VICTORIA, March 13. — Readjustment of the Anglo-Japanese treaty, repatriation of Chinese and Japanese residents now here and new restrictions to prevent the entry of other Orientals in Canada is proposed in a joint resolution filed in the Legislature last night on which both parties have been collaborating during the past two weeks in an effort to meet the Oriental problem.

With regard to repatriation of Orientals, the resolution suggests that this be confined to such number of Orientals here as will reduce the proportion of Orientals in Canada to the Canadian population to a level with the proportion of Canadians in China and Japan respectively to the population of China and Japan.

The resolution standing in the name of Dugald Mc-Pherson, Liberal, amends and strengthens the resolutions already placed on the order paper by Davis of Cowichan and Kennedy of North Okanagan, calling for expulsion of Orientals, and cancellation of certain provisions of the Japanese Pact.





TSING PLANE

For some years a small plane has been taken out by one of the ships in order to sesses in the search for the cealing herds. This year an Avro Aviani plane in charge of Colin Caldwell, a Canadian aviator, will operate from the land, and the results of his expeditions over the icefields will be communicated to the ships by wireless. Caldwell is first making a search for the sealing herds in the Gulf of St. Lawrence, and will then transfer to the north east coast to take up the search for the main patch which year after year comes out of the north on the breast of the Arctic Current. The largest of the seals found in the

waters off the Newfoundland coast is the "Square Plippers," which attain a length of ten of twelve fect and a weight when fully grown of fifteen hundred pounds. By far the most numerous, however, are the Harps and Hoods. The young of the latter are known as the "Whitecoats." These seals breed off this coast some time in Pebruary. At birth the young weigh about eight pounds. When the season for killing opens about a month later they weigh from forty-five to fifty pounds. During that time they live on the ice, suckling their mother, which shows the greatest solicitude for their

safety. Rifles are used to kill the Square Flipper. The Harps and Hoods are despatched by a blow on the smout with a wooden handled gaff which is also used to drag the "tow" to the "pany" (the heap of pelts). As soon as the seal is killed its skin with the thick layer of fat which lies beneath it is with a few strokes of the skulping knife removed from the carcase. The largest load of pelts ever brought into port was by Captain Abram Kean in 1910, when he halled for 49,969. Captain Kean is at present Commodore




