PRESIDENT GETS A FINE RECEPTION

CANADIAN MISSIONARIES IN CHINA SHOWN HOSTILITY

Canadian Missionaries Suffer From Activities of Troops of Feng Yu Hsiang in Honan Province, China

Converts despoiled, ill-treated and some tortured by troops of hostile general; buildings looted and burned

LONDON, January 16.—A Reuter despatch from Peking says a statement issued by Feng Yu Hsiang threatening opposition to all sympathetic foreigners in the territory, apparently refers to Canadian and other missionaries in Honan, towards whom his policy seems to be already in force. The despatch says that Feng's troops recently looted the premises of many Canadian Presbyterians who evacuated the province of Honan last spring.

WATER FAMINE WESTMINSTER

Main Breaks and City Faces Serious Situation Which May be Relieved

RICHMOND ALSO DRY
Several Plants Close and Others Must Follow Today if no Relief comes

NEW WESTMINSTER, Jan. 16.—The city is faced with a water famine as the result of a huge landslide a mile this side of Lake Quatnam, where it is feared the 24 inch main feeding the reservoirs is broken.

Several plants closed this morning and unless relief is secured by the linking up with Burnaby all plants will close this afternoon.

Richmond also is without water but efforts are being made to supply it from Point Grey.

ROAD LOCATING PARTY IS HERE

H. C. Whitaker Will Continue Work on This End of Highway in Spring

H. C. Whitaker, locating engineer for the provincial department of public works, and his party, which has been engaged in making surveys in the vicinity of Dorrer for the proposed Skeena River Highway, arrived in the city from the interior on yesterday afternoon's train, snow and cold weather having necessitated the closing down of their work until spring.

In the meantime, they will remain in the city assembling and preparing the data they have already gathered in connection with routes.

Provision is being made by the government for Mr. Whitaker to continue next season with the work of locating a route for the road which will connect Prince Rupert and Terrace. A start was made on this last year by Mr. Whitaker.

ASKING AID TO EDUCATE

Government to Receive Appeal on Behalf of Children of Poor Veterans

VICTORIA, Jan. 16.—F. H. Wiggins of New Westminster was elected president of the provincial command of the Army and Navy Veterans at its convention here Saturday.

It was decided to approach the government with a view to getting legislation in conformity with the Saskatchewan measure providing for government assistance for the education of children of veterans who cannot afford to pay for it themselves.

VICTORY OVER N.Y. RANGERS

Recent Purchase From Boston Makes Good for Toronto in Saturday's Hockey Game

TORONTO, Jan. 16.—On Saturday "Happy" Day scored three of the six goals made by Toronto in a brilliant victory over the New York Rangers here, two goals were made by Sailor Herberts, the prize package recently bought from Boston for \$17,500, while the other was put through by Cox. The lone goal made by the Rangers was shot by Johnson.

The Pittsburgh game against the Montreal Maroons was very dull. The last period tally netted two goals which gave Boston the win over Ottawa after the Senators had twice tied the score. The win of the Canadiens Sunday was the sixteenth of the season with one loss and four draws. The New York Americans took the lead in the first period but Morenz evened in the second and scored two more in the third. The Rangers took Boston's lead to one again Sunday night by beating Detroit. Toronto is in third place in the Canadian section following Saturday's win.

The mourners included Premier Baldwin, former Premier Ramsay MacDonald, Rudyard Kipling, Sir James Barrie, George Bernard Shaw, John Galsworthy and representatives of the King and the Prince of Wales.

Abitibi has acquired the common stock of the other companies, 97 per cent of the aggregate shares having been deposited.

VICTORIA, Jan. 16.—According to the provincial lands department Mystery Mountain, 150 miles north of Vancouver, is 13,260 feet in height, making it the highest peak in the province.

Woodward Urges Unite with Prince Rupert and Edmonton to Promote Completion of Line to Vancouver

VANCOUVER, January 16.—Charles Woodward, M.L.A., in an interview here said: "Edmonton is reaping the benefit from Peace River business while Vancouver is out of it for lack of railway connection. Vancouver should unite with Edmonton and Prince Rupert to link the 'Northern Empire' with the coast by completion of the P.G.E. and acquiring control of the Edmonton, Dunvegan and British Columbia Railway. The Canadian National can best serve the Peace River by completing the P.G.E. and linking up the E.D. & B.C. line with the coast route. Edmonton is destined to be the biggest city between Toronto and Vancouver."

President Coolidge is Given Reception Such as Never Seen in Cuba

Opened Pan-American Congress Today in Havana and Promised Other American Nations Helping Hand in Solution of Problems

HAVANA, January 16.—The helping hand of the United States in the solution of the problems that beset the nations of the new world was extended by President Coolidge today as he opened the sixth Pan-American congress here. A great throng representing 21 nations of the western hemisphere cheered and rose from their seats several times in enthusiasm.

The president on his arrival here yesterday received the greatest demonstration Cuba ever accorded the visiting head of a foreign nation. The streets literally seethed with a mass of wildly cheering Cubans.

The president was moved at the demonstration as he seldom has been before.

The grieving parents will receive general sympathy in their sad bereavement.

JERICO BEACH AIR STATION IS GETTING FIVE NEW MACHINES

VANCOUVER, Jan. 16.—Three new Avro seaplanes, loaned by the British government, are on their way to the R.C.A.F. station at Jericho beach, according to an announcement from Flying Officer A. H. Hull, commanding Vancouver unit. The planes will be used for training purposes, and six non-commissioned officers of the R.C.A.F. will reach Vancouver February 1 to start their training. There will also be 10 officers enrolled for training.

BODIES OF VICTIMS GOING TO VANCOUVER

VANCOUVER, Jan. 16.—The bodies of three or four sailors, who perished when the auxiliary schooner Noble was wrecked near Nootka January 5 will be brought to Vancouver during the week for identification. The body of the fourth victim has not been found.

REPORTS TO POLICE

Wife and Daughter Not Likely to Recover From Attack of Out-of-work Parent

TORONTO, Jan. 16.—"We had no money. We're in debt, couldn't get employment, thought this the best way out of it all," said George F. H. Deighton, 34 years of age, English veteran of the Great War, holder of the military cross, who Saturday informed a policeman he had murdered his wife and two children, aged four and seven. Investigation showed that the wife and seven year old girl were not dead but critically injured while the boy was dead.
