More S.O.S. Calls Are Heard From Steamer Griffco but No Particulars of Trouble

Indicating that the vessel for the safety of which grave fears have been held was still afloat, "S.O.S." calls were again picked up from the freighter Griffco, enroute from Port Townsend to Honolulu and believed to be drifting in the Pacific at the mercy of the elements several hundred miles off the Washington coast, at 5.20 yesterday afternoon. Her calls were picked up by the s.s Aorangi, bound from Vancouver to New Zealand, and were relayed to Digby Island and other stations on the coast. No further, details were given, however, as to the distressed vessel's position or plight. Following the receipt, of yesterday afternoon's message, no further word was received up to about the middle of this morning as to the Griffco. The United States coastguard cutter Haida is scouring the Washingion coast for the vessel. Capt. Herbert Martin and all members of the crew of the Griffco hail from Seattle.

THOMAS HARDY, NOVELIST

Thomas Hardy, who died yesterday, is best known to the world as a novelist although he has also written a good deal of poetry.

Publication of "Far from the Madding Crowd," 1874, brought Rupert, it was fitting that, upon the places in fact, they compare favorably. The one for the hospital will be wired so that auxiliary boxes can be placed on each floor of the hospital.







Nelson Declared His Innocence to End and Died in Communion With Church

Quickly the trap was released and According to his spiritual advisers Nelson was resigned to his death. He mounted the scaffold and stood facing the silent group below, once or twice glancing upward. A trifle pale, he was attired in a collarless shirt, blue serge trousers and tan shoes. With hair unbrushed and face unshaven he kissed the cross before death and received communion in his cell in the morning from Father Webb and Rev. F. J. Solloway, who followed him out of the cell chanting prayers.

In spite of his experience, Executioner Ellis seemed somewhat nervous although he did not falter in the work he was visibly affected as he unstrapped the dead man's hands.

Arrainged on a dual charge that of strangling to death, Mrs. Emily Patterson and 14-year-old Lola Cowan of Winnipeg, Nelson was tried on the first indictment. Forty-four witnesses were called by the crown in welding itsi chain of circumstantial evidence. Only two were called to testify on behalf of the accused, his wife and aunt, who journeyed across half a continent from California to support the defence plea of insanity.

It required exactly six days to complete the case in which the prosecution picked up the trail of the man who later was identified as the "Dark Strangler" as he pushed his way through the state of Minnesota to Winnipeg. From the time Nelson set foot in Winnipeg, his every movement was accounted for by the police. He was identified by several second-hand clothes dealers and merchants as the man who had purchased or exchanged wearing apparel at their establish-

HEINOUS CRIME

The crown proved that on June 10 last, he entered the Patterson home in Elmwood, a suburb of Winnipeg. There he throttled to death the defenceless woman and violated her. Clothing which the investigators found lying over the mutilated body, was later dentified as apparel that Nelson had bought at a shop in the city. After
