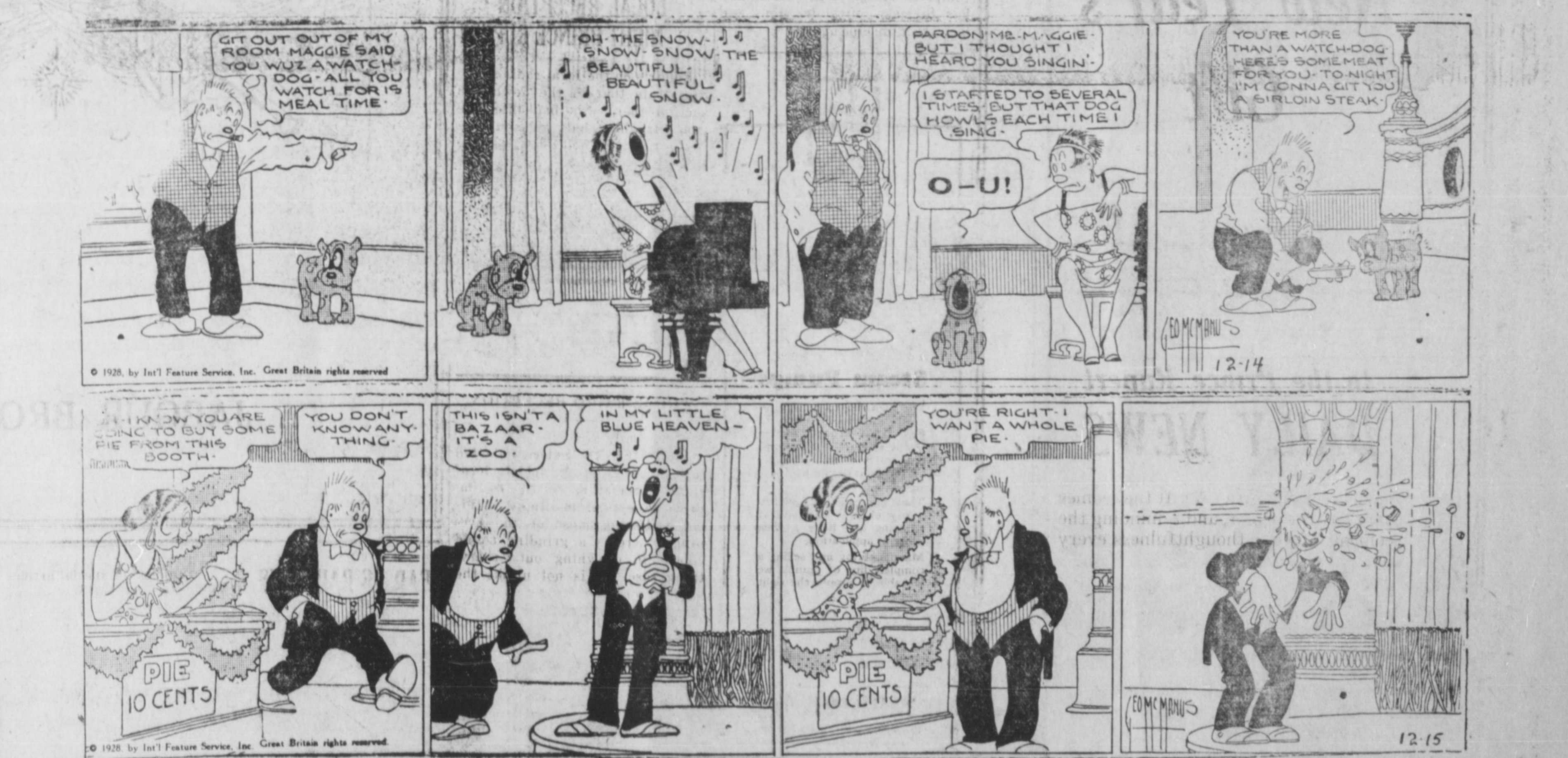
