GENERAL STRIKE CALLED OFF LAST NIGHT ON VOTE OF FIFTEEN TO TWELVE

MEN RETURN TO WORK AFTER BEING OUT NEARLY SIX WEEKS IN SYMPATHY WITH WINNIPEG METAL TRADES WORKERS

The general strike is settled, and most of the men have gone to work. The longshoremen this morning worked the cargo of the steamer arriving from the south and the fish packers and car shop men are on the job. They were out nearly six weeks in sympathy with the Winnipeg Metal Trades workers.

Yesterday there was a conference between the general superintendent of the G. T. P. and a new committee, with the result that a settlement was arrived at which was endorsed by the strikers later. Under the arrangement the men who are out are taken back as new employees and where the positions have been filled or abolished employment may be obtained when there are positions vacant.

The committee that waited on Mr. McCall consisted of Messrs. Montgomery, Dawson, Thompson, Waddell, and Ross.

Last evening the strike committee issued the following bulletin:

"That in view of the circumstances we accept the request of the committee as a recommendation on the ground that the terms of settlement are as good as we can expect under the conditions, and that we advise the strikers to return to work, thereby calling off the general strike in Prince Rupert."

"Take notice: This does not affect the position of the strike in Morgan's contract at the drydock where men are on strike for more wages. That strike is still in effect and the dispute is between the Morgan Company and the B. C. L. U. representing the men."

COST OF LIVING

Matter Discussed by Board of Trade at Meeting Last Evening.

A protest against the high cost of living was read last night at the meeting of the Board of Trade it having been sent by the Vancouver Board of Trade. Several drastic resolutions were named as being the possible solution for the problem.

Considerable discussion followed in this matter as to the advisability of endorsing the measure.

Mr. Nelson supported the main idea but could not bind himself to support all the resolutions therein. Finally it was referred to the committee on legislation on motion of Messrs. Nickerson and Orme, where it will receive further consideration.

PROHIBITION UNSETTLED BUT A COMPROMISE IS EXPECTED

JOINT MEETING TO BE HELD MONDAY MORNING TO MAKE FINAL DECISION—GOVERNMENT ORDER MAY REMAIN IN EFFECT UNTIL NOV. 11

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Ottawa, July 5.—The deadlock between the House of Commons and the Senate over the prohibition measure will reach its final stages on Monday morning when there will be another "peace conference" between representatives of both houses. There is talk of a compromise by which the government order-in-council will remain in effect until November 11 or one year from the date of signing the armistice.

While there was no hope of prorogation taking place today, nevertheless a number of members left for home last night, leaving sufficient to insure a quorum in the house until all the business is disposed of. It is now planned to wind up the session at one o'clock Monday.

ASK CONGRESS REVOKE CHARTER TRADES COUNCIL

First Direct Move Against One Big Union in Vancouver Being Made.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Vancouver, July 5.—The Vancouver Theatrical Federation is sending a petition to the Federation of Labor and the Dominion Trades Congress asking them to revoke the Vancouver charter of the Trades and Labor Council.

A local newspaper says this is the first direct move against the One Big Union. The Theatrical Federation asks also that new central labor unions be formed in centres in western Canada where trades councils have shown a partiality to the One Big Union. Participants in the recent sympathetic strike, it is said, who applied for their old jobs at the Coughlan yards were required to show their union cards and that all bearing membership from the One Big Union were refused employment.

CARVELL MAY RESIGN

Ottawa, July 5.—There are to be more changes in the Dominion cabinet. There is one vacancy and it is rumored here will soon be two more. Hon. F. B. Carvell is stated to be preparing to resign.

WAR VETERANS WOULD HAVE COMMISSION APPOINTED TO CONTROL SELLING PRICES

SAYS CRIMINAL PROFITEERING TENDS TO MAKE CANADA A BREEDING PLACE FOR BOLSHEVISM AND TREASON—ALL CLASSES TO BE REPRESENTED

Vancouver, July 5.—The G. W. V. A. convention passed an ultimatum on industrial problems to put an end to the criminal profiteering which tends to make Canada a "breeding place for Bolshevism and treason."

The convention recommended the appointment of a permanent commission to prepare a schedule of the cost of production, manufacture, transportation and sale of essential commodities of life for the sanction of parliament. Any departure from this schedule the Association would have punished severely.

The convention suggested the inclusion of manufacturers, producers and wage earners on the commission.

C. F. Law Writes Board of Trade Asking Support for Proposal

One of the most important matters before the Board of Trade last evening was a petition sent by C. F. Law requesting the signatures of citizens to support certain grants which he was asking from the Provincial Government in connection with the building of a railroad from Kitwanga to the Groundhog coal fields through the Naas valley.

President McCaffery thought that it was high time that we were getting behind any movement which would help out Northern B. C. The country was greatly in debt for railroads built in the south and he thought that it was time that something was being done which would very materially help this port. Messrs. Parker and Nelson thought that they could not ask the government to make such phenomenal land grants as were demanded in the petition. The matter was put into the hands of the mining committee.

Lecture on Socialism.

E. T. Kingsley is in town lecturing on Socialism. Last night he gave an interesting address at the Westholme Theatre to a large audience and his bright and witty turns were much appreciated and evoked applause. He dealt at length with the development of the present state of society and advised his hearers to have recourse to the ballot box instead of striking. Much of his reasoning was perfectly sound but he led his audience to a quagmire and there left them. He offered no plan of redemption except the very general one of capturing the reins of government through the ballot box. There was no suggestion of what after, except that government was unthinkable.

Anyone who has studied economics is aware that anarchy is the highest social condition that can be imagined. It means the reign of love, when there will be no laws because none will be needed. All will have arrived at such a stage of perfection that they will do right because it is right and not because the law says it is right. Students of human nature know however that such a condition is a few million years in the future. It is ideal, but with the material at hand is absolutely impossible as a practical condition.

No Suggestion For Future.

Much the same might be said of socialism. Judging from the remarks of the speaker at the gathering last night, there will be no currency under a socialistic scheme. There will be no wages, for wages create slaves. Like all other idealists Mr. Kingsley offers no suggestion as to the working out of his ideals, except the one sentence dropped last night when he mentioned the Bolshevik route. But they have wages in Russia, and exponents of socialism always claim that wages paid by the Government are just as much chains as those paid by private owners.

Mr. Kingsley has been lecturing on socialism for many years. Nearly twenty years ago he was telling the miners of Vancouver Island the same story that he told last night, although we are not sure whether Robinson Crusoe was there or not as an illustration. At that time socialism had a big following, just as big as it has in Prince Rupert today. There are always a large number of people who delight in the vague and unknowable. Far away fields look very pleasant. People may yet discover that the state under socialism is no elysium but that there are cares and worries, and perhaps even work in the ideal state.

Outlander's Queries.

To the Editor:—

Would some intelligent member of the unions or employers furnish a resident of the outlying district with a reason for all the turmoil in the business centres of our Dominion? We read that men are "walking out" after a vote, on what is called a "strike" without giving rhyme or reason. Some "walk out" because they are dissatisfied with conditions, but why must all "walk out" if the minority are satisfied to remain? If there is strength in unionism why must the minority bow to the decision of the majority, and are they receiving pay to support their wives and families from those in a condition to remain out?

Must Earn to Live.

Men and women must earn money in order to live. Money is only a commodity at the best of times. We cannot eat it, and the world moves, as Napoleon's army did "on its stomach." The Kaiser kept a lot of drones hived up in forts and ships, awaiting a chance to set the world on fire, and we "downed" them with shot and shell. While the majority of men and women will "hive" in the cities and towns, regardless of the fact that the land and water produce the only means of subsistence this "Bolsheviki" business will go on. Stop the means of production of food supplies and all will end in famine and distress.

Produce One Hundred Fold.

Only for the fact that the workers on the land and water produce a hundredfold, where would the employers and workers residing in the cities come out? The farmers and the fishermen are not interested in this movement to "tie up" everything. Our broad acres and the teeming seas and rivers are producing all that keeps the employers and employees of the cities and towns going. We are the "busy bees" bringing forth the "honey" that the drones may live and talk in their "temples" and "counting houses." Their "beautiful cities" and their "automobile drives" produce little of value, when we come to the necessities of life.

Ford keeps his automobile workers "on the job" by paying them six dollars a day, and charging the producer of food-stuffs to make up the difference between his wages and the pay of any ordinary employee in some other occupation. We have not heard of Ford's thousands of employees "walking out." The brewery workers are returning to work for the reason that "near beer" is running low. Who pays for that "near beer?" When people talk of a soviet government in any part of Canada, what does it mean?

Who Are Producers?

Every good citizen has a vote, what more can he get under any form of government? When we hear men arguing about being producers, it appears that about ninety per cent. of the human race produce little to support life, the main-spring of our livelihood. While actual fighting was in progress, during four years, hundreds of thousands of able-bodied men were content to risk their lives for \$1.10 a day, to keep the flag flying over us, and to save our institutions.

We have responsible government in this country and we could get nothing more, if we fought and "walked out" for the next one hundred years. Combine as we will, food production will regulate everything, and if a man or woman is not satisfied with conditions in the "beautiful cities" the land is hungering for employers and employees.

By Their Fruits.

Gold and silver may be useful as a means of exchange, but there is something in "bringing forth a blade of grass where no blade of grass was ever seen before." Agitating and grouching never accomplished anything in the past. Action is wanted right now. "By their fruits you shall know them" is gospel truth today. Instead of the "food line" we want the "food producer." If one potato produces twenty-fold, as it does in this country, why are potatoes so high in price? Pay the city workmen any kind of wages, if he is compelled to purchase food at an exorbitant price it is because the land is not being tilled as it ought to be.

Nothing But Anarchy.

This setting up of one class against the other class amounts to nothing but anarchy in its

most glaring sense. Let us form associations of Britishers, pure and simple; men who have thoughts of the thousands of years our flag stood the battering of battle and the breeze. Let us look at things with the eyes of fairness and justice to all. God has provided us with a healthy, workable country, away from the turmoil of the great European centres. Unless we realize that we are a chosen people of God, able and willing to bring from the earth and sea our means of subsistence, we will deteriorate.

Life now-a-days seems one mass of contrariness. There appears a lack of sympathy between man and man. Out in the fields or sailing over the sea, helping others and ourselves to garner from Mother Nature, would allay the discord now existing where men meet in the busy marts, conflicting with one another and hampering those who are endeavoring to live peaceful and contented lives.

SOCIALISM IS EXPLAINED BY E. T. KINGSLEY

Speaker at Theatre Advocated Settling Differences by Ballot Box, Not Strikes.

At the Westholme Theatre last night E. T. Kingsley gave an interesting address on Socialism under the title of "Civilization, Slavery and the State."

He dealt with the growth of capitalism and the wage slaves and strongly advocated settling the differences between capital and labor at the ballot box.

The speaker said that the whole world was in turmoil. There was a vast wave of unrest sweeping over it. There were industrial troubles and in many countries rebellions. In others there were mutterings. There was a serious problem to solve and it was not solved the whole of the present civilization would go down in collapse.

Wage Slavery.
Mr. Kingsley then traced the development of the present system explaining how wage slavery followed bond slavery and claimed that the working class was just as completely enslaved today as in the days when Greece and Rome were at the height of their power. The farming class did not work for wages, but to some extent exploited labor, yet the product of the farm was exploited by the capitalist class, in that the farmer had to accept the price that was set.

The lecturer then went on to explain that the only property there was consisted of property in human slaves. Prince Rupert would not be worth a nickel except for the working people. Money consisted of promises to pay. It was an order on tomorrow. The only way to get rid of the capitalist system was by the Bolshevik route by which they would wipe all promises to pay off the slate.

Mr. Kingsley claimed that the workers could not own property because they themselves were property and property could not own property. Slaves could not own anything. They might think they owned it but they were mistaken. Let them once get the idea into their minds that they were slaves and it would be a long time before they would go on strike again because nothing could be settled by that route. Their masters might grant them privileges but not their rights.

The State.
The state overshadowed everything. It was the instrument by which the slaves were held in subjection. It only conserved the interests of the master class. All the state knew was suppression. Every shadow they saw was Bolshevism. People pointed the finger at Flavelle, but if it was right to take one per cent it was right to take one million per cent. They could not excuse themselves by calling down the big men. It was impossible to fix prices, because everyone knew that the condition of the market fixed prices and not human edict.

Mr. Kingsley then dealt at some length with the cost of living and made fun of the idea of extending credits to foreign countries in order that they might buy our goods and pay cash for them. The joke was that there was no such thing as cash. Sooner or later the whole thing would go down in collapse.

Conquer the State.
"No government can stay in power after two thirds or three quarters of the people turn against it," continued the speaker. Just as soon as the working class moved it would conquer the state without taking a gun or anything else. He said he favored another war any time but he would let the working class stay at home and furnish the guns and machine guns for the employing class to fight with. A game of seven up might answer the purpose just as well as a war, however.

The struggle between the classes was still in its incipency. Government was unthinkable as an institution. The struggle was quickly developing. They could easily and readily conquer the reins of power. The controlling class would be dispossessed at the ballot box. If the Government tinkered with the Franchise Act, however, it would raise up a whirlwind of rebellion shod with iron sandals. Then something

terrible would be done as in the French revolution. Their cause, however, depended on reasoning faculties. Eventually it would sweep away distrust. The cause of labor was the cause of humanity.

How Everyone Can Help

THE Government has developed a liberal and broad plan to help soldiers settle on farms. It is securing land. It is granting substantial loans. It is obtaining advantageous prices on equipment, implements, building materials and live stock. It is providing agricultural training and farming supervision.

That is as much as the Government itself can do. But the plan needs more. It needs a community spirit of co-operation.

Already Provincial Governments, Universities, Farmers' Associations, and Veterans' Associations are giving valuable assistance. Many manufacturers and sellers of farm supplies have agreed to allow the soldier settlers special prices. Many successful farmers have willingly worked on Qualification Committees which have to pass on the applicants. Men who have had experience in lending money on farm property are serving on Advisory Loan Committees, judging land values.

But even such practical assistance is not enough. In each community farmers can be of real service to the soldier settler. They can give him advice about local conditions. They can lend him an extra horse or plough, give him a day's help at seeding or harvest time, and extend to him that friendly, neighborly, respectful spirit which he deserves.

In this way Canada is performing a double duty. It is discharging, as far as possible, the debt we owe to our soldiers; and it is adding to the country's chief industry a body of competent, willing producers.

In the Letter Box

Publican Speaks.

To the Editor:— If Prince Rupert was a Jewish community still under the Mosaic law alluded to by St. Paul as "A grievous yoke not to be borne," there would be some object in Mrs. Jennie Smith's remarks in regard to the keeping of the day of rest here.

Living under the Christian dispensation as we do, with the Jewish laws and customs entirely abolished and done away with, including the observance of the Sabbath, the seventh day of the week, the busiest of all with us, it is absurd to harp upon the same rigid keeping of Sunday, the first day of the week, about the observance of which there is not one single divine command nor one single apostolic injunction.

Made for Man.

The closing of places of business and the setting aside Sunday as a day of rest is a law made by man for the convenience of man, and it is highly necessary that the one day out of the seven should afford an opportunity of rest for man and beast in this way.

The disciples and early Christians met on Sunday for praise and worship, a helpful custom followed by the church ever since and it is decidedly the duty of every citizen who can to attend divine service at least once. But no doubt Mrs. Jennie Smith is found amongst the faithful at church on Sunday mornings and so I presume her criticisms are made as she takes her walk in the afternoon, while I am quite sure most of us agree that to walk out in the fresh air and sunshine (when we have it) or to organize some little picnic or party of pleasure or some festal gathering is a good way to spend a holiday, yet at the same time there are many busy women who are confronted with baskets of ironing and sewing and men hard at work all the week unable to do necessary building or repairs. If these men and women cheerfully tackle their tasks, remembering the old adage "duty first, pleasure afterwards," I for one consider it much to their credit.

Her Prayer.

Who is to say what elevating or uplifting thoughts may be vouchsafed to the workers at sewing machine or ironing board or to those at the carpenter's bench where nineteen hundred years ago one toiled whose beautiful ideas of love and charity are a power in the world forever? We know the nature of Mrs. Jennie Smith's reflections. She has made them very clear. Perhaps we can guess at her prayers:

"I thank thee, God, I am not as these others are in Prince Rupert. I never run the sewing machine on Sundays. I do not do any ironing. I never hammer in nails. Can nothing be done to hurt all these sinners, oh God? Cannot they be prosecuted, or better still be put in jail? And then, oh God, I will be the only one left to take my walks abroad and thank thee again I am so much better than they."
