WINDSOR, Ont., October 3.-The Canadian National passenger train No. 11 from Toronto to Windsor was held up and mail looted, the takings being variously estimated at from twenty to sixty-five thousand dollars.

John Gibbs, 20 years of age of Los Angeles, was arrested two hours later at Detroit and \$20,000 of Canadian currency was found on him stuffed about his shabby clothing.

Court Of Appeal Plays Havoc With Supreme Court Judgments Given By Mr. Justice Morrison

VANCOUVER, Oct. 3.-By a majority judgment Al Marks, who had been sentenced to seven years for conspiracy to defraud the public in connection with stock transactions was granted a new trial by the court of appeals which convened here today.

The appeal of Charles P. Porter, jointly indicted and convicted with Marks, was dismissed and he must serve the seven years sentence imposed by Mr. Justice Morrison.

Reversing the decision of the\* trial judge, Mr. Justice Morrison, the appeal court unanmiously al-owed the appeal of the P.G.E.
