## Buildings and Grain Crops Suffer From Rain, Wind and Lightning in South Manitoba and Saskatchewan

WINNIPEG, July 26 .- Rain, wind and electrical storms caused considerable damage in several Manitoba and Saskatchewan districts. In the southern section of Manitoba the wind broke scores of telephone and telegraph poles down, especially in the Emerson district, and wrecked small farm buildings.

At Plenty, Saskatchewan, many buildings were wrecked and at North Battleford buildings were shifted from their foundations. Hail stones broke windows in some sections. Heavy damage to the grain crops is reported. Hail a foot deep fell outside of North Battleford.

Reports of terrible destructions to crops and farm buildings continue to come in from the area which was swept by tornado yesterday. Communications have been cut off but it is believed that all Western and Central Saskatchewan suffered some damage with certain districts nigh devastated.

No loss of life has been reported yet.

#### CROP PROSPECTS FAVORABLE

Prospects for a satisfactory wheat crop have seldom, if ever, been more favorable at the end of June, than in 1928, says the Royal Bank of Canada monthly letter. The general conditions are similar to those existing in 1923, when one of the largest crops in the history of the West was produced. Recent rains have provided sufficient moisture to take care of the crops for two or three weeks to come, and very little damage has been done by cut worms, frost or floods. According to the Northwest Grain Dealers Association, the estimated acreage for 1928 in the prairie provinces amounts to 23,558,000 acres as compared with 20,879,000 acres for the large crop year of 1923 and 21,426,000 acres in 1927. This acreage, then, if correct, breaks all previous records. Although wet weather in the early spring somewhat delayed seeding, operations in the other parts of Canada, the present outlook for a good yield is favorable. In Ontario, the nay crop is expected to be short and light in yield, but in the Maritimes the prospects for a large crop are bright. Fruit trees in Ontario, British Columbia and the Maritimes have suffered comparatively little injury, and it is estimated that the fruit crop will be in excess of last year's.

#### B. C. IN THE PUBLIC EYE

Thanks largely to the energies of the Agent-General's Office, British Columbia has of late occupied more space in the British press than, perhaps, any other Canadian Province. The high class illustrated weeklies have, with all the world's news to draw upon, such heavy demands on their editorial columns that it is something of a triumph to secure from them anything like large-scale publicity. Both the Graphic and the Sphere recently published articles and photographs supplied by B. C. House featuring British Columbia from the tourist's and sportsman's point of view. The Sphere's display was a particularly fine one and attracted wide attention with its double page of letter-press and illustrations. In the curren issue of "Game and Gun" Alderman Cartwright of North Vancouver has an amusing contribution dealing with a hunting experience in the Kootenay, the publication of which must also be placed to the credit of adroit handling by B. C. House; while the "Times" always foremost with its overseas news, lately published an article on the Peace River in which it quoted with approval the settlement scheme of General McRae, the member for North Vancouver, which he advocated in the Dominion House of Commons three months ago.

#### BIG BILL'S MINE
