

Earl Haig Died Suddenly From Heart Disease Following Active Lite Right Up to the Very Last

Only on Saturday Urged Boy Scouts to Stand up for England When People Spoke Disrespectfully of Her

LONDON, January 30 .- Earl Field Marshall Douglas Haig. commander of the British armies in France and Belgium during the war, died early this morning aged 66 from heart disease. Death occurred at the home of his brother-in-law, W. G. Jamieson, of Princes Gate, where he had been staying lately. He was on the point of retiring for the night when he collapsed, sitting on the edge of the bed. He did not lose consciousness immediately, but the end came shortly afterwards.

Earl Haig had been ailing slightly of late. He saw a physician a few days ago but was able to fulfil numbers of public engagements afterwards. Yesterday he took a walk in Hyde Park and was contemplating a visit to the Riviera if his doctor permitted it.


