### Digby Island Radio Station Completes Feat of Speaking Ship Throughout Long Voyage

At 8 o'clock this morning, Digby Island wireless, station again spoke the big motorship Aorangi, this time 100 miles from Auckland, New Zealand, which port she will reach this afternoon.
