## Immigration Authorities Deny Improper Treatment of Harvesters At Winnipeg as Stated Yesterday

WINNIPEG, September 7 .- Statements made at the colonization conterence yesterday charging improper treatment of British harvesters at immigration hall in Winnipeg are declared false by Thomas Gelley, local immigration commissioner, last night.

Gelley denied the charge made by Thomas Johnston, Labor M.P. for Dundee, Scotland, that British harvesters "were kept in an underground cage" and declared that the immigration authorities here had not detained harvesters from the Old Country in any way.







A tribute to the pioneers of the Yukon was paid by Sistop Stringer in his address to the Rotary Club at their weekly luncheon yesterday afternoon at the Commodore Cafe. In clear and concise language the church missionary and dignitary told of the early history I the Yukon gold field with anecdotes Illustrating it, which proved intensely

The history of the Canadian Yukon commerced with the Russian traders yho first visited the country. Then Hudson Bay fur traders, establishing 1847 and 1848 trading posts at Fort ukon and Fort Selkirk. The latter was wiped out by the Chikat Indiagns tho sacked it and would have killed Campbell, the head of the post only the ative's rifle would not go off.

The Klondike was named from the word trohundike, the stone hammer used by the natives in driving stakes for their fish traps at the mouth of the Klondike River. Bishop Stringer told of the work of Archdeacon Macconald, who was the first to find gold n the region and who labored there or fifty years translating the Bible and other books into the native lan-

The actual gold rush followed the inding of nuggets on Eldorado Creek by Skookum Jim, an Indian prospector, although a great many others laimed to have been the first to make the discovery. The Carmacks were among the early gold diggers. Then came thousands of gold seekers many

Of the hundred million dollars taken from the territory in seven years and other millions since not a dollar was left of lasting benefit to the territory except a sum of \$20,000 set aside by Skookum Jim from his stake to be devoted to the sick and poor of the Yukon in perpetuity. No country had ever been robbed of its wealth as had that one, declared the speaker. The bishop spoke of the characteristics of the trail blazers of the early days, their endurance, courage and above all their innate kindliness. The spirit was common to everyone. He told the story of one man who fell! into a mine and was killed. In his belongings was a tiny sock, that of his little child in England. The miners filled the sock with gold nuggets and sent it to the mother.

Only recently a little blind boy had been sent out for treatment to Vancouver, the people raising \$800 for the purpose. The pioneer people were always hopeful and kindly. All credit to the pioneers who endured so much. all endeavoring to do their duty, declared Bishop Stringer in conclusion.
