7 ANCOUVER, June 8 .- Opening up of the vast and fertile Peace River valley is the determined policy of the Liberal party and the government, Premier MacLean said last night when addressing the Abbotsford meeting. He said:

"We have negotiations for the sale of the Pacific Great Eastern now in progress and I believe we are going to dispose of the line, but I want to give you this assurance in the most positive terms. If we do not sell it we are not going to continue to have a railway that begins nowhere and ends nowhere. We are going to task the people to spend some money to extend that line so that we can open up that great Peace River country without delay."

Evidence in Defence of Sankey Being Given Today Following a Denial of Accuracy of Affidavit

Boat Builder Denies That he Asked Miss Chisholm to go for a Ride With Him the Morning of the Murder

YEW WESTMINSTER, June 8 .- At the Sankey trial yesterday Mrs. Catherine Cox, who acted for the provincial police as interpreter, said an affidavit by Louis W. Patmore, barrister of Prince Rupert, was a fabrication.

The affidavit declared that Mrs. Cox told Mr. Patmore that Charles Rineholt told her he invited Miss Chisholm for a sail in his gas boat on the morning she was murdered but the girl declined.

J. E. Bird, counsel for the defense, referred to the affidavit in an effort to discredit the evidence given by Rineholt.

Rineholt, the German boat builder #under cross-examination, denied having told Mrs. Cox he had invited the girl INDIAN SCHOOL for a sail and also denied he went into a gas boat and called on the girl to come along. After Mrs. Cox had described the af-

fidavit as a fabrication, Bird produced her notebook. He drew attention to the fact that several pages had been torn from the book and suggested these might have carried the notes regarding the alleged conversation with Rineholt. Mrs Cox denied this.
