Anarchist Plot Exposed at Rome and Leaders Arrested; Try to Tamper with Garrison

Italian Cabinet Decides to Deal Vigorously with the Cost of Living; Profiteers and Hoarders to be Dealt with by Hundreds and Experts to Distribute Food.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Rome, July 8.—An anarchist plot to attack the central part of Rome by means of hand grenades and other explosives was exposed by the arrest of 16 conspirators four hours before the time set for carrying out the plans.
About the same time thirty anarchists motored to Fort Pratallata, four miles from Rome and tried to induce the garrison to join in the attack. In the market place soldiers fired on the anarchists and seized several.
The city remains tranquil. Following a cabinet meeting it was announced that there would be a determined and vigorous policy designed to influence immediately the cost of living. Profiteers and hoarders, it was said, would be dealt with by hundreds.
The Government will supervise directly the regulation of prices and the distribution of the necessities of life. It is also decided to increase importations from abroad. A national association composed of experts will be formed to carry on distribution under the government.

GAMBLING CASE AGAIN BEFORE CITY COUNCIL

Police Commissioners Asked to Make Recommendation for or Against Cancellation of License.
The City Council spent over half an hour last night discussing whether they should recommend to the attorney-general the cancellation of the license of D. Zarelli for the private club on Sixth St. following a conviction for gambling some time ago.
The matter was brought up on motion of Alderman Perry, seconded by Alderman Kirkpatrick, but after a long discussion the motion to ask for cancellation was withdrawn and on the motion of Alderman McMeekin seconded by Alderman Perry it was decided to refer the matter back to the Police Commissioners for recommendation, the opinion being expressed that it was desirable the mayor should take a stand on it one way or the other as the other members of the commission were divided.
The old argument for and against were given, one group taking the stand that to cancel the license would be discrimination as other clubs, it was admitted, were doing the same thing as Zarelli's; the other arguing that to omit cancelling this license would be discrimination against Fotos who lost his license for a somewhat similar offense.
The general consensus of opinion of the council seemed to be against making the recommendation for cancellation.

CAPT. FRYATT'S BODY TAKEN FROM CEMETERY

Taken to England After Crowd Had Done Honor to Remains.

Bruges, Belgium, July 8.—The body of the late Capt. Fryatt was last evening taken from the cemetery to the Provincial Government Building, where this morning an enormous crowd filed past the coffin.
The remains were this afternoon conveyed with all due honor to the railway station en route to England.

BOLSHEVIKI EXECUTE MANY INHABITANTS

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Paris, July 8.—A dispatch from Constantinople to the Agence Dadio reported today that the Bolsheviki forces had recaptured Tashkent, the capital of Russian Turkestan, executing 6,000 inhabitants.
The brother of Alexander Kerensky, former Russian premier, was among those executed, it is said.

SELL LOTS FOR CASH

Returned Soldiers Will Be Able to Purchase by Private Arrangement, But Others by Auction.
On the advice of the solicitors, Williams & Manson, the City Council last night decided to sell the city lots in Section 2 for cash only. A bylaw was put through authorizing the sale by public auction or by private treaty, it being understood that any sale by private treaty would be to returned soldiers only and then only in cases where they were prepared to build houses.
Already there are applications in from several returned men.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE DEVOTED TO TREATY

Aboard U. S. S. Georgia via Washington, D. C., July 8.—The President's message to be delivered to Congress on Thursday has been completed and will take about twenty minutes to read. It contains about 5,000 words devoted to the peace treaty, and protocols and the work of the peace conference.

LLOYD GEORGE COMPLIMENTS THE DELEGATES

Mentions in House of Commons the Work of Men From the Dominions, Especially General Botha.
(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
London, July 7.—Premier Lloyd George, during the course of a speech in the House of Commons, paid a tribute to the assistance of representatives of the Dominions in connection with the peace treaty delegation.
The premier mentioned amid cheers the name of General Botha who participated on some most difficult commissions for adjusting extraordinarily delicate, complex, ethical and economic questions which had arisen.
"We owe a great deal to the ability and judgment with which they helped on innumerable commissions and their work has been the admiration of the foreign delegations," said the little Welshman.

OFFERS SELF IN PLACE OF FORMER KAISER

Field Marshal Von Hindenburg Appeals to Foch to Prevent Extradition.
(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Paris, July 8.—Field Marshal von Hindenburg has written Marshal Foch appealing for his support to prevent the extradition of the former German Emperor Wilhelm. Von Hindenburg offers to place his own person "fully and absolutely at the disposal of the Allied powers."
London, July 8.—Field Marshal von Hindenburg may be brought to London to testify in defense of the former Kaiser. It is also said that a number of U-boat captains and slayers of Edith Cavell and Capt. Fryatt expect to be at the Tower of London in a few days.

FORCES GIVEN PUBLIC THANKS OF PARLIAMENT

Resolution Moved By Premier and Seconded By Leader of Opposition.
(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Ottawa, July 8.—Parliament prorogued at 3:30 yesterday afternoon. There were the old time formalities, the customary triple knocks on the doors of the House, the summons to the chamber of the Honorable Senate and the formal closing of the session there by the Government.
The last few hours were occupied chiefly in expressing gratitude of the House to the Canadian military and naval forces for the unflinching steadfastness and skill with which during the war they had served the cause of the country and empire in circumstances of unexampled hardship and for the splendid contribution to the final victory of right and liberty.
The resolution was moved by the Prime Minister, seconded by the leader of the opposition and carried unanimously.

GENERAL KOLCHAK GAINING GROUND

Bolsheviki Showing Fatigue While Troops of All-Russian Government are Coming in.
(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Paris, July 7.—Reports from Omsk received here indicate an improvement in the situation of Admiral Kolchak, head of the All-Russian Government, while the Bolsheviki are showing fatigue and are weakened by transfers of troops to other fronts.
Admiral Kolchak is receiving reinforcements while the new recruits mobilized during the spring are rapidly getting into condition for service.

FREIGHT WRECK ON CANADIAN NATIONAL

Two Dead, One Seriously Injured As Result of Accident on Railway.
(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Edmonton, July 8.—As a result of a freight wreck on the Canadian National Railway at 11:30 o'clock Sunday night two miles west of Owenoway, two men are dead, one seriously, but not fatally wounded, and the engine and twelve freight cars are reduced to junk.
The dead are Norman E. Horner, brakeman, and W. Young, engineer. W. L. Givens, the fireman, was injured.

FIUME SCENE OF TROUBLE

Clashes Between Italian and French Soldiers in Which Several are Killed.
(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Rome, July 8.—Clashes between French and Italians are reported at Fiume in advices from that city. The casualties number six killed and twenty injured.
According to despatches to Giornale Italia serious accidents have occurred within the last day or two at Fiume. Two French soldiers are reported to have insulted Italian grenadiers who remonstrated. The French fired on the grenadiers and then fled to the barracks from which they fled into the crowds that gathered.

LOCAL NEWS ITEMS

The Princess Mary of the C. P. R. coast service is expected to arrive in port on Thursday on her way to Ketchikan, Juneau and Skagway and will continue her regular tourist trips throughout the rest of the season.
G. A. Bryant and A. W. Cameron returned from Khtada lake yesterday afternoon. They report having fine sport, bringing home between seventy and eighty pounds of fish, the rainbows averaging from two to seven pounds.
The Prince George is expected on time tomorrow morning from the south and is carrying passengers, mails and freight for this port. Proceeding to Anyox tomorrow night she will leave for Vancouver on Thursday at midnight.
Joe Ratchford is still serving with the forces, having become attached to the headquarters staff and consequently does not expect to get home very soon. His company has to stay there in order to see all the others safely through England.
The Grand Trunk boat Prince John is expected from the south via the southern ports of Queen Charlotte Islands at any time today. She will leave for Buckley Bay, Massett and Port Clements tomorrow and will return to make a trip to Stewart on Saturday.
The scowload of shingles which has been lying at the Grand Trunk dock for some time was discharged into cars for shipment across the continent yesterday. During the absence of the freight handlers the barge was tied up here awaiting the return of the workers. The tug Francis Cutting has arrived with another scow and will return with both when they are unloaded.
Norris Pringle of this city has returned to Canada, but will remain in the east for a short time before coming out to his home in Prince Rupert. Morris as a boy joined up in the early days of the fighting and his many friends will be glad to hear of his safe return to Canada.
In the last freight train to arrive here there was a fine new motor truck for the Imperial Oil Company in one of the cars. It is made by the International Harvester Co., of Chicago, and will be a decidedly fine addition to the fleet of automobiles in the city. A novelty in the machine is that the speedometer is already rigged up on the hub of the front wheel and can be read from the side as the dial appears on the end of the axle.

DIRIGIBLE R-34 DUE TO START EARLY MORNING

Plan to Get Away at Five This Morning Was Abandoned; Weather Adverse.
(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Mineola, N. Y., July 8.—The British dirigible R-34 which was scheduled to start on the return trip to England, will not leave until some time between midnight Tuesday and 8 o'clock Wednesday morning, it was announced last night by Brigadier General E. M. Maitland, chief of the lighter than air craft of the British Air Ministry.
The proposed plan to get the gigantic airship away at 5 a. m. on Tuesday was abandoned last night because of local weather conditions including adverse and bumpy winds.
It is supposed that the dirigible crew will overhaul the engines during the afternoon. Without overhauling it would be inviting accident for the airship to take off on the venture, as quantities of carbon accumulated in the engines which were burning 108 hours while the craft was aloft on the unprecedented journey, which ended at Roosevelt Field on Sunday morning.

BAN PLACED ON SINN FEINERS

Proclamation From Dublin Castle Declaring Organizations in Tipperary Unlawful.
(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Dublin, July 8.—A proclamation has been issued from Dublin Castle declaring all Sinn Fein organizations and Irish Volunteers in the country of Tipperary unlawful associations.
The announcement was made in a memorandum by the Chief Secretary for Ireland enumerating the serious crimes and offences against these organizations during the past year.

NO REPRESENTATIONS REGARDING FORMER EMPEROR OF GERMANY

London, July 8.—Andrew Bonar Law, spokesman for the British Government, announced in the House of Commons today that no formal representations had yet been made to Holland with regard to the extradition of the former German Kaiser. He added, however, that steps were being taken in that direction.

Long Voyage Was Wonderful Feat.

The long voyage of the British dirigible R-34 was a wonderful feat. It reminds one of the famous voyage of Christopher Columbus when he discovered this continent. The men were often lost in the clouds but they held on and finally made their objective just before the gasoline supply was exhausted.

The interesting feature of this voyage was the fact that the airship was in communication with the rest of the world by wireless nearly all the time. Even though lost in the clouds or fog the officers were still able to send word of their progress.

Major Scott and the other officers have not only made a record but have shown another example of British pluck and endurance.

Municipalities Want Automobile Licenses.

The City Council was last night asked to endorse the proposal to have the provincial government hand over to the municipalities half of the amount collected from automobile licenses and half the personal property tax charged on cars; the same to be used for improving the roads.

Some such move as this has been discussed for a long time. Before the war it was mentioned, but during the war all suggestions for weakening the taxing power of the province were dropped. Now it comes up again through the automobile associations. All they are asking is that half the amount collected be handed over to the municipalities. The other half is spent by the provincial government in improving the roads outside the cities for the benefit of the city dwellers.

In Prince Rupert the city gets no benefit from outside roads because as yet there are not any. Very soon the provincial government will have to commence construction of a road up the river to the canneries and then we shall get our share of the expenditures.

Naturally the provincial government with its immense inherited debt and with the necessity of spending much money on reconstruction problems and soldiers' rehabilitation, is loath to give up any of its means of raising revenue. It may not see just where it can replace the quarter of a million dollars a year it would have to hand over under the scheme.

Press Service is Great Organization.

Through the widely extended ramifications of the organized press services we are able to read every day of the doings in all parts of the world. This is the much maligned "capitalistic press," the only concern that ever would have made news collecting a possibility.

The evolution of the press is to some extent the evolution of the foreign news service. All the world is now linked up by a network of news agencies that record anything that is happening in any part of the world that is worth a paragraph. No state system would or could ever have arranged such a system. It is a natural growth of the commercializing of the news of the world.

The tired laborer who throws down the paper and says "there is nothing in it" would feel the loss just as much as anyone if the service was stopped. During the strike in a neighboring city when the strikers were vilifying the press and claiming that it never told the truth, one of the leaders often stepped up to the editorial rooms of one of the local dailies to find out how the strikes were progressing in other cities.

The news service is a wonderful organization and even the small services that the local papers can afford to buy would be very much missed if they were stopped.

In the Letter Box

PROPOSED NEW SCHOOL

To the Editor:—
The following is a copy of a letter which I have forwarded to Dr. Kergin, chairman of the school board:

Dear Sir,—As most unusual proceedings were taken by the majority of the trustees during your absence, I beg to place a few facts before you.

When I was invited to prepare drawings I was informed that the trustees had selected and invited three architects and I undertook to prepare the drawings on the following conditions:

(1.) That a day be specified for the lodging of all drawings at the same time.

(2.) That all drawings be hung at once, as usual in all competitions for public buildings, in some room where they could be examined by all interested citizens.

(3.) That I be given an opportunity to explain the drawings to the trustees before they came to a decision as they had not an expert engaged to report on the drawings.

Not one of these conditions were carried out by the trustees and if public rumor is true, the majority had agreed and decided whose plans they were to accept before the formal competition was entered upon.

The Schemes.

No. 1 scheme was prepared by me in accordance with the verbal and written instructions and I was advised to see the King Edward school as a convenient plan of building. I inspected that building and saw that the floor space was too small and the rooms needlessly high, with very defective lighting.

No. 2 scheme was prepared in accordance with the particulars I obtained from the Education Department at Victoria and the class rooms are shown the proper size and otherwise shown in accordance with the written instructions.

Trustee Kirkpatrick informed me that rooms were required for doctor and nurse to attend to eyesight and rooms for the dentist and nurse to attend to the children's teeth, and those are shown in the basement of this scheme, a rather unsuitable place. The same trustee also discussed with me domestic science and instructed me to see the teacher, which I did and discovered that Mrs. Kirkpatrick's domestic science included laundry work, cooking, housekeeping, dressmaking, with very little domestic science as it is known in other places.

Of course provision should be made for such work on the upper floor and not in a basement, as the written and verbal instructions given to me described.

No. 3 scheme was prepared following a copy of the contour plan from the city engineer, showing the elevations of the high land on where I was informed the school may be built. I spent considerable time selecting a suitable site and decided on two places as most suitable for a school of this size, with play grounds, future additions, near the road and on an elevation to obtain a gravity water supply without the use of expensive pumping, and with suitable aspect for all the class rooms. On the plans of this scheme I also suggest a dwelling house for the caretaker and another for the fireman, as usual for buildings of this size.

Each of the three schemes has five different methods of construction described and five estimates of cost; that is 15 prices in all, which I believe did not receive any consideration from the majority of the trustees.

Matter of Sight.

If the newspaper reports are correct, in my opinion, the site selected is very unsuitable, from every point of view, too high for a gravity service of water, for fire protection and the ordinary service of water, and the method of construction as described, is the most expensive and not suitable for this climate.

Is it too late for you to place the drawings that were lodged in competition on exhibition and obtain a report from an expert architect of skill and experience in school design and construction?

In a selected and limited competition of this kind architects are always paid a sufficient amount of money for the work done, and in this case the majority has valued my time at

about 15 cents per hour and sent me a cheque for \$50.00 for the 24 sheets of drawings and report. For the work I did I should receive at least \$450 and will you give instructions for payment of \$400 immediately?

The drawings are in my office and open for your inspection at any time and I enclose a copy of my report.

AUTO TAX FOR GOOD ROADS IS PROPOSAL

City Council Asked to Endorse a Proposal to Have Government Give Half Amount to Municipalities.

At the City Council meeting last night a communication was received from the Nanaimo Automobile Association asking the City Council to endorse a petition which is to be put before a convention to be held later asking the provincial government to allocate half the auto licenses and personal property tax to the municipalities to be used in improving the roads.

The circular explained that there were in the province 18,000 cars which it was estimated would bring \$250,000 during 1919 and the personal property tax on cars of one per cent on an average of \$4,000 per car would net \$180,000, making a total of \$430,000 annually. The cities were getting none of this and they now asked that fifty per cent of it be handed over to the municipalities to be used on good roads.

Ald. McMeekin expressed the opinion that Prince Rupert should get the whole of the amount of the tax.

On motion of Alderman McRae, the chairman appointed Aldermen McMeekin and Currie to make a recommendation to the Council as to what action should be taken.

NO EXTRA HOLIDAY DURING FAIR WEEK

Stores Will Close on Wednesday As Usual, But on no Other Day.

There will be no public holiday during fair week except the regular Wednesday half-holiday provided by statute. In former years it has been customary to have two half-holidays in the week, but the Retail Merchants Association at a recent meeting decided that the one day was sufficient, and at the City Council meeting last night a letter was received explaining their position.

While the extra half-holiday is appreciated by the clerks, the visitors to the city do not appreciate having all the shops closed during the time they are here, and a lot of good business is lost to the local merchants therefrom.

The City Council concurred in the position taken by the Retail Merchants.

FINAL REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FOOD COST

No Material Reduction Can Be Expected Except by Increasing Production and Lowering Distribution Cost.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Ottawa, July 7.—In the House of Commons Saturday night Jas. Douglas, Stratheona, on behalf of George B. Nicholson, chairman, presented the final report of the special committee of the House of Commons appointed to inquire into the cost of foodstuffs, clothing, fuel, etc., throughout Canada.

The committee finds that no material reduction in the cost of commodities in regard to which inquiry was made can be expected except by increasing the volume at a lower cost of production or by lowering the cost of distribution.

The committee does not presume to say there are no cases of undue inflation in prices or of profiteering, but in the main it is the opinion that, having in view the service which the consuming public demands, the margin between the actual cost of production and what the consumer pays for commodities is narrowed.
