CONCERTED ATTACK TO BE MADE ON PETROGRAD BY THE KOLCHAK AND FINNISH FORCES

**BOLSHEVIKI ARE PLANNING TO EVACUATE PETROGRAD;
COUNCIL OF FIVE APPROVE ATTACK ON RUSSIAN
CAPITAL BY JOINT ARMIES**

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Washington, July 9.—Definite information that the Bolsheviks are planning to evacuate Petrograd has been received in official circles here. The decision to quit the capital is said to have been violently opposed by some of the elements of the Government.
Paris, July 9.—Approval of the plan for a concerted attack upon Petrograd by the Finnish forces and troops of the Kolchak Government at Omsk was given today by the Council of Five. A joint note has been sent to the military attaches of Great Britain, France, United States and Italy instructing them to support the Finnish move if it decides to accede to the request of Admiral Kolchak to assist him in the campaign.

TO INVESTIGATE FIUME RIOTS

**Commission Appointed
of Five to Make Report
and Advise.**

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Paris, July 9.—The Council of Five today appointed an international commission to investigate the recent troubles in Fiume and other Adriatic ports between the Italians and other allied soldiers of the forces of occupation.
The commission will be asked to make careful investigations of several statements made by Foreign Minister Titttoni and those coming from Italian sources and to recommend measures for safeguarding the inhabitants of the region affected.

SURVEY WATER POWER

**Provincial Government Expert is
On the Spot at Hagwilget.**

W. Blaine, a surveyor in the employ of the water power branch of the provincial government, arrived Saturday night to survey the water powers along the Bulkley river from Hagwilget to the Murretown canyon, says the Omineca Herald.
Mr. Blaine is very much impressed with the power site under the high level bridge at Hagwilget where the maximum flow of the river passes through a narrow channel with solid rock bottom and rock walls. It is a simple dam proposition and an immense power can be developed very easily.
Mr. Blaine's work is merely that of getting information for the government and there is no hint of any actual development being undertaken. At the same time having this information available in the government offices opens up favorable possibilities for the future.

FOREST FIRES

Calgary, July 9.—Forest fires near here continue serious. The worst fire is that just west of the border of the Sarcee Indian reserve near the city. It is feared the fires will cross into the reserve.

GATE RECEIPTS ARE LESS THAN HALF MILLION

Only Slightly Over Twenty Thousand People Witnessed the Big Fight.

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Toledo, July 9.—The gate receipts of the heavyweight championship contest between Jack Dempsey and Jess Willard here on July 4 were announced tonight at approximately \$452,000. The attendance, promoter Tex Ricard said, was between 20,000 and 21,000. These approximate figures are authorized by Ricard because of the delay in arriving at the official attendance and receipts.
Revenue agents are checking up the fight receipts to decide how much war tax is coming to the Government and they will not finish their task until late tomorrow.
Promoter Tex Ricard left for New York last night without knowing exactly how much money the contest drew.

CARPENTIER WOULD FIGHT JACK DEMPSEY

ALL EVIDENCE BE PUBLISHED

Secret Testimony on Sinking of Lusitania to be Given to Press.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
London, July 9.—The Board of Trade announces that evidence given secretly at the inquiry into the sinking of the Lusitania which opened in London June 15, 1915, at a public hearing. The first days of the session were interrupted in order to assist the court to take evidence in secret regarding instructions sent by wireless to Captain Turner of the Lusitania by the Admiralty. This was the only secret testimony taken at the public inquiry which ended July 17, but a private session was held on July 18 at which Solicitor-General Smith represented the Board of Trade and Butler Aspinall acted for the company.

OPPOSITION TO TRYING KAISER

British Press Against Project and Similar Sentiment in Other Countries.

London, July 9.—Strong opposition continues to develop in the British press against the project of trying the former German Emperor in London or trying him at all.
Despatches have been received saying that the United States and Japan are opposed to the trial and that Italy is lukewarm. The trial would probably have a bad effect on sentiment here.

SIR THOMAS WHITE IS TO RETIRE FROM GOVERNMENT

**MINISTER OF FINANCE IN UNION GOVERNMENT AMONG
THOSE WHO WILL DROP OUT—MEIGHEN
SUGGESTED AS HIS SUCCESSOR**

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Ottawa, July 9.—Both Ottawa newspapers state that Sir Thomas White has definitely decided to retire from the Union Government. The Citizen mentions Hon. Arthur Meighen as his possible successor.
Sir William Thomas White was born in Bronte, Ontario, and is 53 years of age. He was educated in Ontario and attended Toronto University, studied law at Osgoode Hall and became Minister of Finance in 1911, at which time he was elected member for Leeds.
When the Borden Conservative Government was reorganized during the war and became the Union Government, Sir Thomas retained the portfolio of finance and during the absence of Sir Robert Borden at the Peace Conference was acting premier. He was looked upon by many as a possible successor to Sir Robert.

American Consul Wakefield addressed the Board of Trade at their regular monthly luncheon on board the steamer Prince George today. There was a good attendance.

The charge against Jabour Brothers of keeping open for business on Dominion Day which had been adjourned came before Magistrate McMullin yesterday and was dismissed. Mrs. Frizzell gave evidence for the prosecution.

Among those to return on the train last night was Pte. Lemon of this city who has seen service in France since the early days of the war. The returned man will now make his residence here with his mother who lives on Ninth Avenue East.

A farewell dance was given at the school recently to Mr. Nelson, the school teacher prior to his leaving for Toronto. During the course of the evening there were some speeches and the guest thanked everyone for the entertainment and expressed regret at leaving. He was very popular in the neighborhood.

Three new teachers will be required at the public schools for the next term. Miss Hinsley and Miss Glenn will not return to resume their former positions on the staff. An additional teacher will also be required to take the place of M. A. McDonald, the former principal at King Edward school, who has now been appointed superintendent of all the city public schools.

RIOTS FOLLOW STRIKE

Springfield, Ill., July 9.—Two men were killed and nine wounded in a riot at the Corn Products Refining Co.'s plant at Arcola, where 1,000 men walked out, demanding a closed shop.

WILSON FLAYS HIS OPPONENTS

**Says He Has no Doubt as to Their
Part and Purpose in Opposing Him.**

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Washington, July 9.—President Wilson reached Washington at midnight after an absence of four months at the Paris Peace Conference.
In the first speech delivered on United States soil since the Peace Treaty was signed the president declared that the peace concluded at Paris was a "Just peace which, if it can be preserved, will safeguard the world from unnecessary bloodshed."

The only reference the president made to political opponents was when referring to the negotiations at Paris he said: "I am afraid some people do not understand that vision. They do not seem to see it. They have looked too much upon the ground. They have thought too much of interests that were near them and they have not listened to the voices of neighbors. I have never had a moment's doubt as to where the part and purposes of this people lay."

WELL KNOWN UNITED STATES NOVELIST DIES

Knoxville, Tenn., July 9.—John Fox, Jr., the well known novelist, died at his home, Big Stone Gap, Va., today after a brief illness from pneumonia. Mr. Fox who was 56 years old was one of America's most prominent writers of fiction, his novels dealing with life among the mountains of the south having a wide sale.

In the Letter Box

To the Editor:—

I have read with much pleasure the letters in answer to Jennie Smith's letter re Sunday observance and would also like to be allowed the privilege of adding a few remarks to those already given.

In whatsoever way our views may differ from those of Miss Smith, the very fact of there being so many letters in answer to hers shows that the letter has done us some good, if that good has only been to make us think for ourselves as well as for others.

Personally, I cannot say that I agree with the manner in which Miss Smith has expressed herself. We are living in an age when tactfulness in every phase of life counts for much and we must not allow our desire to do good to be overruled by lack of tactfulness or in other words to express ourselves too hastily.

Is It Abolished?

One in answering Miss Smith's letter and who signs himself "Publican" remarked that the observance of the Sabbath, a Jewish custom, had been abolished and done away with.

If we read certain portions in the old and new testaments we find such a statement corrected. First in the old testament, Exodus 31st chap., 12-13 verses, where God commands that the Sabbath be kept holy as a sign between him and his chosen followers throughout all generations. (The need of rest here being emphasized both in nature and in the human life). And in the new testament in Matt. 5, verses 17-19, where Christ makes it very plain concerning the keeping of the commandments and the keeping of the Mosaic law.

Necessary Work.

Re some work which may appear necessary to do on the Sabbath and about which some may contend they are justified in doing, the only true guarantee which one can receive to such a query can come through the conscience, and all those who through force of circumstances or others who compel themselves to labor on the Sabbath are the greatest losers.

Regarding the using of the sewing machine on the Sabbath, I would like to ask Christian men and women if they do not thin there is need of a change in the lives of many faithful mothers who are expected to keep steadily toiling from Sunday to Sunday without a murmur.

Are there not here many opportunities for Christian service by those who are more leisurely circumstanced.

IN THE LETTER BOX**THE DRUG HABIT**

To the Editor:

The New York police have opened war on illicit drug vendors and gathered in hundreds of drug addicts to bring evidence from them. The prevalence of the drug habit in that city is said to be appalling. Similar stories come from London and other European centres of population. The Toronto Globe of April 19, says:

"Despite free access of both sexes to the bars in the Motherland, women have recently resorted to the use of methylated spirits. Many cases have arisen where women have gone to oil and paint shops with the plea that the spirit was intended for mixing paint. Seven times stronger than ordinary whiskey, and containing a number of ingredients considered sufficient to stop any desire to drink it, the Liverpool licensing justices assert that its use as a beverage is increasing. Its effect has been shown as terrible, a frantic state while under its influence gradually giving place to insanity."

Drugs Go With Alcohol.

A favorite argument of the liquor dealers has been that if alcoholic liquors were prohibited people would take to drugs, but it has been shown over and over again that where the most alcohol was consumed there has been found the greatest number of drug fiends. The number who have begun by taking morphine and other drugs as medicine are very few. As a general rule a man becomes an alcohol fiend first and after a time finds that he must have something stronger to satisfy his craving.

Knockout Drops.

The French began on wine; then they went to brandy, and then to alcohol, which was called the spirit of wine. But even that failed to give relief, and absinthe was invented. On account of its terrible effects it has been called "knockout drops." When a person begins this course nothing but a miracle will save him. We must kill alcohol before we can conquer the drug habit.
