CONCERTED ATTACK TO BE KOLCHAK AND FINNISH FORCES

BOLSHEVIKI ARE PLANNING TO EVACUATE PETROGRAD; COUNCIL OF FIVE APPROVE ATTACK ON RUSSIAN CAPITAL BY JOINT ARMIES

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Washington, July 9 .- Definite information that the Bolsheviki are planning to evacuate Petrograd has been received in official circles here. The decision to quit the capital is said to have been violently opposed by some of the elements of the Government.

Paris, July 9 .- Approval of the plan for a concerted attack upon Petrograd by the Finnish forces and troops of the Kolchak Government at Omsk was given today by the Council of Five. A joint note has been sent to the military attaches of Great Britain, France, United States and Italy instructing them to support the Finnish move if it decides to accede to the request of Admirai Kolchak to assist him in the campaign.

FIUME RIOTS

Commission App of Five to Make Report and Advise.



MINISTER OF FINANCE IN UNION GOVERNMENT AMONG THOSE WHO WILL DROP OUT-MEIGHEN SUGGESTED AS HIS SUCCESSOR

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Ottawa, July 9 .- Both Ottawa newspapers state that Sir Thomas White has definitely decided to retire from the Union Government. The Citizen mentions Hon. Arthur Meighen as his possible successor.

Sir William Thomas White was born in Bronte, Ontario, and is 53 years of age. He was educated in Ontario and attended Toronto University, studied law at Osgoode Hall and became Minister of Finance in 1911, at which time he was elected member for Leeds.

When the Borden Conservative Government was reorganized during the war and became the Union Government, Sir Thomas retained the portfolio of finance and during the absence of Sir Robert Borden at the Peace Conference was acting premier. He was looked upon by many as a possible successor to Sir Robert.

Throughout the strike in this city zeal for truth has burnet brightly in the breasts of both the strikers and their opponents. What has been the result? Merely on the one side that the news has gone abroad over North America that this pleasant and peaceful city is keeping out of the grip of red revolution and soviet control only by the grim determination of its embattled citizens; and, on the other, that capital has got its machine guns trained on the labor headquarters, ready at the word of command to blow advocates of economic reform to smithereens!

"Does this represent the truth or the actual facts of the situation? We trow not. Truth is not a so simple and readilyproduced commodity as amateur publishers in their rosy inexperience are apt to think. Only trained minds can weigh truth and search out its meaning. And even judges (who, like the newspapers, exist for the purpose), are sometimes wrong.

"So with reputable newspapers. Being human they err; being fallible they now and then misreports but being honest they-unlike some of our zealots for truth-are always ready to make amends."

How Everyone Can Help

THE Government has developed a liberal and broad plan to help soldiers settle on farms. It is securing land. It is granting substantial loans. It is obtaining advantageous prices on equipment, implements, building materials and live stock. It is providing agricultural training and tarming supervision.

That is as much as the Government itself can do.

But the plan needs more. It needs a community spirit of co-operation.

Already Provincial Governments, Universities, Farmers' Associations, and Veterans' Associations are giving valuable assistance. soldiers; and it is adding to the country's chief industry a body of competent, willing producers.

A few weeks ago George Ely Russell passed through this city Rheumatism, Pain in the Back, on the first lap of a round the world tour, travelling in an 18foot Peterboro' canoe "Wanderer II." from Seattle to St. Michael. Mr. Russell stopped here for a short time and made a number of friends who have since heard of his whereabouts. A journalist and philanthropist, he is out in search of local color for a book which will be written on his travels and also a love of adventure spurs him on. He says that while rowing along he has the time to think of things to which the ordinary man does not give a moment's consideration. 


