

Field Work Done Independently of District Staff Included in the Report

Included in the report of the district forester issued yesterday is a report on the field investigations which took place in the district during the year. These deal with insect or other infection of trees. That part of the report follows: In connection with the survey of the Babine Forest, a study was made of the growth of jackpine (Pinus Murrayana) he report of which has not to date been received.

During the summer months a twoman party from Forest Branch headquarters studied re-stocking on logged over spruce areas on the Queen Charlotte Islands. A report of findings has not yet come to hand.

QUEEN CHARLOTTES

The Entomological Branch of the Department of Agriculture sent an expert to the Queen Charlotte Islands in September to study the spruce aphis (Mysaphis abietina). It was found that in-.50 dications which were first observed in 1925 in the vicinity of Jedway had spread along the east coast of Moresby and Graham Islands and to Masset Inlet. It is thought that the height of the epidemic is past, and that in ensuing new timber will be attacked by this in-

> The Dominion Entomological Branch reported on cedar (Thuja plicata) which was noticed to be sloughing much of its inner foliage. This was thought to be the result of an attack by Keithia thujina but on closer investigation was found to be the result of a wet spring and early summer, followed by a sudden dry period in August.

BABINE LAKE

The above department also reported on an infestation which had been known tonus borealis, over a period of at least five years, has killed Englemann Spruce over an area of 11,000 acres. 

FLEW FROM ICELAND TO YARMOUTH, N.S.

First Record of Duck Crossing Atlantic Ocean Recently Mentioned

In the December issue of the Canadian Field Naturalist, Hoyes Lloyd, of the National parks branch, Ottawa, describes the first official record of a duck crossing the Atlantic. He says:

Harrison F. Lewis, chief federal migratory bird officer for Ontario and Quebec, had sent to him by his mother. who lives in Nova Scotia, a clipping from the Halifax Chronicle, which read as

"Yarmouth, Dec. 10, 1926 .- Two young men of Hawk Point, Cape Sable Island, have just captured a strange bird which they call a wood duck, and on the leg of it is a metal tag bearing the inscription 'V 20.14 P. Shovgaard, Viborg.

Upon communicating with the Roya! Danish consul-general for Canada and Newfoundland, at Montreal, the National parks of Canada branch has secured the very interesting information that the banded bird was a European Widgeon (Anas penelope), banded at Hraunsland, Iceland, on July 2, 1926.

Mr. Skovgaard has asked a number of questions concerning the recovery of the bird which he was instrumental in hav-

Where the birds of this species which occur in North America had their nesting grounds has long been a moot point, and I believe no nest of the species has been found in North America. This banding return, besides being the firs rans-Atlentic duck records and I think Widgeon for this continent, points significantly to the probable nesting place of the examples of the species which winter in eastern North America.

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


