CHINA APPEALS LEAGUE OF NATIONS

ENGLISHMEN IN B.C. GROWING UP AS PAGANS SAYS BISHOP

Fierce Fighting at Tsinan in Which Chinese City is Cleared of Nationalists by Japanese

Number of Japanese lose lives in conflict and anti-foreign feeling runs high around Shanghai; missionary lady killed

SHANGHAI, May 11.—Tsinan has been cleared of Nationalists after a week of bloodshed but anti-foreign feeling is smouldering in Shanghai. It is considered extremely risky for foreigners to venture into the native territory.

TOKIO, May 11.—It is officially stated that 21 Japanese soldiers were killed in Tsinan fighting and 70 were wounded. Also thirteen Japanese civilians were killed, nine wounded and 28 civilians are missing, two of whom it is believed were murdered.

FORSHAY BUYS ALL UTILITIES OF KETCHIKAN

SEATTLE, May 11.—W. S. Forshay, the Minneapolis financier, announced that he had purchased the leading utilities of Ketchikan, Alaska, for a consideration of about two million dollars. His acquisition purchased from Ketchikan and Seattle investors include the Citizen's Light, Power and Water Co., the Ketchikan Cold Storage Co., the Northland Transportation Co., and the Northland Investment Co.

FLOODS ANNOY OTTAWA CITY

OTTAWA, May 11.—The Ottawa River at the foot of Parliament Hill is now at high water mark of 1922. Much damage is being done and inconvenience suffered. Numbers of cottages along the shores of the river are flooded.

ICE STILL HOLDING SOME PARTS OF YUKON

DAWSON, May 11.—The ice is still holding in the river at Selkirk, Isaac Creek and Coffee Creek with jams at Stewart River. The weather remains warm.

Vancouver Police Commission Asks Ottawa to Allow Deputy Chief of Mounties to Act There

VANCOUVER, May 11.—Granting the applications of the Chief of Police Long and Detective Sergeant McLaughlin for relief from duty the Board of Police Commissioners yesterday decided to request that the second in command of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police be authorized to act as chief of the Vancouver force until the present inquiry is ended. Until Ottawa announces its decision on the request of the commission, Deputy Chief Leatherdale will act as head of the department.

POST OFFICE NOT BETTER THAN STABLE

THAT WAS THE STATEMENT OF J. C. BRADY IN FEDERAL HOUSE YESTERDAY

URGED NEW BUILDING

OTTAWA, May 11.—Appropriations totalling \$311,600 for public works in British Columbia were adopted by the House of Commons last night. Need for new public buildings in Prince Rupert was emphasized strongly by J. C. Brady, Conservative member for Skeena, who declared that the present building was out of date and unhygienic. Last Christmas the building proved so unsatisfactory that mail could not be handled properly at all.



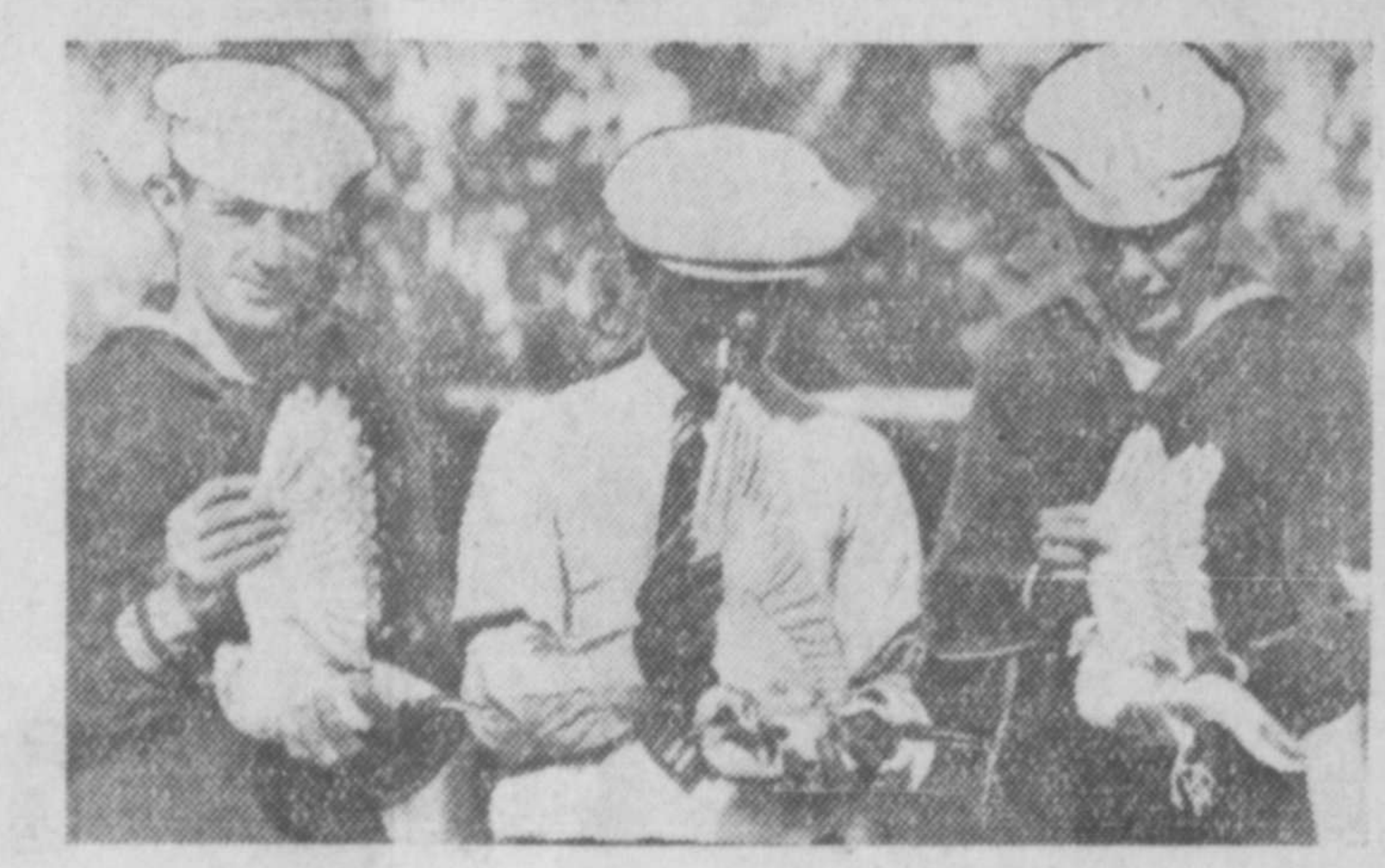

Local Hospital Needs Set Forth Clearly by Lady Superintendent

Summary of Excellent Address Delivered at Rotary Luncheon Yesterday by Miss Jean Harrison

Also a nursery and children's ward that are sufficient for present purposes but there is need of a diet kitchen, a laundry, a tubercular ward, more space for the men's ward, more private rooms. Also the isolation hospital is a mere shack. There is no tennis court for the nurses. This summarises the needs here as given by Miss Jean Harrison, lady superintendent of the local hospital, who addressed the Rotary Club yesterday on hospitals and their work.

Dr. John Harold Greig, in an address at a missionary gathering at Woking, Surrey. Speaking generally of the British people abroad Bishop Greig said the conditions under which Englishmen are living were a serious reproach to the Church at home.

AROUND PRINCE RUPERT

Granby Co. Opening up New Mine Near Anyox—Is Also Increasing Power Facilities—Activity at Dalhousie Mine

The Granby Co. has completed all plans for the operation this year of the Bonanza mine which lies about two miles from Anyox near the head of Granby Bay.

H. L. Batten, Vancouver mining engineer, who recently visited the Topley field in the interior is now at Alice Arm making an examination of the La Rose property.

Plans are being made for an intensive program of development work on the Dalhousie mine at Stewart which recently received the tram line which was formerly used on the Rocher de Boule mine at Hazelton.

It is planned to employ a crew of forty men in development work when the weather permits.

The Granby Co. has decided to increase its hydro-electric power at Anyox. A small unit will be installed in place of one of the blowers used for the smelter furnaces.

Though Belmont-Surf Inlet closed its British Columbia operations in 1926 it continues to make disbursements to its shareholders from its surplus.

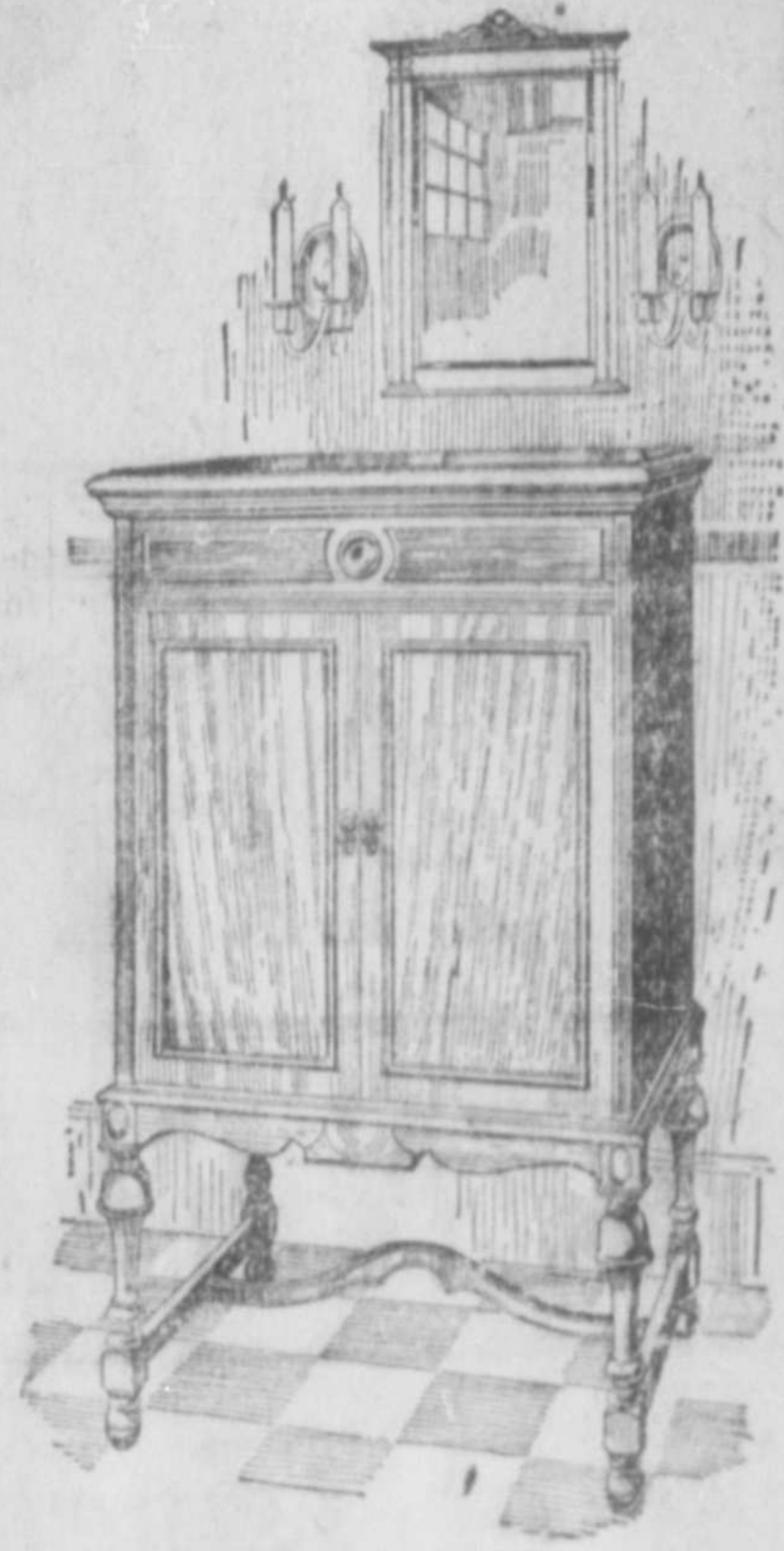

LABOR COUNCIL HOLDS MEETING

WAS VERY LARGE ATTENDANCE—VARIOUS MATTERS OF LOCAL INTEREST DISCUSSED AT GATHERING

There was a very large attendance of delegates at the regular monthly meeting of the Prince Rupert Trades & Labor Council which was held last night in Carpenters' Hall. President S. D. Macdonald occupied the chair and considerable business was taken up pertaining to the welfare of labor in the city.

Support was given a proposition from B. Clark of Chicago who is issuing a Union labor chart in this city.

No action was taken in regard to a letter from the International Bible Students' Association which sought cooperation in its fight against the ban placed upon it for radio broadcasting by the federal government. The communication was received and filed.

A letter from the Canadian branch of the League of Nations requesting co-operation in putting over a drive for membership was concurred in and the local council will give all the support possible to the campaign.

It was decided to meet with a request from the Dominion Labor Research Bureau for support. Membership will be taken in the organization for six months as an experiment.

A report was received from the Bakers' Union stating that all three bakeries in the city had recently signed up with the Union but that one was not living up to the agreement. The secretary will communicate with the particular shop in question and, unless the agreement is adhered to, it will be placed on the unfair list.

The Plumbers' Union reported success in a recent strike designed to force a wage scale of \$9 per day.

The Carpenters' Union reported that negotiations were being successfully carried out with a view to having the local wage scale raised from \$7 to \$7.50 per day.

A committee was appointed to look into a case under the Workmen's Compensation Act arising out of a recent accident on one of the grain boats at the elevator.

The secretary was authorized to communicate with the management of the Big Bay Lumber Co.'s sawmill at Seal Cove requesting that as many white men as possible be employed in the plant.

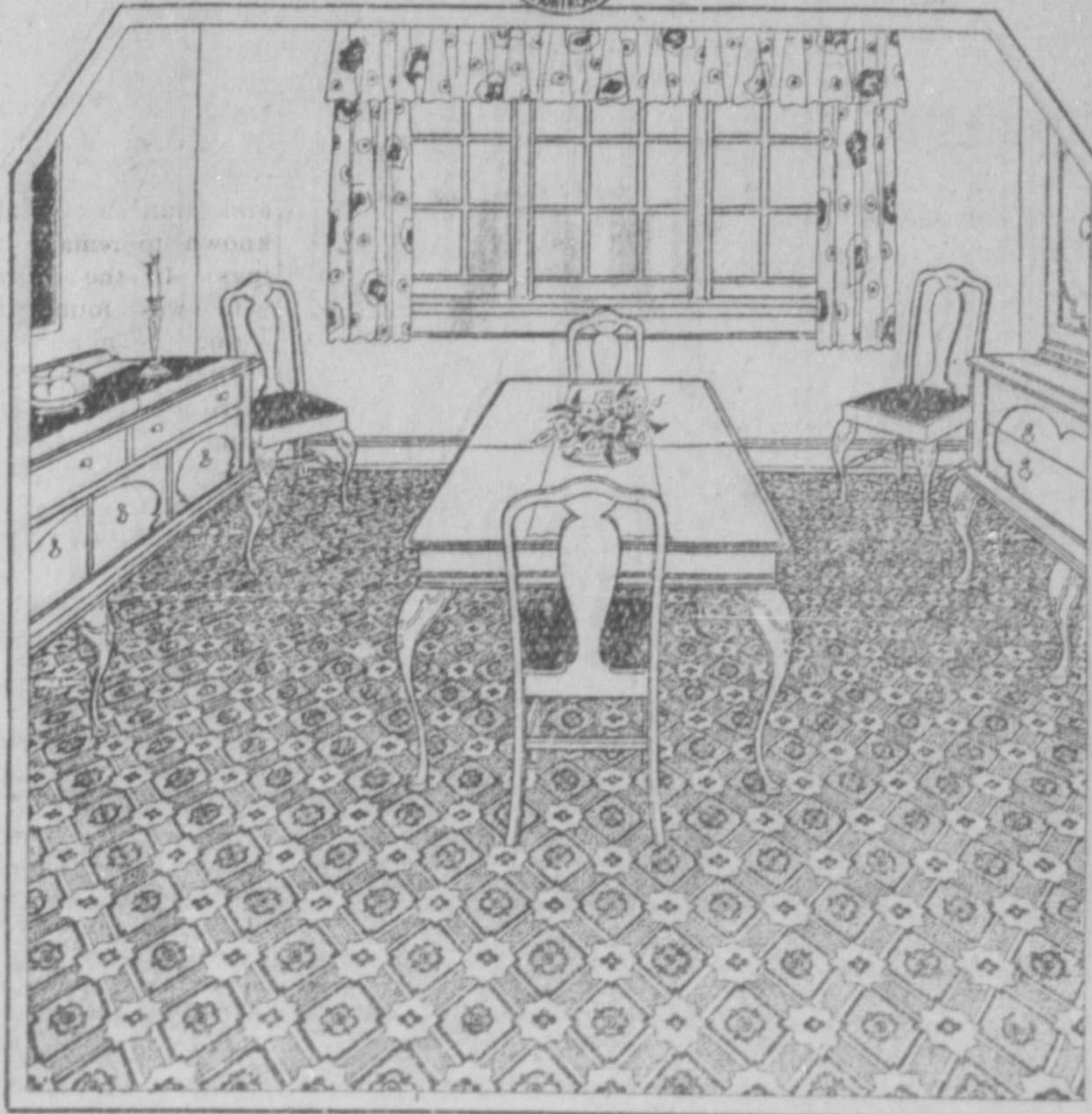

SPORT CHAT

Out of the seven or more world championship fights that Tex Rickard is arranging for the summer amusement of the customers there should come one or two new champions' writes Henry L. Farrell. Rickard is almost bound by word to produce two or three new champions out of his extravagant program, for in one of those moments when he becomes author he named some of the boys who are now booked to work for him as being overdue for a successor. Last winter when he turned to his typewriter and pounded out his All-American team, Rickard hedged. He said Samuel Lazzaro of Baltimore and Samuel Mandello of Rockford were found on his team, but they wouldn't be there very long. It was a rather broad inference that Lazzaro and Mandello were booked expertly for a soaking out from under the champion's crown.

Lazzaro, better known as Joe Dundee, the welterweight champion, and Mandello, who dropped the "o" in his name long before he became light-weight champion, are among the several champions who will toil soon in defense of their titles. It is to be wondered if their employer still has such regard for their chances to escape annihilation. Mandello probably will be the only one of the seven champions who will not enter the ring a nice favorite to win. His match against Jimmy McLarnin is the only one of the seven that looks like a real competition and McLarnin is one of those products of sentimental New York friends like Jack Delaney was.

Because of this great fight that New York has taken to McLarnin and because the young Irishman is a bitter of known power, the lightweight championship fight on May 17 probably will be the artistic and financial success of the season. Playing the champion, in cases where the champion is any good at all, is held to be the safest risk in pugilistic betting operations. That goes for Mandell, too, as we believe that the handsome little lightweight champion is one of the most under-estimated and most underrated fighters of the day. McLarnin is a nice little fellow and all that but Mandell ought to be too smart and too fast for him. Some say that Mandell will have to run to win, but so does our Gene.

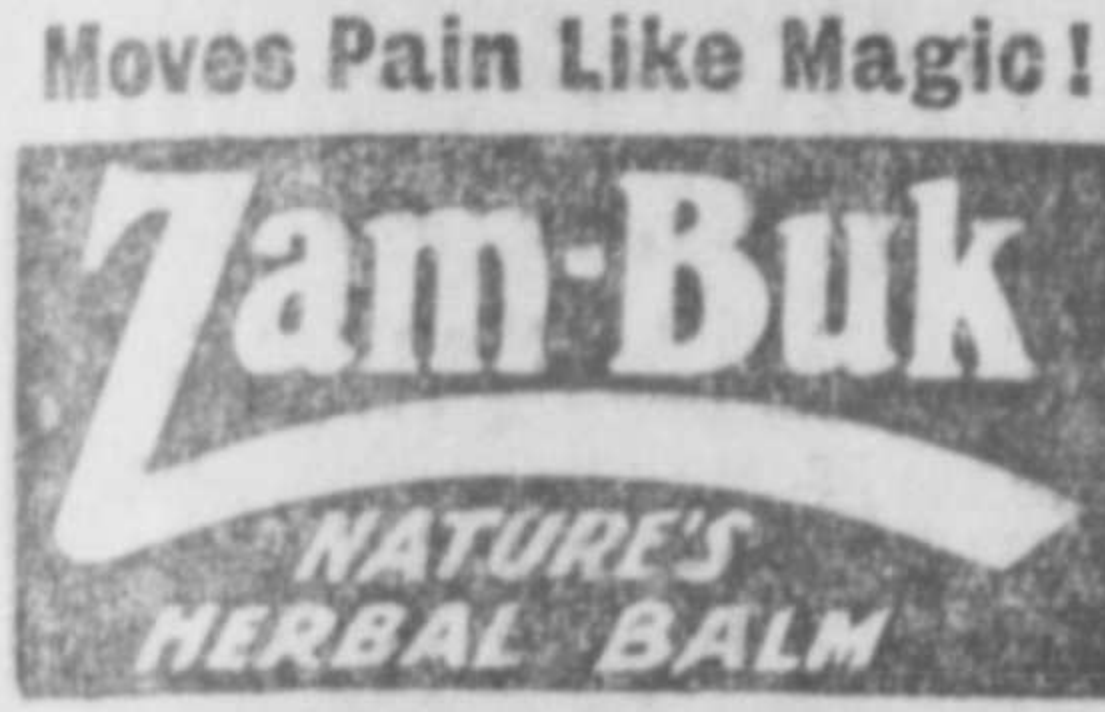

BISHOP LLOYD AND BRITISH IMMIGRATION

SITUATION IN REGARD TO AUSTRALIA NOT ENCOURAGING TO THOSE WHO ADOPT POLICY

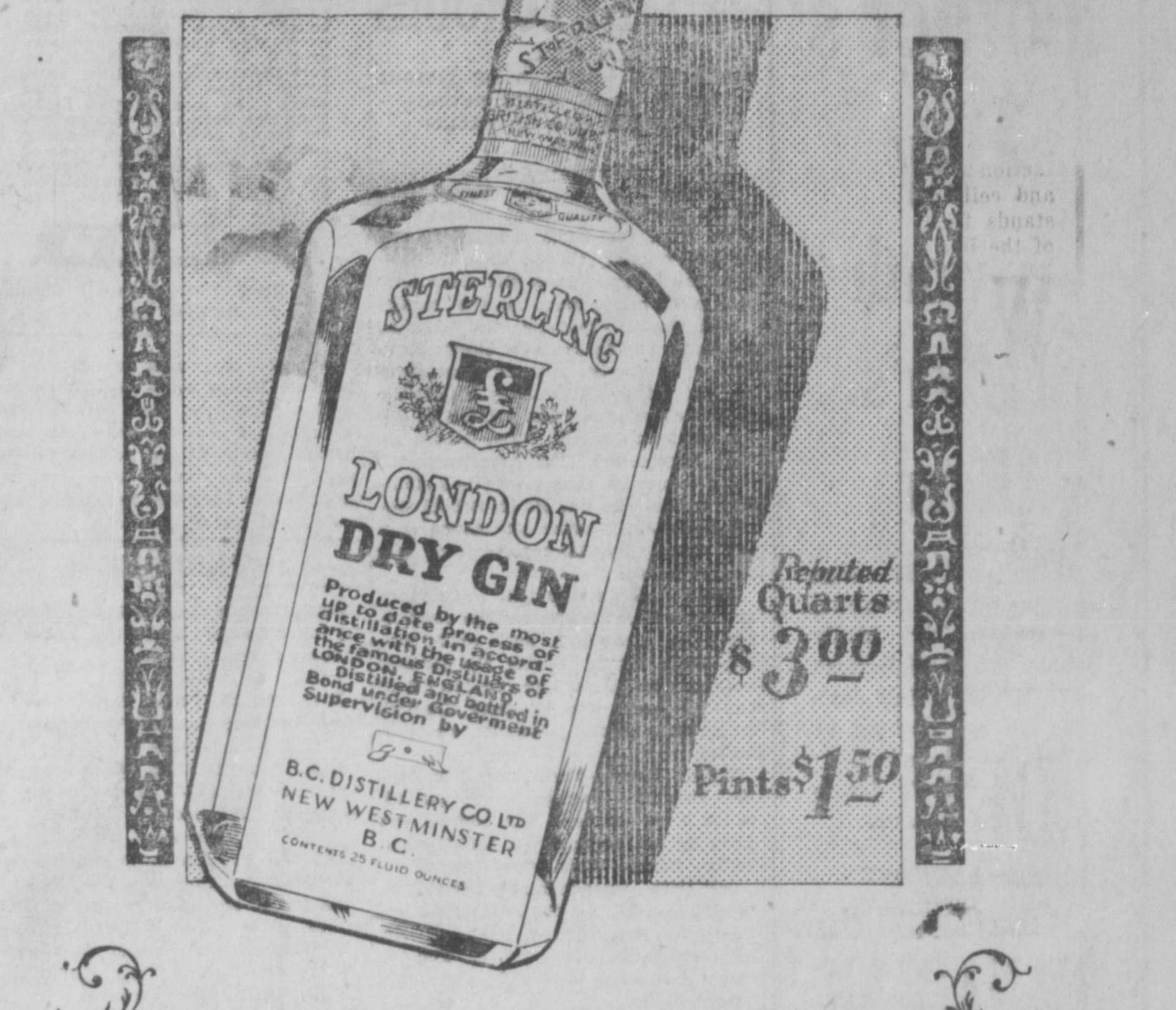
OTHER GOOD SETTLERS SOUTHERN CONTINGENT NEVER YET RECEIVED AS MANY BRITISH AS CANADA IN SAME YEAR

(Winnipeg Free Press)
The Free Press makes no apology to its readers for the demands upon their attention which it makes in relation to the matter of immigration; since this is perhaps the most important question which is today calling for public consideration. There has been set forth in our columns during the past few months a great variety of views; and to these we add today a characteristic letter from Bishop Lloyd, of Saskatchewan.

Bishop Lloyd has been for years critical, if not intolerant, of all immigration other than British; he is a firm believer in the English-speaking race as a "chosen" people so far as this country's future is concerned; immigrants from Europe are inferior; and if they merge with the existing English-speaking population the result will be a "mongrel" people. And he points to Australia, with its "White British Australia" as its motto, as the true exemplar for Canada. He is somewhat unfortunate in his use of statistics, having accepted without question certain statements of comparative figures of British emigration to Canada and Australia current in the Canadian press which, as the Free Press has shown from official authorities, are wholly wrong. We cannot but think that Bishop Lloyd, who has been writing and speaking about immigration matters for years past, ought to have known that these figures were inaccurate. Not once in the last quarter of a century in any single year has British emigration to Australia exceeded British emigration to Canada. Last year British emigrants to Australia numbered 36,577; for the year ending March 31, British emigration to Canada totalled 50,872.

EMIGRANTS RELUCTANT
Australia is facing, just as Canada is facing, the reluctance of Britishers to emigrate to these countries. Four out of every five British emigrants to Australia last year received government assistance. This inability to get British immigration is beginning to create a difficult situation in Australia. For fifty years Australia has been counting upon reinforcements from the parent stock to fill her vast spaces and they have not come. James A. Proude, in 1895, recorded Australia's expectations of future growth in population. "The Australian Colonies," he wrote in Oceania, "have grown with a rapidity which justifies extension expectations for them. Mr. Service (premier of Victoria) sees before him at the end of half a century, an Australia with fifty million inhabitants; a second United States of itself, in the Southern Hemisphere." Forty-three of the fifty years have passed and the population of Australia has just turned six millions. Meanwhile the landless people of

continental Europe are knocking at Australia's door and demanding admittance. "The stream of foreign immigrants into Australia rises; the number of British entrants grows less," writes the Melbourne correspondent of the London Times; and he adds:

ITALIANS GOOD
"Last year 38,577 British immigrants entered Australia, as against 12,026 from other countries; the great majority of the foreign element of Italians. There is, obviously, nothing fortuitous in the causes that have produced such an effect. The truth is that the Italians, as a whole, adapt themselves more readily to country life in Australia than the prospective British settler so far been able to do. They are not assisted immigrants, for they pay full passage money from Italy to Australia. But each new arrival is assisted and befriended, with lodging and advice, by his compatriots until he is able to fend for himself. Moreover, as a race they show a patience and a determination to 'make good' that provoke mingled envy and admiration. The foreigner and notably the Italian immigrant, speedily finds a home and a job for himself, thanks to the helpful spirit of his fellow-countrymen. It is hardly to be wondered at, therefore, that the Italian is a formidable competitor in the apparently tardy race for settlement."

The portent of the increased emigration to Australia of southern Europeans is forcing discussion in Australia and elsewhere of the possibility of keeping a continent empty indefinitely awaiting people who do not come. "It is," says the Tablet of London, "against justice and humanity for a dominant but slowly multiplying race to shut undeveloped territories against law-abiding and industrious immigrants whose home-lands are over-crowded. We have pointed out that selfishness of this kind was one of the very few grounds on which Sir Thomas More's Utopians would go to war. Italians become good and loyal citizens in Argentina, in the U.S.A., and elsewhere. Are we to understand that Australia is less hospitable than North and South America to strangers and less clever in assimilating new human elements?" The British News thinks Australia is attempting the impossible in trying to fill the island continent with British stock. Those who would prevent all but British immigration must, it says, "in the final result decide between the natives of Southern Europe or the Japanese. If the land is not filled by the people who can live and thrive and increase on it, it will in the end be descended upon from Japan, and the idea of a white Australia will vanish forever."

NO SLUTION YET
We quote these statistics and these opinions for the enlightenment of those who, like Bishop Lloyd, think that Aus-

tralia has solved the problem that is disturbing Canada and has before it a future without a cloud. In fact, Australia is beginning to sense a future problem which may prove more difficult of solution than that with which Canada is confronted. Here are two countries capable of absorbing large accretions of population, both desirous of receiving British settlers and spending vast sums of money in encouraging immigration of this class. But it comes in mere driplets in proportion to the effort expended to obtain it. Meanwhile immigrants from the continent of Europe are looking for opportunities for paying their own way to this country and resorting to subterfuges in order to find a channel through which they can find an entrance. Shall we let them come in, subject to restrictive regulations as to the classes permitted to enter imposed by the government, or shall we put up the bars? Bishop Lloyd and others sharing his views who have been giving evidence before the Parliamentary Committee have no doubt as to the right policy; but it is by no means certain that their drastic proposals will be regarded by parliament or the country as meeting the situation.
