# News of the Mines

AROUND PRINCE RUPERT

Annual Reports of B.C. Silver and Sebakwe-Activity at Alice Arm to Syndicate Beach Molybdenum

"During the year we continued the development of the north group of claims, no work having been done on the south group," states the annual report of the B.C. Silver Mines Ltd. "During the first nine months of the year, work was largely confined to No. 4 level-160 feet below No. 3 level-where the extension of the main Premier ore zone was drifted on for a total distance of 700 feet. This work disclosed an ore body 240 feet long and of greater width than the drift. Further exploration will have to be done before anything positive can be stated as to its value and dimensions but it is reasonable to assume that thus

ore body will develop a large tonnage of the general direction of the continuamilling ore. The remaining 456 feet of drifting on No. 4 level followed a wide silicified and well mineralized zone. The average values in the drift were below milling grade—commercial values may exist in this area, however, at another horizon. The downward continuation of this silicified zone and the abovementioned ore body will, no doubt, bt explored from No. 2 shaft. Toward the end of December it was decided to sink two-compartment shaft close to the emier boundary. The immediate objective of this shaft is to explore and open up the rich ore which was disclosed by diamond drills and a further ore body that passes in its dip from the Premier to B.C. Silver ground. In addition to this, however, it is our intention to generally explore the ore zone through this shaft in a northerly direction at a lower horizor than has hitherto been possible. To April 10 this shaft had reached a depth of 300 feet. The porphry contains low gold and silver values throughout-selected specimens assayed up to \$105 per ton. This is a likely looking area and is well worth exploring. During the year "C" ore body fifty feet above No. 3 level and from this area 89.86 tons of cre were shipped, giving a gross value of \$4741.60. During the year we did 2497 feet of drifting and crosscutting and 135 feet of sinking."

"Work was principally confined during the year," says the annual report of the Sebakwe and District Mines Ltd. "to continuing 432 drift northeasterly in




