ONTREAL, April 4.—The Maroons and New York Rangers qualified to meet in the worlds professional hockey championship for possession of the Stanley Cup as the result of the games played last night, the spectacular Canadiens being excluded by reason of their defeat one goal to nothing, the Maroons thus taking the two-game series and the Rangers by defeating Boston four to one took the two-game series five to





One of the old timers of the north ountry, George Bunn of Stewart, arrived in the city from the south yesterday on his way back to the mines from Vancouver. He is the ewner of six miles back from tidewater. It is on a good horse trail and the wagon road will be constructed to within 2,000 feet of it this summer, thus enabling easy access to be obtained.

While Mr. Bunn works alone on the claim, driving into the mountain, he has already done considerable development work and the ore he has taken out goes 25.8 per cent of copper and 31 ounces of silver. There are some good showings and he is now planning to secure capital for further development. Like all prespectors he carries around a pocketful of nice looking rock. He mentions that there is a stream close by his property suitable for power development and mining timber in

Mr. Bunn did placer mining in the Yukon in the early days and has also prospected in Alaska.

BOOKS LOANED OF WHICH 902 WERE JUVENILE

March was a record month at the public library, according to the report of the librarian, Miss Cruikshank, who said the number of books put out was 75 ahead of last March which was the highest up to that time. 




