LONDON, January 16 .- A Reuter despatch from Pekin says a Recent Purchase From Boston statement issued by Feng Yu Hsiang threatening opposition to all sympathetic foreigners in the territory, apparently refers to Canadian and other missionaries in Honan, towards whom his policy seems to be already in force. The despatch says that Feng's troops recently looted the premises of many Canadian Presbyterians who evacuated the province of Honan last spring.

Opened Pan-American Congress Today in Havana and Promised Other American Nations Helping Hand in Solution of Problems

HAVANA, January 16 .- The helping hand of the United States in the solution of the problems that beset the nations of the new world was extended by President Coolidge today as he opened the sixth Pan-American congress here. A great throng representing 21 nations of the western hemisphere cheered and rose from their seats several times in enthusiasm.

The president on his arrival here yesterday received the greatest demonstration Cuba ever accorded the visiting head of a foreign nation. The streets literally seethed with a mass of widly cheering Cubans.

The president was moved at the demonstration as he seldom has been before.

Little Change in Prices; Marmalade Oranges Next Week

kets discloses little change since last week and provides little worthy of special note. There has been little variation in prices either.

In the gracery stores, the promised increase in the price of matches is now in force. Anjou pears and red grapes are showing about the last for the season. Next week, the only shipment of marmalade oranges will be available. Time was when bitter oranges were in great demand for marmalade, but nowadays people are not so particular as to what they call marmalade, and grape fruit, sweet oranges and lemons are often to be seen, both singly and together, in one jar and the one word "marmalade" whose etymology is shrouded in mystery, covers the lot. Why this vitamin-abounding delectable mixture should be called marmalade and why its manufacture until very recent years has been confined to the towns of Dundee and Paisley in Scotland-these are two questions never satisfactorily cleared up. Like the word golf-or "gowff" to give it the colloquial pronunciation. Why Gowff? But no one knows! It has no connection with the club, nor the ball, nor yet with the turf on which the game is played. And its derivation like that of marmalade is lost in the mists of Scottish antiquity. It just is! And neither marmalade nor golf have any apologies to make either. Both with their national characteristic, are
