LINER WRECKED ON ATLANTIC OCEAN

VESTRIS SANK AFTER PASSENGERS AND CREW LEFT HER

Atlantic Liner Vestris Sinks but Most of Passengers and Crew are Picked Up by Rescue Ships

Several Hundred Men and Women Spent Night Tossed on Angry Waters in Lifeboats; Wireless Man Last to Leave Sinking Vessel

NEW YORK, Nov. 13.—One man is known to be dead and a woman and child are reported to be floating in the rolling waves, while other deaths seem probable, as reports from the rescue fleet off Virginia Capes slowly piece out the story of the sinking of the Lamport and Holt liner Vestris, which went down yesterday early in the afternoon a few hundred miles off from here, when bound from New York to Barbadoes.

At 1 o'clock today, a full day since the passengers and crew abandoned the ship, compilation from radio reports show 215 are known to have been rescued and one is dead, while 123 are unaccounted for.

The steamer American Shipper had 123 survivors aboard, the tanker Miriam 63, the liner Berlin 21, and the battleship Wyoming 8.

The dead man was picked up from a raft on which he died of exposure by the Wyoming.

The rescue began before dawn, the ships being led by fires sent up by the chilled men and women, who all night tossed on the angry waves left by the week-end gale.

No cause has yet been given for the sinking of the vessel.

Yesterday afternoon the Vestris was reported sinking 300 miles off Hampton Roads and that the passengers, numbering 350, and crew of 210, had abandoned the ship at 1:25. The first assistance was expected to reach them at 5 p.m. The sea was rough and much anxiety for the safety of the passengers and crew was expressed. The last message received from the Vestris was at 1:25, when the operator announced that he was joining the passengers and crew, who were already in the boats. Previous messages told of great danger. The ship was lying on her side with the decks awash as the passengers left. Nothing was said indicating the cause of distress. Apparently there was no collision. It is believed the week-end storm shifted the cargo.

Although Captain William Carey reported the weather moderately rough, other reports indicated more serious conditions. Rescue steamers were delayed by rough water.

The weather bureau reported that there was no storm, but believed the waves were running high as a result of the severe blow on Sunday.

Eight Canadians, including one westerner, were reported aboard the ill-fated Vestris. They are S. Paterson of Edmonton, E. M. Walcott of Halifax, S. Cox of Montreal, Mrs. J. F. Thompson of Montreal, Mrs. J. F. Wilson and two sons of Toronto.

Advices received this morning indicated that all but a few of the passengers and crew had been rescued.

PLANS FOR NEW SHIPS ON COAST

C. N. Steamships Hope to Have Handsome Vessels in Operation by 1930 Season

Plans have been received on this coast for the two handsome new steamers which Canadian National Coast Steamships hope to have built and in operation by the 1930 season. They will be larger vessels than the Prince Rupert and Prince George and will have all the latest appointments and conveniences in the passenger-carrying business.

There will be three passenger decks.

In connection with the building of the new ships, it is reported that the company may inaugurate a daily boat service between Vancouver and Prince Rupert and also resume the Vancouver-Victoria-Seattle triangle run.

Officers of the company's present ships will be advanced to the new vessels in relation to their seniority standings.

Mrs. M. Muir, who has been spending the past two weeks here with her sister, Mrs. D. G. Stewart, sailed Sunday night by the Prince George on her return to Vancouver.

Japanese Vessel Will be First to Load Grain Here This Season Due to Arrive Here Friday of This Week

With two ships due to load within the next fortnight and eight hundred cars of grain on the way here from the prairies, the wheat shipping season from the Alberta Wheat Pool's Prince Rupert elevator will soon be on in full swing.

The first ship of the season to load here will be the Japanese steamer Yaye Maru, which is due to arrive from the Orient by Friday morning at 8 o'clock. This vessel, it is understood, will have to be lined before going under the spouts. She will take a full cargo to the United Kingdom or Continent.

The second ship will be the British steamer Rockpool, due from the Old Country between November 18 and 23. This vessel will be lined before arrival.

Since Saturday night 182 carloads of grain have arrived here from the prairies. Yesterday 74 carloads were taken into the elevator. Eight hundred cars were reported this morning to be on the railway bound here.

FELL TO DEATH AT WATERFRONT

Jack Beale, District Troller, Lost His Life in Accident Saturday Evening

Falling a distance of some 20 feet from the dock to the deck of his boat which was tied up below and practically shattering his skull when he landed head first, Jack Beale, a trolling fisherman, met with instant death about 5 o'clock Saturday evening at the Philpott-Evitt coal wharf. By use of a rope with his partner on the boat, J. and N. below, Beale was engaged in loading supplies on his boat for delivery to the Billmor Spruce Mills. By some means he missed his footing and hurtled down to his death.

Deceased was some 52 years of age and was born in England. He had been engaged in trolling in the district for several years, the last two out of Port Edward cannery. So far as can be learned, he is survived by no relatives in his country.

An inquest was held this morning. Funeral arrangements are in the hands of the B. C. Undertakers.

The inquest was conducted by Coroner Norman A. Watt and the jury consisted of P. J. Ryan, foreman, W. Wilkinson, W. Vaughan Davies, W. Rance, Sam Massey and Thomas Murphy.

Witnesses were Arnold Barton, the man who was assisting deceased to load the boat; Dr. J. A. West, who made the post-mortem examination and testified that death was due to a fracture of the skull, and Fred Jones.

A verdict of accidental death was returned by the coroner's jury.

Little is known of Beale's personal affairs and Sergeant J. P. M. Hannah stated this morning that any information available would be appreciated by the police.

The funeral took place this afternoon with Rev. W. F. Price officiating.

Chamberlain Discusses Empire Problems Two Addresses to Canadians

OTTAWA, Nov. 13.—"The genius of the British race, formed of long habit and deep-rooted, in the past enabled the British people heretofore to confront their difficulties and solve them," said British Foreign Secretary Chamberlain, speaking at the banquet tendered him by the Canadian government. As between the British Empire and the British Commonwealth of Nations, Mr. Chamberlain said he preferred the latter, because it meant each constituent part was free to pursue its common interest for the Commonwealth. But the daily interests in each part is but a fraction of those for which the Commonwealth exists and by which it was justified.

Mr. Chamberlain said he was glad the Dominions were playing an increasing role in world affairs. Such a situation contained within it an element of danger, but he had profound faith that somehow always our common sense will solve difficulties as they arise.

CANADIAN CLUB SPEECH

Exposition of European conditions leading up to the treaties of Locarno, coupled with a plea for the people of the British Dominions to interest themselves in foreign affairs so that the policies of London might represent, not only those of the British government, but would also respond to the sentiment in all constituent parts of the Empire, furnished the theme of an address delivered by Sir Austen to the Canadian Club here yesterday.

The British statesman said that Britain could not be indifferent to conditions on the European continent, for in the past disinterest always resulted in misfortune and disaster. However, the position of Britain sought certain detachment since the people of the Dominions were further off and saw European affairs in a truer light. "You bring the opinion of the new world to correct the errors of the old. Thus the British Commonwealth of Nations brings a contribution to world peace which no other power can bring," he said.

Europe and United States Lacking in Understanding of Each Other Says Coolidge

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13.—In addressing the American Legion on Sunday, President Coolidge emphasized that the United States in view of its geographical characteristics, treaty engagements, economic importance, and in view of the lack of fueling stations and merchant ships capable of mounting six-inch guns, was entitled to a larger number of warships than nations having these advantages.

In comparing the British and American naval construction programs, President Coolidge said, when present legislation was carried out they would have forty. It is obvious that, eliminating all competition, the world standard defense would require U. S. to have more cruisers. The President also scored European criticisms of the United States isolation and alleged neglect of American duties toward the old world. Europe itself expressed very definite ideas on the subject. We do have such duties. They are not all

one-sided, however. They are mutual. The President said, "It was plain that Europe and the United States were lacking in the understanding of each other."

LABOR AMENDMENT BRITISH COMMONS DEFEATED YESTERDAY

LONDON, Nov. 13.—The Labor party amendment to the address in reply to the speech from the throne concerning the Government for failure to grapple adequately with the unemployment problem was defeated in the House of Commons yesterday by 321 vote to 151.

GIRLS DROWNED

CAIRO, Egypt, Nov. 10.—Twenty-eight persons mostly girls, were drowned when a native boat carrying flower sellers across the river capsized in midstream near Abuzal.

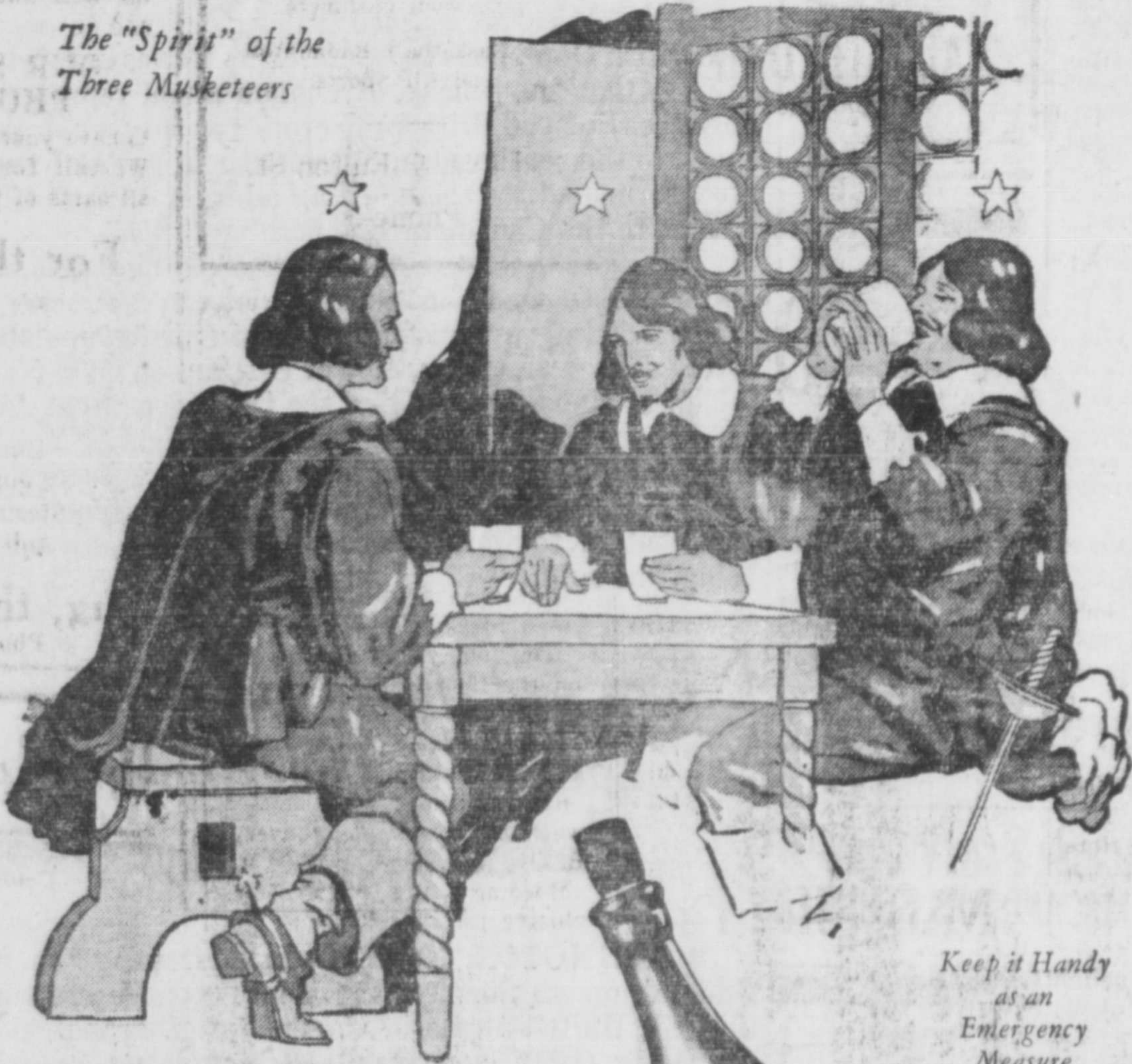

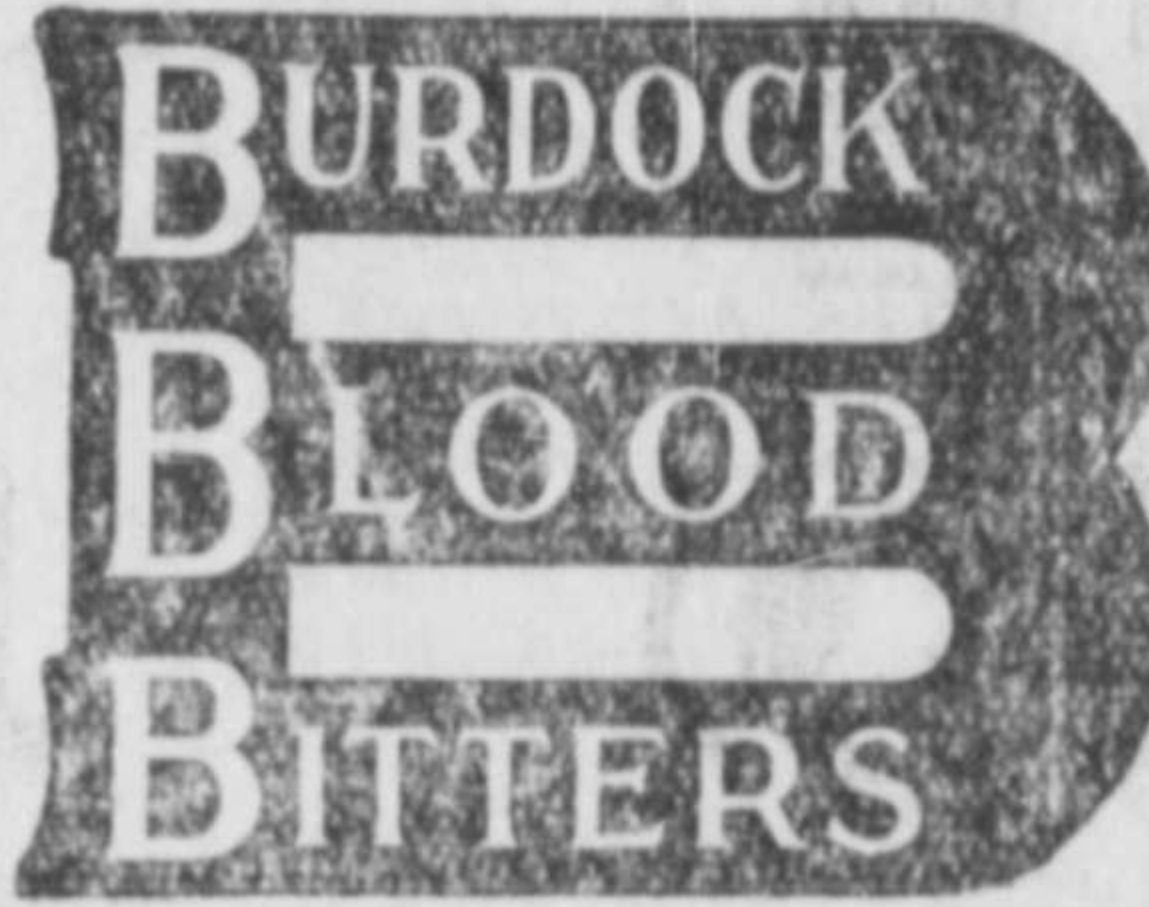

BROADCASTING THIS COUNTRY

Edmonton Paper Asks for Greater Interest in Radio Affairs by Ottawa

During a visit to the west the Deputy Minister of Marine found a general feeling that sufficient progress was not being made in providing of programs that would compare with those broadcast from the neighboring country. There was also complaint that the situation regarding interference was not being overtaken, says the Edmonton Journal. The dissatisfaction to which he calls attention in this part of the dominion has now existed for a long while and there has been too great delay in seeking to relieve it.

The deputy minister promises that western staffs and equipment will be enlarged, as he is convinced that they are inadequate. He also expresses the opinion that the radio commission will be appointed. It was expected that that body would have been brought into being long ago. Over half a year has elapsed since parliament passed a vote for the purpose. I should have had a report before I at the next session, and the government should then have been prepared to make definite proposals on the strength of the commission's findings. An explanation is due why nothing has been done towards this end.

What lines we are to follow in our radio policy can be satisfactorily determined only after the most careful enquiry, which it was supposed the commission would make. The minister of marine announced in April that the government was considering the feasibility of establishing a national broadcasting monopoly such as exists in Britain. But obstacles in the way of this have been shown to exist in Canada and whether they can be successfully overcome or not has yet to be demonstrated.

CANADA HAS ONLY SIX EXCLUSIVE WAVES

There is some dissatisfaction in Canada over the number of exclusive waves granted this country by the federal commission at Washington. Canada, it seems, has six and the United States 74. Canada is asking for at least twelve.

The settlement would have to be made by agreement between the two countries.

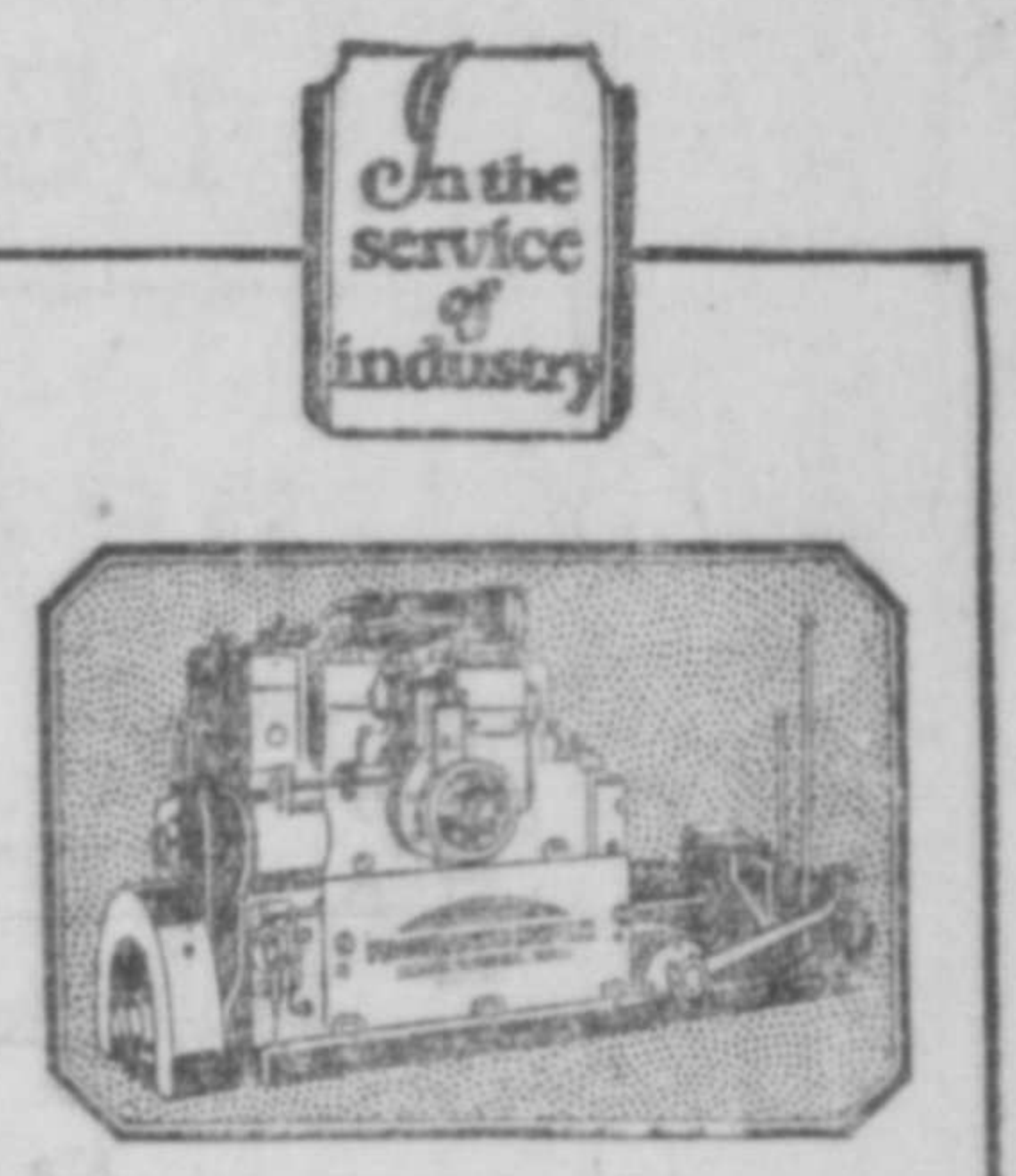
