

Dockrill and the district mining engineer making recognition of the list of public works needing attention. which had been submitted to them following the last quarterly meeting, and promising every co-operation in having these satisfactorily carried out.

resolutions Supplementary were drawn up asking for special attention from the public works department for jearly and permanent improvements to Spring Creek hill on the Kalum Lake road and some permanent road building being carried out on the Remo road, which at present is unworthy of the name of road. It was decided to ask the divisional engineer to come to Terrace and make a trip over the roads, accompanied by a memper of the board of trade to be appointed by the chair. Places most requiring attention could then be noted and action taken as soon as possible.

A letter was read from F. M. Dockrill regarding the welldrilling outfit for which request had been made to have sent to Terrace. Mr. Dockrill explained that the full equipment had still not arrived at Smithers, but that as soon as the work required in the Smithers district was finished he would use his influence to have it sent to Terrace.

# MILL IS SOLD FOR \$100,000

Red Mountain Lumber Co. Convey Plant to Campbell & Meyers

P. F. Campbell and J. P. Meyers, who have been milling at Otway in the Prince George district under the style of the Cranbrook Sawmills, have purchased the assets of the Red Mountain Lumber Co.., operating a sawmill, at Penny. The price is reported to have been in the vicinity of \$100,000 and the purchase did not include the stock of lumber in the yards.

It is the intention of the purchasers to continue the operation of the Otway mill and planer until the end of next April when their activities will be transferred to Penny under the name of the Red Mountain Lumber ( Ltd.

With the disposal of three million feet of lumber still in the yards at Penny, Roy Spurr will terminate his connection with the lumber industry of the Prince George district with which he has been identified since 1917.

The Red Mountain mill has a cutting capacity of 50,000 feet. Other assets of the company included in the sale were five million feet of skidded logs and standing timber estimated to be sufficient for fifteen years' operation.
