In the January issue of the Rallway and Marine News, a Seattle trade publication, will be found an article from the pen of George B. Lamping, commissioner for the port of Seattle. It is an excellent summary giving a clear and impartial view with reference to Pacific ports and their immediate posibilities. The following are excerpts:







roposed Big Scheme Likely to Cause Lively Debate in Parliament

OTTAWA, Jan. 31. - (By Canadian Press)-One outstanding question which will doubtless come before parliament will be that of the development of the St. Lawrence River navigation and power proposals. That it will bring on a big debate is assured.
