## Great Waterways Joint Scheme for St. Lawrence and Lakes Made Public

OTTAWA, April 17.—Canada is to provide for the construction of the waterway in the sections wholly within Canada, that is the Welland Canal and the works in the St. Lawrence below the international boundary.

The United States is asked to consider undertaking the completion of 27 foot waterways to the head of the lakes in addition to meeting the entire cost of the development under joint technical supervision on the lines to be agreed upon on the international section of the St. Lawrence, both for navigation and power.

HIS is in brief the suggestion which is the basis of negotiations submitted by the Canadian government to the United States government on the St. Lawrence waterways scheme as rerealed in correspondence made public last night.

The documents not only give the correspondence exchanged beween the two governments, they include a report of the Canaan National advisory committee and observations by two members

## SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

PRE-EMPTIONS

Vacant, unreserved, surveyed rown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age. and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, condidonal upon residence, occapation, and improvement for agricultural

"How to Pre-empt Land," copies of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Government Agent.

only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 8,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 5,000 feet per acre east of that

Applications for pre-emptions are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner. Pre-emptions must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be

received. For more detailed information see the Bulletin "How to Pre-empt

PURCHASE

Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes; minimum price for first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin Lease of Crown Lands."

Mill, factory, or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres. TIMBER SALE X9786 may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment stumpage.

HOMESITE LEASES Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtainable after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed

LEASES For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

GRAZING

Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under a Grazing Commissioner. grazing permits are issued based on numbers ranged, priority being given to established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free, or partly free, permits are available for settlers, campers and travellors, up to



WASHINGTON, D.C., April 17.—The Mc-Nary-Haugen farm relief bill, carrying features which caused President Coolidge to veto it last year, was passed by the senate and sent to the house which also is expected to approve it.

The vote was 53 to 23, compared to 47 to 39 at the last session. While this is more than two-thirds majority which would be required to override a veto, it is regarded as doubtful that with the full membership present a two thirds majority could be obtained.
