# RAILWAY TO GROUNDHOG IS PLANNED

## DELEGATION AT VICTORIA ASKING AID OF GOVERNMENT

## Asking Government Aid for a Railway to Tap Ground Hog Coal Fields From Prince Rupert

Delegation Consisting of F. C. Dawson, C. H. Orme and W. E. Fisher now at Victoria Laying Proposition Before Cabinet

VICTORIA, Nov. 2.—To build a railway to tap the Ground Hog coal fields from some point on the Canadian National in order to bring the coal into Prince Rupert for shipment is the plan which was laid before the Government by a delegation consisting of F. G. Dawson, C. H. Orme and W. E. Fisher, all residents of Prince Rupert, who are here today. What the delegation asks is some Government aid in connection with the construction of the

It is understood that a syndicate has been formed to horoughly prospect the coal and survey the line of railway and if it is proved that the coal is there of the quality represented by the Campbell and other reports, there, is a group of capitalists ready to back the enterprise and develop the mines immediately.

The railway would go by the most feasible route, cossibly from Terrace, Kitwanga or Hazelton.

The coal, which is said to be anthracite of a high grade, it is thought would find a ready market and would develop a wholly new industry in British Columbia.

If the request of the delegation is granted, a company will be formed at once and work of surveying and prospecting be carried out so that actual construction work may proceed before very long.

Mr. Found spoke of the asset Canada had in ner fisheries. It was valued at \$50,000,000 a year. There was invested in the industry \$60,000,000 and it employed 75,000 people. When fish were sold it was so much added to the wealth of the country.

Mr. Found spoke of the difference between the fisheries of the Atlantic and Pacific. On this coast there was a narrow continental shelf all along the coast, which produced the greatest halibut fisheries in the world. rivers coming direct from the mountains were particularly suited for salmon. It was an exceptional situation, and the department at Ottawa was fully alive to the necessity for conservation


