

Says if Cannot Get What They Want From Liberals Will Turn to Conservatives-Tolmie Speaks for Capital

OTTAWA, March 3 .- D. M. Kennedy, representing the United Farmers' Association of Peace River in the budget debate yesterday, said the government was trading too much on the fact that the Progressives could not get together with the Conservatives. This, he warned, was not too big a step, for if the western farmers could not secure from the government those advantages which the government was conceding to the manufacturers, the best thing for the Progressive party to do was to go ahead and see what bargain they could make with the Conservatives.

WAS TEN YEARS AFTER BREWSTER

Fourth Man Prominent in Party to be Taken Since Liberals Came Into Power

It was something of a unique coincidence that the death of Hon. William Sloan, provincial minister of mines, should have occurred exactly ten years to the night since Hon. H. C. Brewster, Premier of British Columbia, under whom Mr. Sloan received his portfolio. passed away in Calgary where he was taken ill as he was returning to the coast following a trip to Ottawa on provincial business. Mr. Brewster died on the night of March 1, 1918; Mr. Sloan on the night of March 1, 1928.

The hand of death has taken a heavy toll of leaders during the regime of the Liberal government which was formed in 1916 by the late Mr. Brewster. First there was Mr. Brewster, then Dr. Rothwell of New Westminster, then Premier John Oliver and, last, Mr. Sloan, All were considered great leaders in their party and all were taken while still actively in the saddle of political life.

MAKE RESCUE

Air Force New Revealing Stories of Daring in Search for Lewis

OTTAWA, March 3. Stories of daring dashes across the ley wastes of Ungava and perilous flights over the desolate waters of Hudson Straits from lonely bases on the rim of the Arctic circle in an effort to rescue their comrades of the air service, was revealed by officials of the Royal Canadian Air Force and the Department of Marine and Fisheries, following news of the safe return to Port Burwell of Flying Officer Lewis and Flight Sergeant Terry and their Eskimo guide after being lost in the frozen north.

It was also revealed that the Lewis party had been missing for sixteen and a half days instead of thirteen as formerly given out by headquarters here.







WINNIPEG, March 3.-In charge of special messengers of the Canadian National Express, one million Atlantic salmon eggs passed through Winnipeg last night on the Continental Limited bound for Vancouver.

They are from the government fish hatcheries at South Esk, New Brunswick, and are consigned to Major Motherwell of the fisheries department at Vancouver. The eggs are continued in seven special boxes and are being handled with the greatest care. At Montreal they were watered and they will be rewatered at Edmonton, under the supervision of the inspector of fisheries there.

For the past four or five years the Canadian National Express has handled this valuable and delicate shipment and they have always arrived at their destination in excellent condition.
