SIR HENRY THORNTON VISITING CITY

POLL RESULTS SHOW LITTLE CHANGE SINCE YESTERDAY

Sir Henry Thornton and Party Reach Rupert and Are Guests at Luncheon

In the course of his annual Pacific Coast inspection trip, Sir Henry Thornton, president of the Canadian National Railways, arrived in the city from Vancouver on the steamer Prince George this morning and will proceed East by special train leaving at 5 o'clock this afternoon. Other officials in the presidential party include W. A. Kingsland, Winnipeg, general manager, Western Region; Dr. J. McCombe, Montreal, chief medical officer for the system; Walter Thompson, Montreal, director of publicity; H. A. Dixon, Winnipeg, chief engineer, Western Region; S. Morrison, Vancouver, chief engineer for British Columbia district; B. C. Keeley, Vancouver, Pacific Coast manager, Canadian National Pacific Coast Steamships; J. R. Cameron, assistant general manager for the Western Region, Vancouver, and W. H. Hobbs, secretary to the president.

MACLEAN WILL RESIGN WHEN COUNT MADE

TOLMIE NOT SAYING ANYTHING ABOUT CABINET UNTIL CALLED ON TO FORM GOVERNMENT

VICTORIA, July 20.—It is not likely the Maclean government will relinquish office until after the official counts in the ridings are completed on August 8. In the meantime Hon. S. F. Tolmie is resting. He is making no announcement as to the personnel of his cabinet. Various names are being put forward but the Conservative leader is offering no information on the subject pending being called upon to form a government.

FINE CRUISING YACHT IS HERE

One of the finest little pleasure yachts to be seen here this season is the Yankee Boy, owned by G. C. Backard of Seattle, which participated in the recent Olympia to Juneau race, coming in fourth, and arrived from the north at 7:30 last evening, cruising home to Puget Sound. The vessel left shortly after 3 o'clock this afternoon for Seattle. She was moored at the yacht club float during her stay.

The last word in equipment and comfort of fittings, the Yankee Boy is of the raised deck cruiser type. She is 44 feet long and is powered with a 50 h.p. Peerless engine.

DR. WRINCH GIVEN SOLID MAJORITY

Word received from Skeena riding this afternoon was to the effect that Dr. H. C. Wrinch, M.L.A., Liberal candidate, had a majority of 163 over Frank Dockrill, Conservative, 26 out of 29 polls having reported their results. The Hazelton doctor thus returns to Legislature with comfortable lead.

ANOTHER LIBERAL SEAT IS NOW LOST

PRINCE GEORGE, July 20.—C. S. Leary, Liberal M. L. A., concedes the election of Capt. James Fitzsimmons, his Conservative opponent in the election in Kaslo-Slocan riding. Fitzsimmons' majority is estimated at about fifty.

BODY OF LOWENSTEIN HAS BEEN FOUND

BOULOGNE, France, July 20.—The body of Captain Alfred Lowenstein, the Belgian millionaire, who fell from a private cross-channel airplane recently, was found in the sea.

Car Barge is Being Built at Drydock

Cost of Big Boat to be \$100,000 and Work Has Commenced

A car barge costing \$100,000 is to be built here at the Dry Dock at once, Sir Henry Thornton stated today in his address to the Board of Trade. The work has already commenced.

Sir Henry also told the Board at luncheon that a steamer plying out of Prince Rupert to the Islands would be provided at once.

CAPITAL LEASES NEW THEATRE
Misak Alvasoff announced this afternoon, following his arrival from Vancouver, that the Capitol had leased the new theatre property which is under construction here and will conduct it in connection with its chain of theatres throughout the country.

BIG MISSOURI MINE IS SOLD

TACOMA, July 20.—J. C. Gregory of Tacoma, president of the Big Missouri, officially announced here today that he had paid to the Canadian Bank of Commerce this morning \$100,000 on behalf of his own company and the Consolidated Mining & Smelting Co. as the final payment on the purchase of the Big Missouri mine in the Portland Canal district. The title will now pass into the hands of the Buena Vista Mining Co., formed for the purpose, in which Consolidated holds fifty-three per cent interest and Big Missouri 47 per cent. Gregory said: "We shall go right on with development."

PATTULLO HAS MARGIN OF 86

With twelve small polls yet to report, Hon. T. D. Pattullo had a majority of 86 over James H. Thompson in the provincial election contest for Prince Rupert riding according to a computation by the returning officer, E. H. Mortimer, at noon today. Britain Agrees to Peace Pact With Reservations; Dominions Also in Accord

WASHINGTON, July 20.—Replies of the British government and the Dominions accepting the revised American draft of the war renunciation treaty have been made public. The British government accepts the revised treaty but reiterates understanding of the terms of the pact insofar as they might affect obligations to the League of Nations or under the Treaty of Locarno and also with respect to the right of self-defence and automatic release from obligations to any signatory nation breaking the pact. In addition, Sir Austen Chamberlain, Foreign Secretary, reiterates his previous statement that British acceptance rests "upon understanding if it does not prejudice" her freedom in unspecified areas of which welfare and integrity constitute "a special interest for our peace and safety."

Prince Rupert Boys Band Has Wonderful Time at Edmonton and Plan Remain to Next Week

EDMONTON, July 20.—Five well kept tents in a quiet and specially selected corner of the Edmonton Exhibition Association grounds house the Prince Rupert Boys' Band, an organization which has greatly endeared itself to citizens of Edmonton and thousands of rural visitors to the city since its arrival to attend the exhibition. The band, some 30 strong, is under the conductorship of T. Wilson, an excellent musician, whose first thoughts at all times are of his fine and faithful boys, while W. Gilchrist is in constant attendance on the boys, ministering to their welfare and doing everything in his power to make their stay here comfortable.

Disappointment was expressed by the bandmen when they found that the real object of their coming here could not be achieved. They entered the amateur band contest, the first of its kind ever to be held at the exhibition, but found that their entry could not be accepted as the rules of competition stated the event was open only to Alberta bands.

KERGIN HAS WON ELECTION

VANCOUVER, July 20.—Atlin previously conceded to the Conservatives went into the Liberal list today when returns this morning showed that with two small polls to hear from the Liberal candidate, Kergin, was leading Falconer by 27 votes. The vote was 584, Kergin; 557, Falconer; and 32, Moulit; Kergin being conceded elected.

Vancouver Report on Present Political Situation Gives The Liberals Ten With Possibilities

VANCOUVER, July 20.—With the election of Dr. H. C. Wrinch conceded in Skeena Liberals have elected ten, Conservatives 33 and Labor 1. Mackenzie, Lillooet, Kamloops and Prince Rupert are doubtful.

Thirty-five polls out of forty-eight in Mackenzie give Mike Manson a lead of 72 over Heath. In Lillooet Carson leads Munn by 116 in 23 polls out of 39. In Kamloops, Colley has a lead of 11 over Mitchell with three polls to report.

Conceded to the Liberals are: Alton, Columbia, Cranbrook, Nanaimo, New Westminster, North Vancouver, Omiceca, Revelstoke, Yale, and Skeena. F. R. George was conceded to the Conservatives this morning. Buckham had a majority of about 35 in Columbia, Sutherland about 300 in Revelstoke and Ian Mackenzie about one hundred in North Vancouver. Omiceca is conceded to Manson, twelve polls out of 35 gives the attorney general a majority of 143. In Skeena 21 polls out of 29 give Wrinch 706 and Dockerill 577. Fort George with seven polls to come Burden has 1369 and Perry 1291.

CIRCULATION CAMPAIGN

Most readers of this paper will know by now something about the circulation campaign starting in connection with this paper. WELCOME SIR HENRY

Sir Henry Thornton comes to see us every year and we are glad to have him pay us a visit occasionally. He knows as well as we that he has not been able to carry out all his plans in connection with this port, but we hope he will give earnest consideration to some of them this time and try to have them carried out.

And possibly we may be able to help the railway to some extent. We might for instance persuade the government to give us a daily mail service during the summer months and to pay the railway for it. That would be a great thing for us and would also benefit the railway. The new mills starting here recently will benefit the line and we hope there will be other industries develop that will provide business for the railway.

BIG MISSOURI MINE

The taking up of the option on the Big Missouri mine is a great event in mining circles. It means an immense lot to the Salmon River section of Portland Canal and has an influence in drawing attention to the whole district. If the option had been dropped it would have been a serious blow. To have two big shipping mines in the same valley is a great thing but it is only the beginning of what it is hoped will be much better times for Stewart and the surrounding country.

EXTENSION OF SCHOOLS

Possibly it is not generally recognized what a healthy sign is the extension of educational institutions in a community. When the Booth School was built here it was twice as large as was actually needed, yet today all the schools in the city are crowded and others will have to be erected soon.

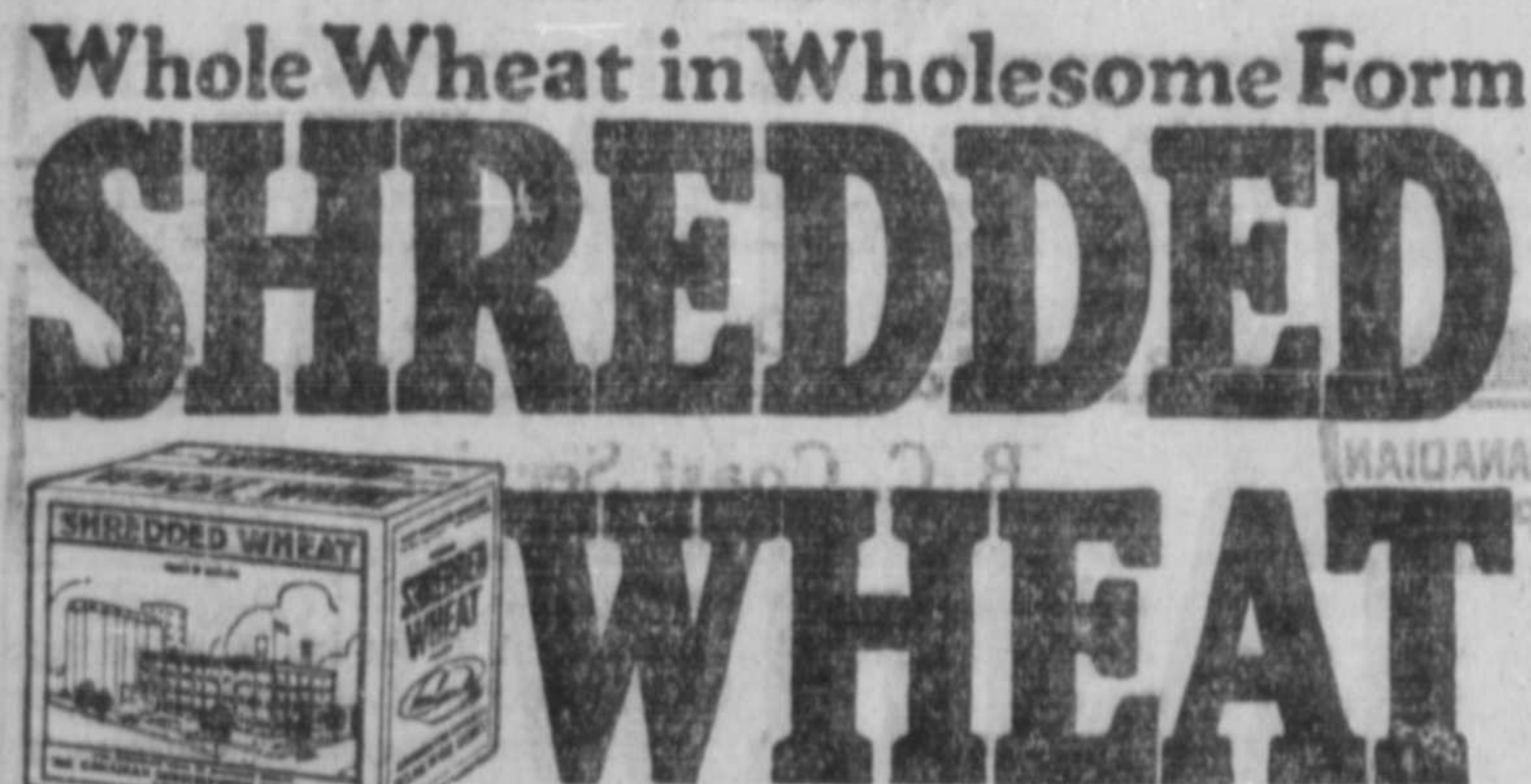
In Terrace they are planning a new high school to provide for the increase in number of children attending, a second room having to be opened there after the holidays.

LARGE INCOME RADIO CONTROL

SUM OF FOUR AND HALF MILLION RECEIVED BY COMMISSION IN BRITAIN

LONDON, July 20.—Government control of the Radio here has proved a profitable matter, at any rate for the Government. The first report of the British Broadcasting Commission, shows that its income for the year was \$1,500,000 and that after setting aside \$300,000 for construction of regional stations there was still \$900,000 to be carried forward. The sum of \$4,000,000 was derived from wireless licenses. It spent \$2,500,000 on its programs. Many interesting facts are given in the report. There were, for instance, 68,000 hours of transmission during the year, with only about 20 hours of breakdown. Music occupied about two-thirds of the programs. Lessons by wireless seem to be growing in favor in schools, for 4,000—double the number of the previous year—were known to listen to London and Daventry alone. The total number of listeners increased by 217,000 during the year to 2,365,174. The Earl of Clarendon is chairman of the Commission and receives a salary of \$15,000. Lord Gainsford is vice-chairman, and has a salary of \$5,000. As ordinary members Sir Gordon Nairne, Dr. M. J. Rendall, Mrs. Philip Snowden, and Brigadier-General Reith receive \$3,500 each.

News of the Mines

AROUND PRINCE RUPERT

To Develop Silver-Bell at Stewart—Strike Made on Old Penetang Claim—Georgia River Gold Active

The contract has been completed for 4,500 feet of horse trail and the construction of camp buildings on the Silver Bell Mining Co.'s property near Stewart and everything is now in readiness for the commencement of actual development work as planned for this year. The property consists of sixteen claims and fractions on the east side of the head of Portland Canal, about one and a half miles southeast of Stewart and extends from just above tidewater to an elevation of some 4,500 feet. It is bounded on the north by the Silverado Consolidated and on the east and southeast by the Prosperity, its easterly boundary being only 750 feet from the Porter Idaho. The tram which the Premier will have to construct in order to handle Silverado ores will run directly across the Silver Bell property to the Premier terminals at the mouth of the Marmot River where it will join the tram now being built to the Porter Idaho. Considerable development work has already been done on the Silver Bell, under the direction of E. G. Riebe, consulting engineer, the funds having been advanced by Messrs. Backus and Engberg of Seattle. Mr. Riebe reports that there are four well defined veins vividly traceable throughout the length of the claims, these veins varying in width from six inches to eighteen feet with gold, silver and lead values from a few dollars a ton to \$96.20. The extensive work being done on Silverado, Prosperity and Porter Idaho should greatly assist and encourage development on the Silver Bell.

A discovery which may prove of considerable importance has been made on the old Penetang crown-granted claim which adjoins the Dalhousie group on the east and has been owned by W. D. Brown, one of the Dalhousie directors, for several years. The discovery was made in a gulch beside and partly underneath a small waterfall and as near as could be ascertained by picking around beneath the spray the vein is twelve feet wide with eight inches of solid ore on one wall that assays sixty-one per cent, the balance of the vein being well sprinkled with galena and showing some ruby silver. An effort is being made to work out the continuation of the vein.

With the exception of two bridges that are required, the trail up the Georgia River, south of Stewart, has been completed for six and a half miles and is now within four miles of the Georgia River Gold property. A commodious floating wharf has been built at the mouth of the river near the company's beach camp. It is the intention of the company to start development of the property at once back-packing sufficient supplies for immediate needs.

The Premier management has moved a compressor plant on to the Silverado mine at Stewart for the purpose of driving a 1000-foot tunnel to be used as a working tunnel when ore is encountered. From the portal of this tunnel it will be pretty well a straight shoot through to the site of the dock which the Premier is constructing at the mouth of Marmot River for the purpose of shipping ore from the Porter Idaho and Prosperity properties.

A crew of a dozen men in two shifts is now employed in driving two tunnels with power drills on the Marmot Gold property, consisting of fourteen claims and fractions, at the head of Magee Pass on the south fork of Marmot River, some eight miles from the beach. Arrangements have been made for the surveying of the property preparatory to crown-granting. Camp construction has been completed and development is being rushed. The work is at present confined to two main veins, other showings being left for future exploration. No. 1 vein has been traced a distance of from 3,000 to 3,000 feet and has a width of from six to fourteen feet, containing a sulphide ore carrying values in gold and silver with some lead and a little zinc. Open cuts in a number of places have given assay returns of from \$27 to \$400 per ton, mostly in gold and silver. There is also some free gold and native silver. No. 2 vein has been traced for some 1800 feet on the surface and has a width of from 6 to 12 feet. Values are identical with No. 1 vein. Two cross-cut tunnels have been started for the purpose of gaining depth. One is now in fifty feet and will have to be continued another 300 feet to reach the vein. The other tunnel driver for No. 2 vein crossed the formation for 3 feet and was turned and driven on the strike of the vein for 65 feet. Another 80 feet should put it under the surface outcrop from which assay returns of \$170 across three feet in gold and silver were taken. When the "objective" is reached the drift will be continued for the purpose of developing "bre" and gaining depth. Herbert Bush is managing director of the Marmot Gold.
