Harold McCracken Finds Mummies of Stone Age Men at Aleutian Islands Enclosed Wooden Two-chambered Vault

NEW YORK, July 6 .- Harold McCracken, head of the expedition of the American museum of natural history to the Aleutian Islands, in a special radio and telegraph message to New York Times, says the expedition believes it has found the mummified remains of stone age men.

Four mummified bodies, three adults and one infant, were found on the summit of an almost inaccessible island along with their clothing, domestic articles, hunting weapons.

The tomb bore evidence of Mongolian influence but there was nothing to indicate contact with ancient or modern civilization. The vault in which the bodies were found, was well shaped and mortised, drift logs held together by bone nails and had been wedged into a rock crevice on an almost unscalable peak.

The vault was divided into two parts, in one of which was a man evidently of high standing, and in the other the bodies of the adults and a child. The body of the ancient ice king was clothed in otter skins surmounting a shirt of bird skins, both elaborately decorated.

Wrapped around the body was a cloth of skins of northern animals surmounted by a layer of woven grass. The whole was enclosed in parchment like a layer of sea lion intestine.

WHY MAKE POOR PAY?

Hon. S. F. Tolmie, leader of the Conservatives, declares that if he should form a government at Victoria, he will do away with the succession duty tax. The succession duties are taxes on rich people's estates and are among the most just of all taxes. The higher they are the better. If all the countries of the world could agree to do the same, when the prize was won the game the state should take a very large percentage of the estate of all was over. people who lie, than doing away with much of the privilege of wealth. As it is at present impossible for the nations to agree on such joint action, the tax has to be kept reasonably low in order not to keep people out of the country. That seems to be the policy of the B.C. government. It is to be hoped that they will not be influenced by Dr. Tolmie and abolish it altogether. Probably the most just of all taxes are the income tax and the inheritance tax. They are taxes on the people who are best able to pay and those with small incomes are not affected.
