

DEMPSEY WINS BIG FIGHT OVER JESS WILLARD TODAY IN BIG ARENA AT TOLEDO

Toledo, at the ringside, July 4.—Jack Dempsey won in the third round here this afternoon. He entered the ring at three minutes to four and took his corner with his back to the sun. Big Bill Tate, his sparring partner, was with him.

Willard came in a minute later, seconded by Walter Menahan, Ike O'Neil, Jack Hempell and Ray O'Ricer, his business manager.

At the Ringside, Toledo, July 4.—In this greatest contest, arranged by Tex Rickard, the weather conditions are ideal with a temperature of 98 degrees in the shade. Willard entered the ring weighing 245 pounds. Dempsey weighed 195. The cost of staging this great fight is \$500,000. Willard will receive \$100,000. Dempsey will get \$27,000. The referee is Ole Pecord, of Toledo, with the alternative in Jack Skelly.

The judges are Tex Rickard and Major A. J. Biddell. The timer is Warren Barbour. It has been decided that should the judges disagree the referee shall make the final decision.

By Rounds.

The fight opened with a left in the champion's stomach. Then Dempsey knocked him down with a slam to the jaw. Willard was knocked down twice in this fashion six being counted on each occasion. Then the challenger tore in, flooring Willard the third time with a right and left to the chin.

Dempsey watched carefully, going around Willard, then hit him with three lefts in the eye. This closed Willard's eye. Willard replied with a feeble uppercut, staggering to his seat in the corner. Dempsey had to be called back into the ring in the second round as he thought he had won the fight.

The Final.

In the third round Willard entered the ring with blood pouring from his head and mouth. He managed to land one stinging uppercut but was knocked out at the end of the round and staggered to his corner bleeding profusely. The gong sounded at this moment, saving him further punishment.

There were many cries of "murder" and "stop it" from the audience. When the fourth round was announced Willard failed to rally and the decision was given against him.

The ex-champion made the statement that he never recovered

from the knockout in the first round.

Preliminaries.

In the first preliminary between Tom Boyle and Sely Epstein, they fought six rounds to a draw, in which Tom Bodkins was the referee. His decision was heartily approved by the fans.

In the second preliminary bout Whirlwind Wendt of Toledo knocked out Wop English, of Toledo, in the first round. The referee was Tom Neginly, of Cleveland.

In the third preliminary, Tom Long of Detroit was knocked out in the third round by Johnny Lewis of Toledo. The referee was Johnny Dunn, of Cleveland, who returned from overseas yesterday.

The fourth bout was fought between Johnny Rose of St. Paul and Battling Beldacca, of Brooklyn. Johnny Rose received the decision over Beldacca in the sixth round by Referee Tom Rodkin, of Pittsburg, which was very justly earned.

At the fifth preliminary bout the temperature was 115 in the shade with puffy breezes. Jack Malone of the army camp at St. Paul was given the decision over Navy Ralston of Joliet, Ill. The referee was Leu Beuman.

Bayonet and Knife.

After the preliminaries and before the big fight there was an exhibition of bayonet, pistol and knife fighting in which Referee Major Biddell took part. At this time the 80,000 seats in the arena only appeared to be half filled and the only indication that there was anything extraordinary on was the bringing in of a new mat after the preliminaries.

Sixty-five thousand people were awaiting the fight at five minutes to four. There was an aeroplane circling overhead marked Toledo Blade all ready to take pictures of the fighters as they came into the ring.

Fifty thousand spectators watched the event, a new arena having been erected especially to accommodate them in Bay View Park. The building is four times the size of that in which Jack Johnson defeated Jim Jeffries at Reno.

Tickets sold as high as sixty dollars and there were 176 press seats reserved. The various grades of seats were separated from each other by barbed wire fences, and the use of barbed wire made it impossible for anyone to climb the outer wall.

In the construction of the building 1,750,000 feet of lumber was used and two car loads of nails.

THE POLICE COURT

In the police court this morning before Magistrate McMullin Budda Sing, a Hindu, appeared for assaulting Sextokh Singh another countryman. The case was adjourned for eight days.

THIEF BROKE INTO STORE AND STOLE SHOES

Fifteen Pairs of McArthur's Best Carried Away by Burglar.

By breaking the glass panel in the back door, and drawing the bolts, entry was gained by some person or persons unknown some time during the night into McArthur's Shoe Store on Third Avenue and several pairs of shoes were stolen.

This morning when Mr. McArthur opened up his premises for the day's business the first thing that he noticed upon entering the shop was several cardboard boxes lying empty on the floor. There were fifteen boxes in all, and fifteen corresponding holes in the shelf stock, wherefrom they had been taken. But the shoes which had been in the boxes yesterday were gone, and they were among the best stock in the store.

The broken glass in the back door indicated how entry had been gained. The hole enabled the thief to pull the bolts from the inside and the lock, being an ordinary one, would present no difficulty. The thief, whoever he was, evidently had some knowledge of shoe stock, for only the best variety had been disturbed, the cheaper shoes on the shelves showing no signs of having been touched. One pair had evidently been tried on and found too small as it was left on the counter halfway down the store.

HYDROPLANE MAY BE BROUGHT HERE SOON

Several Proposals Afoot to Have Air Service From Prince Rupert.

The Exhibition Association is making an effort to have a hydroplane operating here during fair week. That in itself is interesting as not many local people have had an opportunity of taking a flier of that sort.

RETAIL CLERKS REPUDIATE LOCAL STRIKE COMMITTEE AND WITHHOLD SUPPORT

WANTS TRADES AND LABOR COUNCIL REORGANIZED AND FURTHER CONSIDERATION OF STRIKE QUESTION BEFORE ANY ACTION IS TAKEN BY THEM

There was a well attended meeting of the Retail Clerks International Association last night at the St. Andrew's Hall with the new president, J. S. Pudney, in the chair. At the close the following statement was handed out:

"We the Retail Clerks International Association, Local 111, having thoroughly discussed the present condition as to a strike in sympathy with the men now disengaged from the G. T. P. have gone on record as follows:

"That insofar as we do not recognize the present strike committee as being representative of the Trades and Labor Council with whom we were affiliated, we do not see our way clear to supporting them until such time as the Trades and Labor Council is reorganized and goes further into the matter; "And furthermore that if there are any other locals who take the same viewpoint, we should be glad to meet with them and discuss the situation."

AMERICA'S NATAL DAY IS BEING CELEBRATED

New Flag Hoisted Over U. S. Consulate Here to Mark the Occasion.

Soldiers Ask for Pensions Equalization.

One of the demands being made by the Great War Veterans of British Columbia in convention assembled is that pensions of all soldiers who have served overseas should be the same, no distinction between officers and men. This is one of the things which the Daily News has again and again drawn attention to. The matter does not admit of argument. It is so clear on the surface that no one in a democratic country can think of opposing the proposal, yet no action is being taken by the Dominion Government to make the change which is demanded.

The man who left a good job here and who returns unable to earn his living and who gets nothing like as much as a man who before going overseas was earning much less, must feel his loyalty getting a big jolt. At any rate he undoubtedly feels that he is being used unjustly.

Great Interest In Prize Fight.

It is curious what interest is taken in a fight, for that is what the Willard-Dempsey match really is. Each man is out for blood and the people as a whole glory in it. It surpasses the strike in general interest. People pay large sums to watch the game and, even though they know that the probability is the result is fixed beforehand, they are ready to bet as to which will be fixed right.

Prize fighting is one of the oldest sports, and although it is illegal in most places and good people set their faces against it, the average person reads about it even though he may not be interested in any other sport. Today the telegraph lines were kept clear for the news which was flashed to all parts of the world within a few minutes after it happened. Full detailed accounts of the match round by round are printed in most of the big papers and displayed under heavy headlines, not because the newspaper editors are interested more than anyone else, but because the public demand it. Pacifists to the contrary, people glory in a fight.

Fishermen Have Suffered From Strike.

The fishermen have been the worst sufferers from the recent strike. They have had their market cut off and, owing to the conditions, the price of fish has been cut down one third. Some of them have tied up their boats and others have hired them to the canneries. What promised to be a big season for them has been, through the force of circumstances which they could not control, proved to be almost a failure so far.

In Vancouver the fish packers did not go on strike. They remained on the job all the time and the result was that Vancouver got some of the fish that was rejected here.

Programs Are Now in Order.

There is a great drawing up of programs of reform which it is proposed to make in order to allay the unrest. The War Veterans at Victoria have just drawn up one, the Liberals have one being prepared, the Unionists are incubating, and the stand-pat Conservatives are also thinking one out. Other organizations are on the job, including the One Big Union and the Socialists. There is a plethora of schemes, but none will be of much value unless the men who have the administration of the laws in hand are honest. Programs and platforms are necessary, perhaps, but integrity and common sense are much more important.

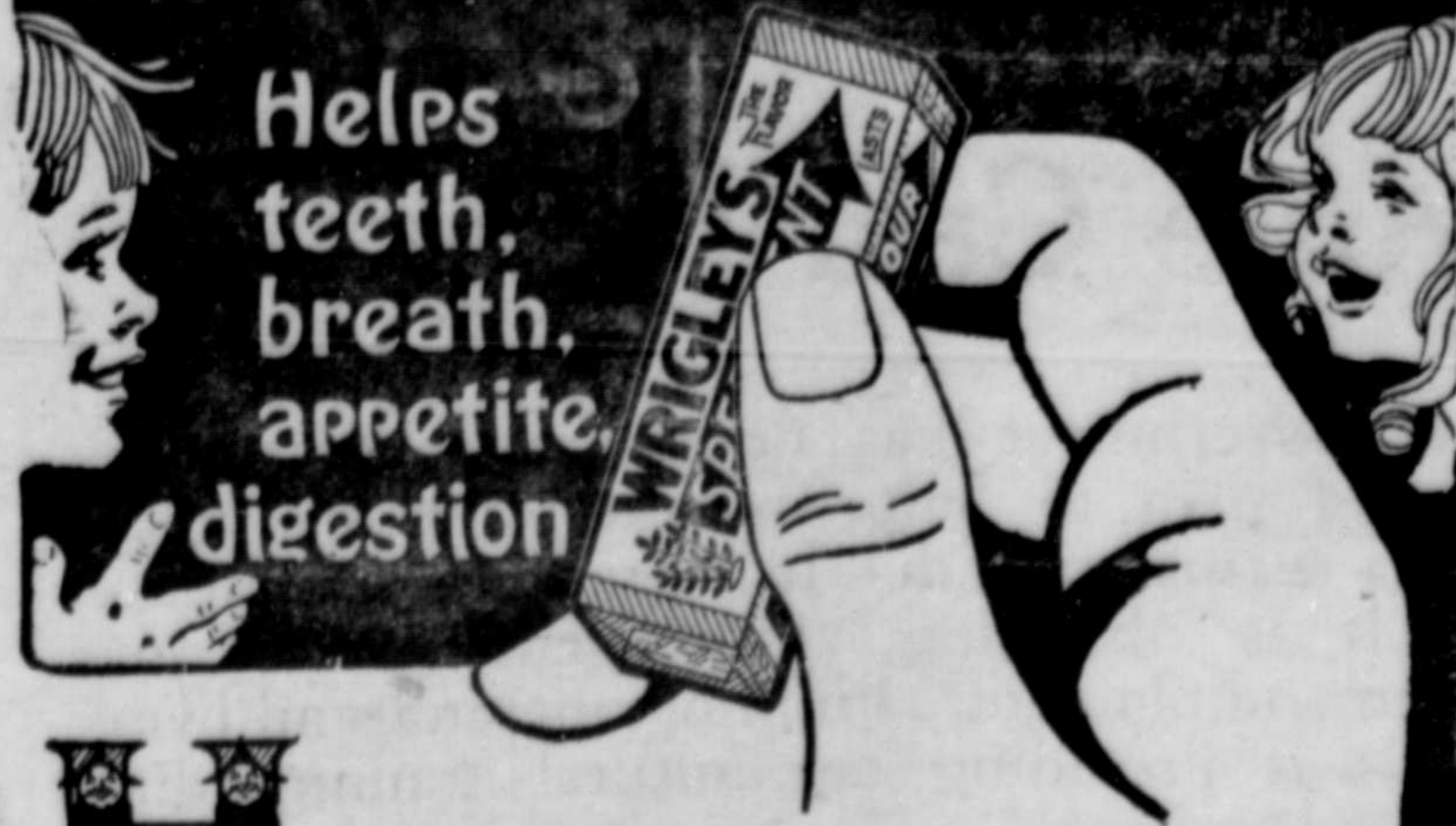

PLATFORM TO BE SUBMITTED TO CONVENTION

Victoria Meeting Draws Up Program of Much Needed Reforms.

In a brief review of Dominion issues at Victoria Premier Oliver said that present conditions of unrest in Canada were due to class privilege manifested in the high tariff. He claimed that less protection would result in general economic benefit to the country. He also considered that a great deal could be done by employers and employees getting together in an endeavor to settle their industrial differences.

The following is the platform which will be submitted to the Liberal convention in Ottawa:

Nationalization or abolition of salmon traps.

Assistance for iron and steel industry for British Columbia.

Substantial reduction on all custom tariffs.

Reduce custom duty on British and Colonial goods, giving a large preference over other countries with view to free trade therewith.

That mining, lumbering, agricultural and farm machinery be placed on the free list.

That companies or corporations engaged in the manufacture of products protected, and that all companies or corporations handling food products protected, be obliged to publish annually accurate and full statements of their earnings.

Manufactured goods and food-stuffs shall be sold in the home market at a price not exceeding the price obtained in the foreign market.

Graduated income tax on incomes starting from \$1,500 on unmarried persons without dependents, \$2,000 on married or single persons with dependents, and up.

Graduated income tax of profits based on actual cash investment of corporations.

Direct tax on unimproved land values including all natural resources.

That in future all natural resources be given only on short term leases or by Government retaining a co-partnership.

Government land scheme based upon actual settlement and Canadian citizenship.

All speculative land owners to be obliged to file their selling value, this price to act as basis of assessment.

National bank.

State insurance.

Public ownership or control of all public utilities that are by virtue of their being a monopoly, such as coal mines, oil wells, natural gas, telephones, telegraphs, express, railways, cold storage and grain elevators.

Development and control of mercantile marine with view of trade development.

Insurance for soldiers who are not getting pensions and have become undesirable risks for insurance companies.

Franchise for women.

STEAMERS RETURN TO REGULAR SCHEDULE

Prince Rupert to Arrive Here Tomorrow and Prince George On Wednesday.

Telegrams received by the local Grand Trunk offices confirm the rumors rife yesterday namely that the boats are again ready to resume their coast service schedule with the regular crews back at work.

The Prince Rupert will arrive tomorrow, leaving for the south on Sunday evening. The Prince George comes north on Wednesday and will return to Vancouver again on Thursday night, maintaining this schedule throughout the season. Both boats will go to Anyox at midnight from here on the same day as their arrival, returning at 8 p.m. the following evening.

The Prince John which is expected to arrive here on Monday night sails for Massett, Port Clements and Buckley Bay on Wednesday morning. The Tillamook sails for Stewart tomorrow, carrying passengers, mail and freight.

SIR DONALD IS GONE TO SEE BIG MISSOURI

If It Looks All Right He Will Send New York Expert To Stewart.

"I should not be going to Stewart unless I expected that there would be something there for me to see," remarked Sir Donald Mann last evening soon after his arrival from the east on his first trip over the G. T. P., although not his first visit to Prince Rupert.

"I am going up to look at the Big Missouri. No, it is not a mine but a very good prospect," he continued. "I am not in a position to say anything about it yet, but if it looks good enough I shall send an expert all the way from New York to examine it and report."

Sir Donald went on to say that he did not contemplate developing any of his other properties at Stewart or of operating the railway which was built some years ago, and in regard to the Big Missouri he could not be sure what he would do until it was proved that the ore was there in sufficient quantity and of high enough value to make its working worth while.

Sir Donald was very pleased with his trip along the G. T. P., not because of the fine scenery which so many people admire, but because of the good land en route which will be cultivated in the near future. He said he expected ten years would make an immense difference in that country.

Asked if he was through with his railway building Sir Donald said emphatically that he was. He had become stale at the work, which required men of energy and perseverance with all the resiliency of youth to aid them.

"It is forty years ago this month since I first started work on the C. P. R.," he remarked reminiscently. "Yes, I did a little before that on the Grand Trunk. Forty years of railway building is a long time. I never thought I should tire of it, though. I thought that at sixty-five I should be just as keen as ever, but I am not. The keenness has worn off and I do not care about it any more."

Sir Donald left for Stewart this morning on the Grier Starrett and proposes to return at the end of next week and go south on the G. T. P. steamer.

BUILDING PERMITS FOR MONTH OF JUNE

Houses to value of \$22,000 commenced and Many More Will Be Erected

There has not been so great activity in building this past month as there was in May. This is due in great part to the unsettled state of labor owing to strike conditions which have existed throughout the whole country. However many of the buildings which were begun in April and May are rapidly nearing completion. The stores for R. L. McIntosh have been plastered and shelving has been put in one and it is practically ready for occupation except that there is no plate glass here yet. The large stores of Geo. J. Frizzell have been finished on the exterior and the tin-smiths are now at work putting on the cornice. The work of insulating the cold storage at the back of the store which will be occupied by Frizzell's Meat Market is proceeding apace now that shavings have arrived from Edmonton. The addition to the Government building has been plastered and the forestry department will soon be moved.

During the month of June building permits to the extent of \$12,000 were issued from the office of the city engineer. The following is the list: Harry Atkins \$5,000; H. R. Love, \$1,000; D. Zarelli, \$500; G. H. Munro, \$1,600; J. W. Chadwick Dunes, \$200; Akerberg Thomson, \$2,500; Miss Tillet, \$500; F. W. Hart, \$1,000; H. Leaper, \$800; A. T. Bailey, \$1,000, and Cheng Yeng, \$600.

Already there are indications that there will be some further construction of residences, especially under the Returned Soldiers' Housing Scheme.

I wish them every success and promise them the strongest possible support in any effort they may make for the suppression of professional gambling which is a terrible vice in our midst at the present time.
 My position is that people should be allowed to enjoy a game of poker or any other card-game with the fullest possible liberty anywhere, but the elimination of professional card sharpening (by sharks who travel the country to bleed susceptible members of communities) from otherwise interesting games is necessary to the maintenance of the moral and social standards we desire in this city.

In the Letter Box

Editor, Daily News:
 In fairness to the Police Commissioners I would like to correct a statement appearing in the press of yesterday's issue relative to the stand I took in the matter of licenses and gambling at Monday's council meeting. The press makes it appear that I would not trust the Police Commissioners. This is erroneous, for I never said I would not trust them. These gentlemen are my personal friends and I believe their principles and integrity to be beyond reproach.

It is possible the press representatives at the meeting did not closely follow my remarks, and I beg the liberty of correcting what may be a false impression. Clause 3 of the proposed new by-law reads as follows:

"In case it shall appear to the satisfaction of the members of the Board of Police Commissioners, after due inquiry (which inquiry the Board is hereby authorized to make) that any breach of this by-law has been committed, it shall be lawful for the said board to report to Council, and the Council shall thereupon have the power after considering such report to revoke the license of any licensee so reported against, as per authority of Trades License Amending Bylaw No. 326."

My amendment to the above was:
 "In case the records of the police court show that subsequently to the issuance of a license any breach of this by-law has been committed, the Board of Police Commissioners shall report to Council and the Council thereupon shall have the power after considering such report to revoke the license of any licensee so reported against, etc., etc."

My reason for the above amendment was supported by the assumption of a case where the possibility was shown of one commissioner being in favor of cancelling a license, the second against it and the mayor standing neutral, in which event the proposed by-law would be of no effect and discrimination may be

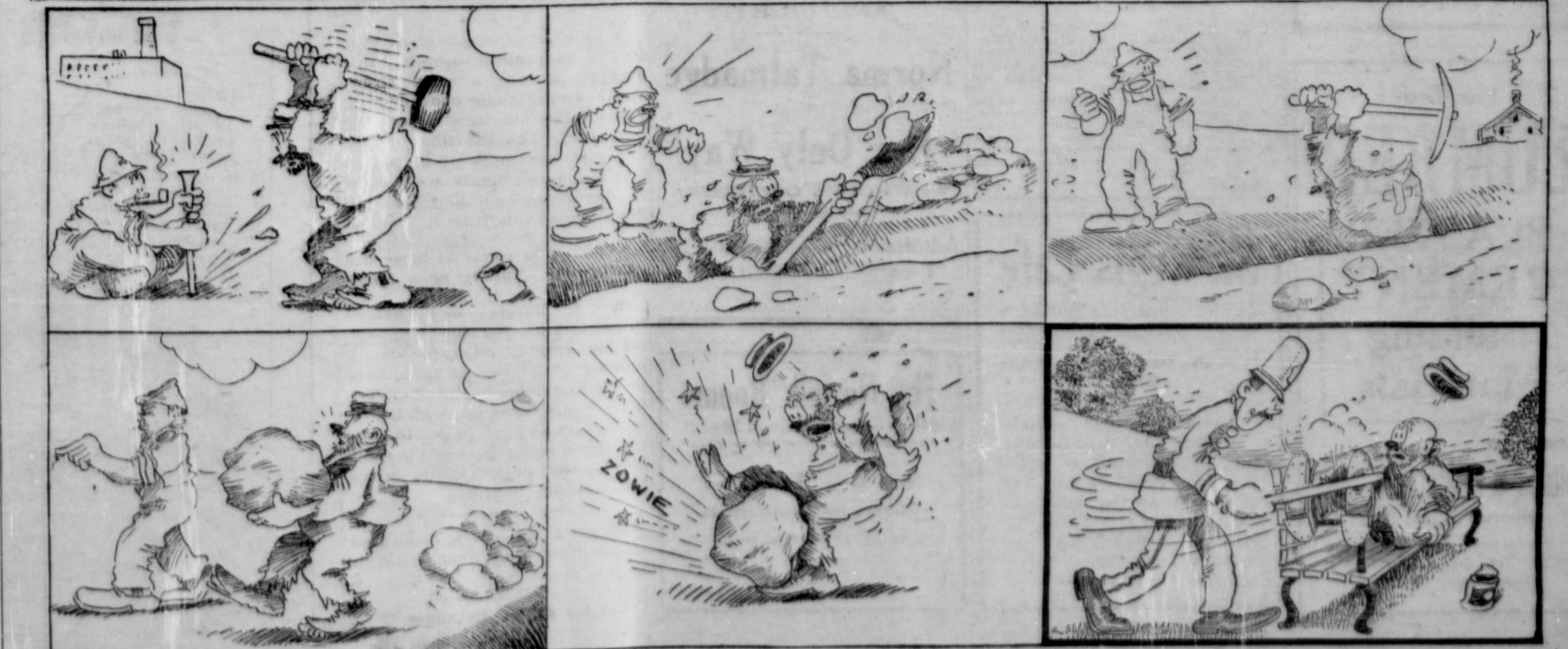
