CHAMBER OF COMMERCE OF THAT CITY ASKS FOR DAYLIGHT SAV-ING ORDINANCE

VICTORIA, March 12. - The Victoria Chamber of Commerce, through its board of directors, endorsed a proposal that the Daylight Saving Act, 1919, be brought into force throughout the whole of British Columbia during the months of May, June, July, August and September each year.

The directors approved the following resolution, which the Nelson Board of Trade recently passed: "Whereas there is already on the

Statute Book of the province an act known as the Daylight Saving Act, 1919, Chapter 66, and "Whereas the province as a whole, and |

more particularly that portion of it from the Okanagan east, prefers sun time,

"Whereas an hour's additional daylight in the evening would be of great advantage to almost all classes in the province, and

"Whereas many of the towns in the province, especially those situated along the Crow's Nest Pass Railway, now enjoy the advantages of daylight saving,

"Therefore be it resolved that the board urges upon the Honorable the Premier of British Columbia the desirabil-4 ily of bringing into force the Daylight Saving Act of 1919, and have it in operation during the months of May, June, July, August and September."

Many of the directors expressed themselves in favor of daylight saving, provided it was in operation throughout the province. It would be of benefit to the great majority of the citizens. and would also assist the tourist traffic.

Medical Research Council Great Britain Reports Great Success in Work

LIVER FATS TESTED

Margarine May Replace Butter if Vitalized by a Proper Supply of Vitamin "A"

ocal experimental station on testing for vitimins in the livers of dog fish, it is interesting to note what is done elsewhere along similar lines. The Manchester Guardian has an interesting account of the work of the Medical Research Council which follows:

"Among all the investigations the most obviously dramatic in its course and its results, and probably the most important in its immediate practical value, is that in which Dr. O. Rosenheim, F.R.S., and T. A. Webster in the National Institute have been engaged. They have succeeded in producing the so-called vitimin D-itself of unknown chemical nature, and till lately obtained only as a product of living substance-by the action of ultra-violet light upon a definite chemical subtance-namely, asterol."

The results of a series of experiments with purified cholesterol were communicated to Professor Windaus, of Gottingen, who made a suggestion that ergosterol should be tested again.
