NEW COUNCIL OF FIVE FOR PEACE WORK

Big Four Eliminated Now That Important Work is Completed.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.) Paris, July 3.—An announcement is made by Premier Clemenceau, Minister Balfour, Secretary of State Lansing, Foreign Minister Pichon, Baron Makino, Viscount Chinda of Japan and Foreign Minister Tittoni of Italy that it is decided to constitute a new council of five to consist of Foreign Minister Arthur J. Balfour of England, Secretary Lansing of the United States, M. Pichon, foreign minister of France, Foreign Minister Tittoni of Italy and Baron Makino, head of the Japanese delegation.

The new council will temporarily assume direction of peace conference affairs. A council of ten will not be constituted present.

Neither of the members of the Big Four are included in the newly constituted body.

BOXERS READY FOR THE FRAY

Intense Interest Taken in Coming Big Boxing Match at Toledo.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.) Toledo, July 3.—Both Willard and Dempsey ceased hard work on Monday and are doing nothing but shadow boxing until they enter the ring on Friday afternoon at three o'clock.

There has been a great influx of population into Toledo as a result of the match. All rooming houses and hotels are full and tents have been erected to handle the immense crowds.

In spite of the police raids, gambling houses are running full blast and the city is gay as it has ever before been.

FOREST FIRES IN THE LAKE REGION

Sault Ste. Marie, July 2.—A dozen towns are threatened with destruction from forest fires raging west of here. The places which are in danger are Trout Lake, Race, Brimley, Heney, Willers, Strongs, Ozerk, Gilchrist, Johnsonberg, and Dick.

Hundreds of men are out fighting the flames which are being carried by a high wind.

SAD DROWNING AT SALT LAKE LAST EVENING

James Mairs Victim of Upsetting Canoe—Companion Unable to Save Him.

A very sad drowning fatality occurred at the Salt Lake last evening when the canoe upset in which James Mairs, the nineteen year old son of Walter Mairs, was sitting. Early in the evening Jim and a friend, Pollock, canoed over the bay and then portaged their craft into the lake.

From later happenings it appears that the boys undressed at the head of the lake and then came down to the float to have a swim. Jim Mairs could not swim although when found had a bathing suit on, having come over with the full intention of going in bathing, since conditions have been so improved for learners. He was in the bow of the canoe and Pollock was standing on the float with the rope in his hand waiting to go into the water to have a tow around. Suddenly, it is not exactly known just how, the canoe turned over and the boy disappeared in the lake. The man on the float came to his rescue but was unable to bring the helpless lad out who was struggling to get a grip of the boat. Pollock had to come ashore without the boy as he could not swim very well himself.

Called Help.

There was one man there at the time of the accident but he could not dive so he ran down to the point where help was obtained. Messrs. Scott, Gibbons and Noble came running up the path undressing all the way but it was already a long time since the victim had gone under. The body was about forty feet from the diving stand and it took a great effort to get out that far. However the rescuers persevered and at last Mr. Gibbons caught a glimpse of something white in the water. He did not have enough strength left to get it that time but on the next attempt, having ascertained the position, was successful.

Immediately first aid and artificial respiration were applied but it was of no avail. Mrs. Humble worked tirelessly for an hour with the drowned boy but the body had been too long in the water. Hot stones were applied and everything possible done before the arrival of Dr. Cade who had been brought from town by J. Myhill-Jones on the Alice B. The doctor said that four minutes was long enough to be in the water to drown a person and as Mairs had been in fully three quarters of an hour, very little could be done.

Body Brought Here.

The body was brought to the city last night and is in Haynor Bros. morgue pending further inquiry into the accident. As this is the first fatality at the Salt Lake, Prince Rupert's popular bathing resort, naturally a spell of gloom has spread over the city since last evening.

TURKISH ARMIES HAVE BEEN FORMED

Organized Under Generals Who Refused to Obey Orders Recently.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.) Paris, July 3.—Reports come from Constantinople that three armies have been formed in Asiatic Turkey. They are led by three generals who refused to obey orders on Thursday last. Just what is the object of the formation of the armies is not stated but it is undoubtedly a revolutionary movement.

STRIKE CALLED FOR TOMORROW BY COMMITTEE

Second Attempt to Get All Union Men of City to Quit Their Work.

Unless there is some change in the situation in the meantime the strike committee will call out all the supporting union men of the city tomorrow at 5 p. m., the only exceptions being the cold storage engineers and the Shawatlans engineers. Each of these are exempt because in one case there would be a danger of spoiling an immense quantity of food fish and in the other the city power and light would be affected.

The city electricians will remain in for the present.

The committee held a meeting with the superintendent of the G. T. P. yesterday, when that official explained that conditions would not allow of the return of some of the men just now, but that they would be taken on as soon as there were places for them. The strike committee wanted the men who had been taken on during the strike removed in order to allow the strikers to return. As a result there was a deadlock and at a meeting this morning it was decided to call a strike.

It is understood that most of the carpenters in town will cease work, for a time at any rate. The engineers are also likely to go out.

TWO THOUSAND AT THE HOLIDAY GAMES

The committee which arranged for the fine program of sports on Dominion Day are to be congratulated on the success of the celebration. Weather conditions were ideal and this brought out a very large attendance at the ball games in the afternoon. A very close estimate from the gate receipts places the afternoon's crowd at 1,550, counting adults and children. About two hundred children went around by the reservoir and also a great many grown ups who were just patriotic enough to climb over all the rocks and stumps rather than pay the paltry 25 cents asked at the gate. This would nearly bring the number up to 2,000 which is a record indeed for Prince Rupert since pre-war days. The evening attendance was nearly 600.

No financial statement can be published yet as all the collections have not been made. This will be delayed for a few days, owing to the absence of Ben Self who has a list of the donations. The booth was very successful and paid well, as also did the other side attractions, namely the knocking down of the "nigger babies."

CONFERENCE TO UNIFY ALL LEGISLATION

Suggestion Made in Report of the Mathers Commission Recently Tabled.

Ottawa, July 3.—In connection with the report of the Mathers Commission which has been tabled in the House of Commons it is recommended by the majority that if the Dominion Parliament has not the power to legislate as proposed, a conference of premiers and other representatives of the provincial governments and also representatives of labor men and employers be called in Ottawa in order to reach unanimity of plans and also to unify the present provincial and dominion legislation bearing on the relations between employers and employees.

Prevent Profiteering To Prevent Unrest.

Many Prince Rupert people feel very strongly about the necessity of preventing profiteering in food and other necessities of life. The cost of living has become so high that a person earning small wages finds himself at his wits' end to secure a livelihood. It is bad for the man who earns good wages, but it is an impossible condition for the poorly paid man.

Some local organization or organizations should certainly do their bit in urging upon the Dominion Government the need for radical action. Possibly the Unionist Association is the one that should move in the matter, but it is possible that the local Liberal Association, the Conservative Association, the City Council or the Board of Trade could possibly add their mite to the general pressure and thus help to bring about a change. Much of the general unrest is due to the fact that the people consider they are being swindled out of part of their rightful heritage, and there is a good deal of truth in what they think. They see no hope for a change under present conditions and that is the reason some are advocating revolution.

The way to reassure the restive is for everyone who favors good government to use his influence to have the wrongs righted. There are wrongs as the parliamentary committee at Ottawa has shown. Whether the present Government has its skirts sufficiently clean to deal with this matter is not at all a sure thing. What is sure is that the people who are feeling the pinch most are speaking in no uncertain tone. Let all join with them in demanding redress.

Man in the Street Cannot Understand.

The man in the street fails to understand how it is that if he takes a dollar from a shopkeeper's till he has to go to prison for a year, while a manager of a company can steal money by watering stock or other manipulations and be an honored member of the community. The man feels himself helpless and so turns to Bolshevism or any other ism that seems to offer relief. Probably the remedy is worse than the cure, but he does not see that. It is the listless attitude of the general public towards these questions that makes him feel it is useless to act in any but a revolutionary manner. If he saw that steps were being taken to bring about a change and that he was being treated fairly and squarely he would not look around for extreme illusory means of obtaining redress.

Unfortunate Accident At the Salt Lakes.

The unfortunate accident at the Salt Lakes last evening is deeply regretted by everyone and The News joins with the rest of the community in expressing sympathy with the bereaved family.

The sad affair brings to the attention of everyone the desirability of everyone learning to swim and also the need of care when handling boats of any kind and especially canoes. No one should ride in a canoe who is unable to save himself in case of an upset. The craft is so frail that a false step may well prove fatal.

Even with larger boats a number of cases have recently come to notice where swimmers have found it difficult to save themselves in the cold water of the harbor, when they fell in with their clothes on. The Salt Lakes provide the facilities for learning to swim, but care must be taken that they do not prove a trap for the unwary.

International Games Interesting.

An American ball team visited this city Tuesday and tomorrow the local boys are to play a return series at Ketchikan. While Rupert won the first round, she had the advantage over the visitors, in that they were tired from the trip and that they were unable to bring one or two of their best men. It will be interesting to follow the results tomorrow.

International events of this kind tend to improve the good feeling that always exists between the peoples of Alaska and British Columbia. The more we intermingle the fewer differences we shall find. We have much to learn from our near neighbors, especially along the line of developing the community spirit.

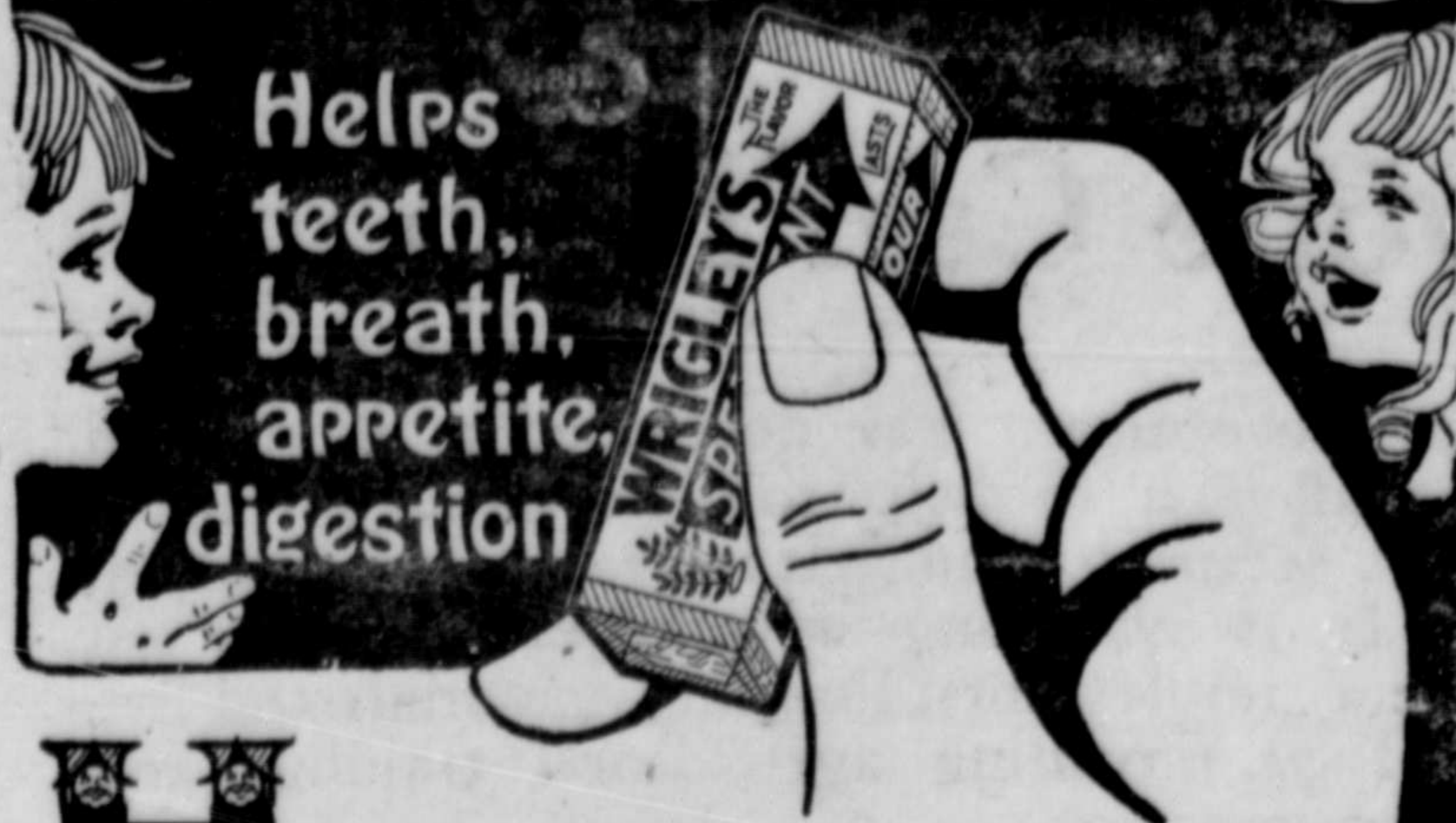

RECORD NUMBER OF NEW OIL COMPANIES IN UNITED STATES

According to a compilation made by the New York Journal of Commerce, 199 new oil companies with a total authorized capitalization of \$202,505,000 were chartered during the month of May in the United States. This compares with a previous high record of \$163,000,000, established in February, 1916, and is almost double the indicated investment for April of this year, which amounted to \$104,469,000. In the first five months of the current year 610 oil companies have been started, with an aggregate authorized capital of \$472,996,000, compared with 385 companies, representing an indicated investment of \$212,062,000, in the corresponding months of 1918. During the entire year 1918, only 820 oil companies were launched, and their aggregate authorized capitalization appeared as \$430,840,000.

The current year seems likely to exceed the high total of \$840,219,400, established in 1917, when America's entry into the war furnished the stimulus. The monthly average to date is more than \$20,000,000 higher than in that year, and if the present activity, which shows no sign of abatement, continues for a couple of months more the record is almost certain to be broken. The compilation includes only those companies having an authorized capital of \$50,000 or greater.—Financial Post.

MARKET GLUTTED WITH SARDINES AND SALMON

Importation of Foreign Packed
Varieties by Licence Only
Until Local Situation
Is Relieved.

While the foreign side of the work of the Canadian Trade Commission now involves much detailed work in the placing of the orders received under the Dominion credits abroad and in following the manufactured articles on their line from the factory to the seaboard, the domestic side of its work is not overlooked. It has now been made necessary for importers of either sardines or canned salmon to obtain individual licenses from the Canadian trade commission for any consignments they may receive. This is a measure to ensure the consumption so far as possible of Canadian fish in our Canadian markets. Its importance lies in the fact, first, that large stocks of salmon and sardines are in hand on the Pacific and Atlantic coasts, and in the absence of movement for these, there are some thousands of people out of work; while secondly, these fish sold at home are retailed at lower prices than the imported brands, though of higher nutritive value. There are about 300,000 cases, 48 pounds to the case, of salmon lying idle in Vancouver. The fish is of a light color and large importations were being made from the United States of a pink-fleshed salmon, though of lower nutrition, simply because in the last few years the taste for a pink salmon has been fostered by wide-reaching advertisement.

BALL PLAYERS GO TO WIN FRESH LAURELS

Early this morning a very representative party of Prince Rupert baseball enthusiasts left by launch for Ketchikan where they will play two return matches. The team is in the best of condition and promise to show the Alaskans just how to play ball even though they have to wait until the tide goes out.

In both matches played here on Dominion Day the Prince Rupert team won the honors. Now the Ketchikan players are fully prepared to put up a big fight against losing on their own grounds. Ben Self accompanied the party and will see that there is nothing put over the Rupert youngsters. Manager Fraser is fully confident in the team which made such a good showing on Tuesday and assures the fans that when the rest come through that they will be all the more pleased with their team which has won glory on a strange diamond.

The party will return on Saturday.

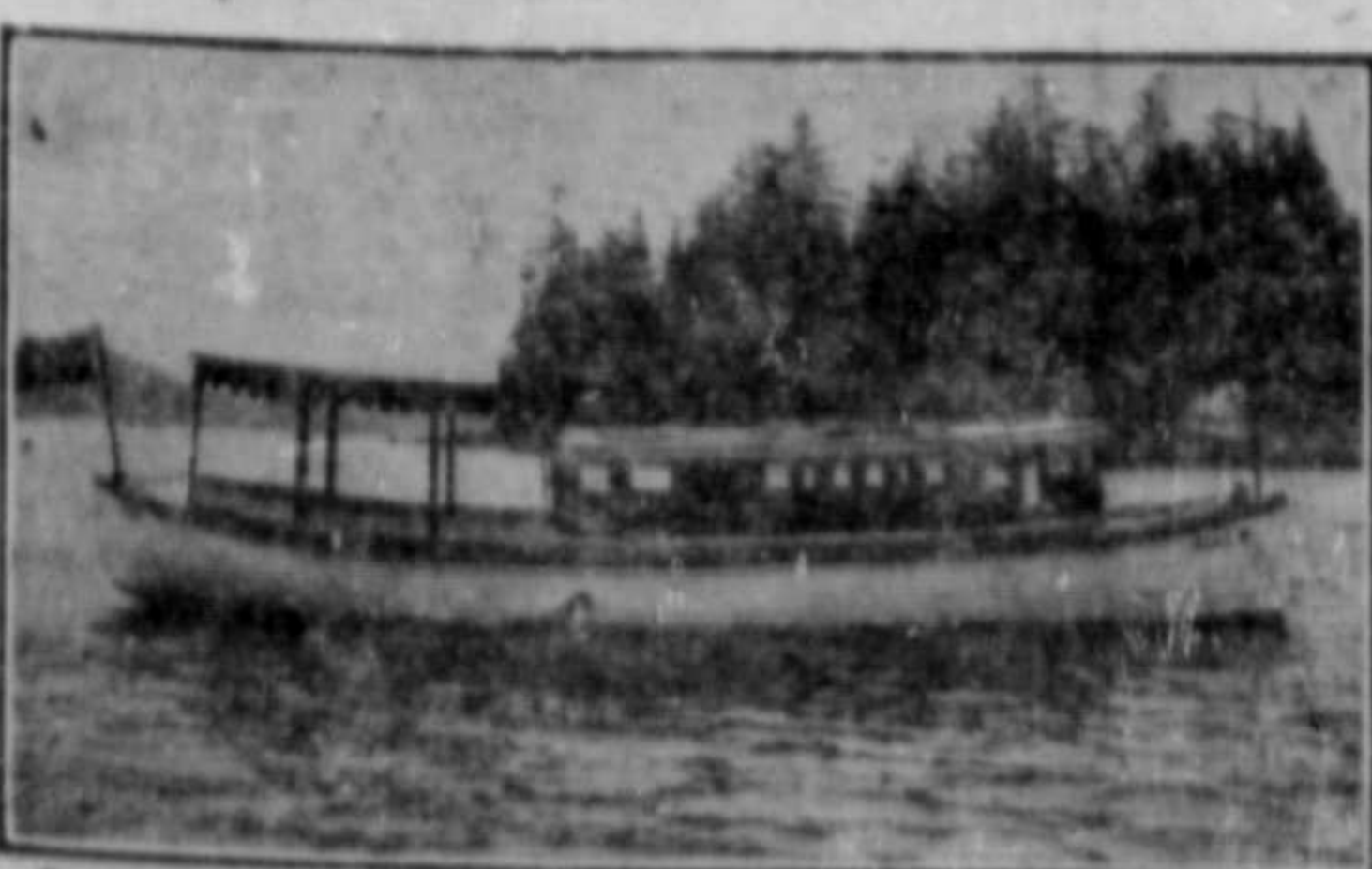

One of the men who went to Seattle with his fish told a News representative that the dealers there had given them the boot pretty badly. For number-one fish they paid twelve cents, but they culled the catch to such an extent that half of it was number two, which sold at about half that price.

"There is no place like Prince Rupert for selling fish," was the final conclusion of this fisherman. "Here you get a square deal usually. It is my last trip to Seattle for many a day to come."

FARM LOANS for SOLDIERS

How Everyone Can Help

THE Government has developed a liberal and broad plan to help soldiers settle on farms. It is securing land. It is granting substantial loans. It is obtaining advantageous prices on equipment, implements, building materials and live stock. It is providing agricultural training and farming supervision.

That is as much as the Government itself can do. But the plan needs more. It needs a community spirit of co-operation.

Already Provincial Governments, Universities, Farmers' Associations, and Veterans' Associations are giving valuable assistance. Many manufacturers and sellers of farm supplies have agreed to allow the soldier settlers special prices. Many successful farmers have willingly worked on Qualification Committees which have to pass on the applicants. Men who have had experience in lending money on farm property are serving on Advisory Loan Committees, judging land values.

But even such practical assistance is not enough. In each community farmers can be of real service to the soldier settler. They can give him advice about local conditions. They can lend him an extra horse or plough, give him a day's help at seeding or harvest time, and extend to him that friendly, neighborly, respectful spirit which he deserves.

In this way Canada is performing a double duty. It is discharging, as far as possible, the debt we owe to our soldiers; and it is adding to the country's chief industry a body of competent, willing producers.

BORDEN HOLDS SHARES IN BIG COLD STORAGE

Stock Paid Fifty Per Cent Dividend Yet New Stock Was Issued at 75.

Ottawa, July 1.—The name of Sir Robert Borden figured here in the cost of living committee of the House of Commons. When the strike began in Winnipeg there was much noise over the fact, corroborated officially later, that there were two and a half million pounds of products safely locked up in cold storage in Winnipeg, while the retailers of the city were short of foodstuffs for the population of the city.

G. W. Shantz, the representative of the Manitoba Cold Storage Company, stated to the committee that it was in order for export. Some of it—probably nearly all of it—had been held since the armistice was signed.

Sir Robert Borden, according to the evidence, is one of the stockholders in the concern. He owns \$9,500 worth of the stock. The paid up stock is just over \$200,000, and the profits last year were \$113,000, or over 50 per cent.

The representative of the company was careful to say that Sir Robert "Doesn't take an active interest" in the concern, and H. H. Stevens of Centre Vancouver, remarked hastily, "So far as I can see this business seems to have been run on a pretty sound basis."

It was brought out by E. B. Devin of Wright that the authorized capital of the concern was \$300,000, of which \$218,700 had been issued. Of this sixty thousand was issued at \$75 per share, so that the paid up capital is actually \$15,000 less than it appears to be, according to the figures.

LOCAL NEWS NOTES

Improvements are now being made on the platform at the depot by the Grand Trunk. The walk is being made wider for the convenience of the public.

The annual meeting of the Prince Rupert Ladies' Hospital Auxiliary was held on Monday when the following officers were elected for the coming season:—President, Mrs. T. McClymont; vice-president, Mrs. W. H. Kerwin; secretary, Mrs. S. Darton; treasurer, Mrs. F. H. Mobley; representatives to Hospital Board, Mrs. Jarvis McLeod and Mrs. J. M. Carmichael.

Alex. Hunter has returned from Alice Arm where he has been teaching school, in order to assume his duties as secretary of the Northern British Columbia Agricultural and Industrial Association. Alex. is very well known locally, having taken a great deal of his high school and public school course in this city. Later



he finished his teacher's course at the Vancouver Normal School and has since taught in the Kootenays and at Alice Arm. The business of the fall fair is rapidly becoming more important and entries are coming in very fast from the outside points.

CARSS HOUSE WAS SOLD FOR \$5,000

Number of Real Estate Deals Put Through Recently in Spite of the Strike.

Although activities have been considerably hampered in real estate for the past two weeks owing to the strike situation, nevertheless there have been many deals put through. Agents report that there are many bona fide investors taking up the present offerings on the market with a view to building. They do not seem to have the time for speculation with the properties and are buying for the main purpose of furthering constructional activities.

One important deal has been made in the turn over of the home of the late Magistrate Carss. The selling price was \$5,000 cash and included two lots and the house. Arrangements for the purchase were made by Geo. H. Arnold, of Helgerson, Ltd., and the new owner is Olof Hanson, of Dybhavn & Hanson.

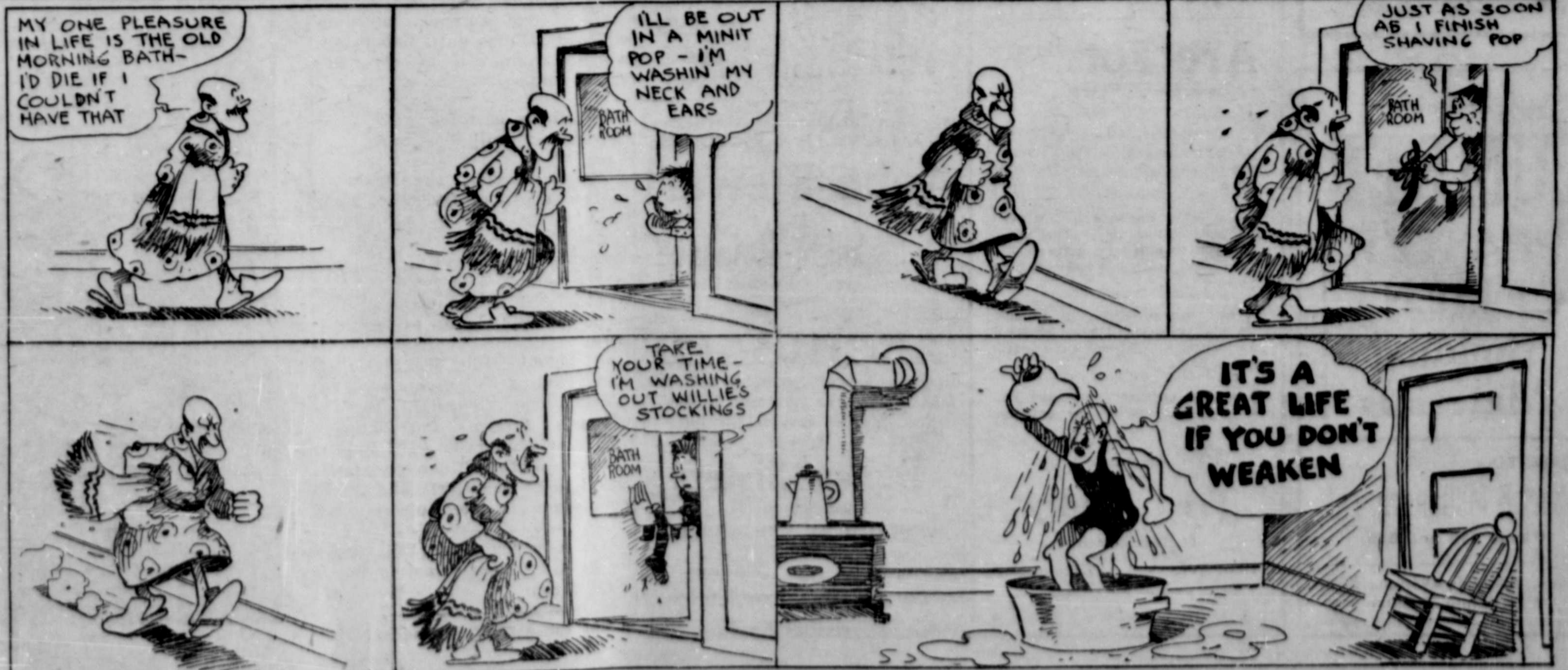
