VANCOUVER, February 24.—In an effort to be first to restake the famous gold lode first discovered in 1860 and later lost, prospectors representing two groups of financiers are racing north. The prize for the victors will be the famous old Sacramento Ledge, sought for and fought for in early days, after it had been told of by Indians and finally staked in 1860 by Major William Downie of West Virginia, eminent American mining engineer of that time, and restaked by him at intervals for 25 years after that date, the last time in 1885.

Lately, Downie's old account of his find, including a map locating the lode and records of five assays taken, disclosing an unusually rich deposit of mineral was unearthed after much research by officials of the Cal. Brit. Exploration Co. Ltd., a southern California concern inerested in B.C. mining possibilities.

Attorney General Defends Government Against Attacks of Opposition and Declare no Politics in Police Department

VICTORIA, February 24.—In the Legislature Hon. A. M. Manson, attorney general, denied opposition charges against the administration of justice, particularly in connection with the control of provincial police forces. He contended that politics had not been introduced into the affairs of the force. "There may have been mistakes made," said the attorney general, "but they were mistakes of the head and not from the standpoint of political motives."
