Good ore has been encountered in diamond drilling at the Topley mine. Several ore shoots with good values in gold and silver are reported to have been struck at depth by No. 2 drill working simply pausing for reflection. to test the east vein. the long No. 1 tunnel at the Victory mine on Hudson Bay Mountain near Smithers which is being operated by Capt. J. J. O'Brien of Philadelphia. Great enthusiasm prevails as a result of this strike for it is taken to assure the continuity of ore measures not only on the Victory but on several other surrounding properties including the Duthie. Work under the supervision of Frank H. Taylor has been carried out continuously in the extension of No. 1 tunnel and also the No. 2 tunnel at a higher level on the Victory. Recently the No. 2 tunnel was discontinued as being of secondary importance to proving ore in the lower tunnel and to speed up this work a new and complete plant was installed about a month ago. The point where the ore was uncovered is 586 feet from the portal of the tunnel. Work will be continued on tunnel driving in the expectation of tapping a much larger vein about thirty feet ahead. This latter vein is the largest and most important on the property and, should similar sucess attend the effort, a campaign of drifting on the veins will be inaugurated


