Germany Ratifies the Treaty of Peace with the Allied and Associated Powers at Weimar

Carried in National Assembly of the Republic by Vote of 208 to 115 with 99 Deputies Refusing to Vote; The Resoluiton was a very Short One.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Weimar, via Coblenz, July 10.—A resolution ratifying the peace treaty was adopted by the German National Assembly today by a vote of 208 to 115.

The text of the ratification resolution introduced into the Assembly consisted of two clauses reading as follows:

"The Peace Treaty between Germany and the Allied and Associated powers, signed on June 28, 1919, and the protocol beginning as well as the agreement relative to the occupation of Rhineland signed the same day, are agreed to.

"This law comes into effect on the day of its promulgation." Ninety-nine deputies abstained from voting on the resolution.

CRIMEA ENTIRELY CLEARED OF BOLSHEVIKI TROOPS BY GENERAL DENIKINE'S ARMY

TEN THOUSAND PRISONERS TAKEN AND A NUMBER OF GUNS—SOLE LINE OF COMMUNICATION HAS BEEN CUT

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, July 10.—The Crimea has been entirely cleared of the Bolsheviki by an advance of General Denikine's troops across the Dnieper River, according to a War Office statement issued today. The advance was over a front of seventy miles and deprived the Bolsheviki of their sole line of communication between the main forces and those in the Crimea.

General Denikine's volunteers have met with great success on all parts of the front. They have reached a point on the Caspian Sea fifty-five miles southwest of Astrakhan, and another column is on the banks of the Volga, northwest of Tchernoiar.

In capturing Tharitzin, Denikine's forces took 10,000 prisoners and a number of guns. They are now only 75 miles from Khartov, having captured Ekateritoslav and Alexandrovsk.

WOULD MAINTAIN FRIENDLY RELATIONS

Rome, July 10.—The premier of Italy in a speech here yesterday said that the peace negotiations must be concluded and that friendly relations with the allies, especially with France, must be maintained.

Authorities Announce That They Will Use Force to Open Closed Shops.

Rome, July 10.—Cavalry are patrolling the streets of the city today dispersing groups of food rioters in front of the stores. There were few cases of looting. Most of the stores were closed and the authorities announced they would use the utmost force to reopen them.

COL. McMORDIE NOW POLICE MAGISTRATE

Only Recently Returned From Overseas; Will be on Bench Tomorrow.

Lieut.-Col. McMordie has been appointed police magistrate for the city of Prince Rupert to fill the vacancy caused through the death of the late Alfred Cars. He was present in court this forenoon and will take his seat on the bench tomorrow.

Colonel McMordie has been in Prince Rupert since construction days when he was engaged in contracting, except for the time he was overseas fighting the battles of the Empire. He was among the first to offer his service, leaving here under Capt. Clayton and returning only recently.

PREMIER BORDEN HOPES SIR THOMAS WHITE KEEPS JOB

Ottawa, July 10.—The chances of Hon. Arthur Meighen, minister of the interior, succeeding Sir Thomas White as finance minister is much discussed here.

There is a possibility of Hon. A. K. McLean going back to the Liberal party and assertions of his friends that he would not care to be finance minister lends color to the statements of those who succeed to the position.

So far as Sir Robert Borden is concerned he has nothing to say with regard to the resignation of Sir Thomas White. It is understood he still hopes Sir Thomas may be induced to reconsider his decision.

FOREST FIRES NEAR CALGARY SERIOUS

Calgary, July 10.—The forest fires near here are growing more serious. The Elbow river fire has jumped the river to the south and has crossed to the Sarcee Reserve where it is rapidly advancing.

BIG AIRSHIP RETURN TRIP TO SCOTLAND

R-34 Leaves New York and Will Travel by Southerly Route.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Mineola, N. Y., July 10.—The British dirigible R-34 which arrived here direct from Scotland on Sunday started on its return trip to Scotland shortly before midnight.

The immense airship flew to New York and after circling the city started on its long flight across the Atlantic. It is proposed to take a more southerly route than in flying west as it is hoped that by so doing the fog and dense cloud of the more northerly route will be avoided.

Held in Leash.

Before the great ship left she was held in leash by 1,000 balloon men. Released at 11:55 p. m. she floated leisurely up to a height of 2,000 feet with the motors silent. The engines then began to whirr nosing upward and headed for New York.

The great searchlights on the ship made her clearly discernible to the thousands who had gathered to bid her bon voyage. With three engines, port, starboard and forward, running and two others in reserve the R-34 glided off towards the south, then swung in a westerly course pointing her nose in the direction of New York.

Three Minutes to Rise.

It took the airship about three minutes to rise to the height at which she began cruising. At 11:59 she was about 5,000 feet up, barely discernible and with no lights visible was skimming along at about 35 miles an hour.

TRIED TO AVERT WAR SAYS HENRY

Brother of Ex-Kaiser Began King George to Desist From Extradition Preparations.

Berlin, July 10.—Prince Henry, brother of the former Kaiser, telegraphed King George, it was learned today, begging him "in the name of justice" that Britain desist from her preparations for the extradition of the ex-Kaiser. Prince Henry declared he knows Wilhelm endeavored to avert war and referred to the conversation he had with King George on July 7, 1914.

POSSIBILITIES OF PORT DISCUSSED BY SPEAKER AT BOARD OF TRADE LUNCH

E. A. WAKEFIELD, AMERICAN CONSUL, GIVES INTERESTING ADDRESS ON BOARD S. S. PRINCE GEORGE, HIS SUBJECT BEING "PRINCE RUPERT"

E. A. Wakefield was the speaker at the regular monthly meeting of the Board of Trade held on board the S. S. Prince George yesterday afternoon. He dealt in a comprehensive manner with the port of Prince Rupert, its advantages and its possibilities. He spoke of the landlocked harbor, the industries, the scenery and climate, and at the close he received a hearty vote of thanks, moved by Alex. Manson, M. P. P.

"Prince Rupert is one of the most energetic, optimistic and promising ports on the Pacific or any other coast," said the speaker. "We don't have to prove it, we admit it cheerfully without argument. And, say, did you ever notice that the man or community having the self assertiveness and requisite nerve to proclaim his or its own importance and to persist in that proclamation is pretty nearly sure to make it go? Think it over. Are the citizens of Prince Rupert going to be content with knowing and admitting that this is one of the really magnificent harbors of the world? I wonder."

"Is the business of Prince Rupert's citizens to have the world in general, and the citizens of the northern part of this continent in particular, realize what a splendid port this really is and what a commercial asset such a port must prove to be when developed?"

Railroad.

Prince Rupert exists today as a result of the foresight of some of the most capable railroad men of this world has produced, Chas. M. Hays and his associates. If we accept their judgment the railroad they built is destined to become one of the great trans-continental arteries of commerce serving to unite eastern Canada with the west. And this port is peculiarly favorably situated for an entre and exit port for trade with the Far East with its uncounted millions and unlimited markets for the products of the Western Hemisphere.

"What are your arguments in favor of support of the claims set forth as to the advantages of this port? Primarily it has a harbor entirely landlocked, easily accessible, nearly 500 miles nearer the Orient than any other port and large enough to accommodate the entire Pacific coast trade. Secondly, Prince Rupert is the terminal of a splendid transcontinental railway, having decidedly the best grade through the mountains of any railroad on the American continent. And in addition this railroad has some of the most efficient and genial officials to be found anywhere. I do not believe in tiresome compliments or fulsome flattery, but the officials in this neck of the woods are not only practical railway men but they are loyal to the railroad, to the city and to the people and to crown all they are mighty good fellows."

Drydock.

"Next we have the great drydock with the shipbuilding and repair plant. No harbor can be complete without such a plant unless it is immediately adjacent. Do we fully realize what an asset that plant is to prove to this port in the years to come? Have you failed to notice the difference that the establishment of this plant has already made in your city? The employment of laborers, mechanics, skilled artisans and officials, all of whom spend their money here and most of whom are interested in the development of the city along permanent lines. Witness the energies put forth by the president, vice-president and superintendent. I wouldn't pay either of them a compliment for words, but they are pretty good oldtimers and scouts after all."

Fisheries.

"Next we might mention the fisheries which are of great importance in developing the port. Then the mineral resources which are just beginning to be properly appreciated. There seems to be no reasonable doubt that the

Portland Canal District is one of the really great mining sections of this continent.

Lumber, Etc.

"The lumber industry with the pulp and paper manufactures which are certainly going to be among the great commercial features of the future will show up each year with increasing importance. There are large stretches of the hinterland adjacent to this city said to be suitable for agriculture and stock raising, which will be inhabited in the near future."

FOOD STOCKS ARE WASTING

U. S. Government's Huge Stocks of Army Foodstuffs Alleged Deteriorating Though Badly Needed.

Washington, July 9.—Millions of pounds of meat and canned vegetables are being kept on hand by the War Department, deteriorating while the American public needs every ounce of food. This statement was made by C. W. Hare, director of sales for the department, before the committee investigating war expenditures.

This food, he said, consists of 75,000,000 pounds of bacon, 5,800,000 pounds of ham, 850,000,000 worth of canned meats and \$100,000,000 worth of canned vegetables.

This foodstuff was offered for sale recently by the War Department, but only one bid was received, which was for less than half the value of the goods, which the department refused to accept. It was expected that most of this food would be disposed of to foreign countries, as for it all to be thrown on the United States market would demoralize business for some considerable time.

Sport

For the past few weeks a very popular pastime among the young people has been canoeing and rowing among the many bays and inlets across the harbor. The long evenings give an opportunity for three or four hours of delightful exercise.

Yesterday afternoon there were a large number of swimming enthusiasts over at the Salt Lake. The water was in fine condition and according to those who have been swimming since the beginning of the season it is becoming warmer. Added facilities are rapidly making this delightful spot very favorable for good racing and water sports of all kinds.

A number of the younger boys of Prince Rupert show great interest in baseball for the same ones are down playing on Market Place nearly every fine evening in the week. They are taking a close note of all the special plays and in time will show that they are made of the right stuff.

Some of the girls are very enthusiastic over baseball and besides attending all the ball games have practised themselves once in a while. They have the right spirit and the work out on Market Place yesterday was evidence of what they might show their big brothers.

How Everyone Can Help

THE Government has developed a liberal and broad plan to help soldiers settle on farms. It is securing land. It is granting substantial loans. It is obtaining advantageous prices on equipment, implements, building materials and live stock. It is providing agricultural training and farming supervision.

That is as much as the Government itself can do. But the plan needs more. It needs a community spirit of co-operation.

Already Provincial Governments, Universities, Farmers' Associations, and Veterans' Associations are giving valuable assistance. Many manufacturers and sellers of farm supplies have agreed to allow the soldier settlers special prices. Men who have had experience in lending money on farm property are serving on Advisory Loan Committees, judging land values.

But even such practical assistance is not enough. In each community farmers can be of real service to the soldier settler. They can give him advice about local conditions. They can lend him an extra horse or plough, give him a day's help at seeding or harvest time, and extend to him that friendly, neighborly, respectful spirit which he deserves.

In this way Canada is performing a double duty. It is discharging, as far as possible, the debt we owe to our soldiers; and it is adding to the country's chief industry a body of competent, willing producers.

There were in all 28 cases brought before the court and 24 convictions were secured. There were 10 drunks, 4 vagrancy, 1 shoplifting, 4 offences against the Prohibition Act, 4 under the Drug Act, 2 under the Indian Act, 1 Alien enemy, 1 offence against the motor traffic act, and 1 assault.

POSSIBILITIES OF PORT DISCUSSED BY SPEAKER AT BOARD OF TRADE LUNCH

(Continued From Page One.)

ture by people who are looking for permanent homes.

"And last but by no means least British Columbia has some of the most magnificent scenery which was ever spattered on the map by a lavish painter, and it is all within easy reaching distance of this port. Where there is scenery there tourists will come, and where the tourists visit the money flows in a steady stream.

"Another factor likely to be useful in developing foreign trade is the proximity of the great wheat producing sections of Canada to this port. These are some of the most important items on the credit side of the balance sheet. Now what is there on the debit side which must be overcome or offset if this harbor is to be a serious factor in trans-Pacific trade and Prince Rupert is to become a port of more than local importance. Primarily, secondly, thirdly, confoundedly dogmat, syst, indisputably, commercially, industrially, moreoverly and howsoeverly, there is not a steamer plying the waters of the Pacific between Prince Rupert and the Far East. And I am sure it is no strain upon the grey matter with which a beneficent Lord endowed us to realize that it is difficult to export merchandise without ships. If you have ships, facilities for loading and unloading ships would become an immediate necessity. These you lack at present.

Capital and Labor.

One great and human trouble with this old world is that it is just now very weary. For nearly five years it has been at agony pitch and under a more tremendous strain than ever before since it commenced to revolve. We are all alike in wishing that things would become normal again and we could go on as before. But between then and now there is work to be done as vast and as complicated and as exacting as anything we have been called upon to do. The first requisite looking toward normal life is for the everyday industrial and commercial activities to resume something like their former scope of activities. This requires the active and energetic participation by both capital and labor and both have seemed to be reluctant to start until peace was finally assured. Now that the treaty is a fact may we not reasonably hope that such mutual participation will become a fact. It is up to each and every one of us to realize that the conditions of

life have absolutely changed and that in all probability they have changed permanently.

Partner in Concern.

"When I spoke of the resumption of former activities I did not mean exactly under former conditions. Relative values have changed and the conditions which formerly governed the employer and the employee have changed. In the future relations the employee will come to be considered more and more as a partner in the concern furnishing employment. At least that seems to be the opinion of students of economic conditions and who may be supposed to have sound ideas on the subject. It is no use for a man or a community to sit round waiting for some one to drop large juicy commercial plums in his or its mouth. The world is long on droppers and short on droppees.

"You often hear people speak of the good old days. Well the good old days are gone for keeps and the man who does not realize that is pretty apt to draw a blank in the lottery of ordinary business. We have all of us been under the necessity of listening to some of these old time songsters. Did you ever particularly notice them? Most of them have retreating chins and all of them have retreating minds. If you can't bury the good old day stuff for keeps the next grave you dig will likely be for your bank roll.

A New Order.

"The individual or the community trying to win against present day competition by the stuff that won in the good old days will wake up sitting beside the road to success wondering what it was that whizzed past. A new order, national and international, is upon us and we must recognize that fact if we are to keep up with the procession. There are many who like to look backward and make comparisons. So did Lot's wife but looking backward ossified her.

Let us have a brief look at the good old days. A hundred years ago there were no gas jets, electric lights telephones or telegraph. Fifty years ago automobiles, phonographs and moving pictures were locked in the brains of the men who gave them to the world. Seventy-five years ago wireless telegraphy, aeroplanes and reliable antiseptic were no more known to the world than to the man in the moon. Every dawn is a new day and, under new conditions, a day of promise, of golden opportunity, of magical possibilities. To the young community like Prince Rupert the future beckons with irresistible gesture. Heed the gesture and embrace the opportunity.

COMMISSION REFUSES TO RECOMMEND

Letter From City Council to the Police Commission Filed After Long Discussion.

On the reading of a communication from the City Council asking for a final decision as to what they recommended in connection with the cancelling of the license following a conviction in the Zarelli case, the letter was ordered filed and no action was taken on it. The resolution to file was moved by Commissioner Macdonald and seconded by Commissioner Hill, and supported by the mayor.

In speaking to the resolution Commissioner Macdonald said the commissioners were elected just as were the aldermen. Formerly there was a political touch to the commission but now they had just as much backing as the aldermen. The council was not going to shove any responsibility on him that he was not willing to assume. He had no idea of being responsible to the council. He would not waste time discussing questions over which they had no authority.

Commissioner Hill said that they had made recommendations in the past of which no notice had been taken. He was not sure if these reached the council. He discussed the matter of discrimination against Zarelli.

Mayor's Stand.
The mayor said that some of the aldermen did not know what they were talking about, when they said they had the impression that the chairman was not one way or the other. He had been opposed to cancelling Zarelli's license because it would seem like discrimination. Fotos, whose license was cancelled, was playing blackjack which was an illegal game, and there were other features that looked bad. In Zarelli's club they were playing poker, something to which it was understood there was no objection.

Commissioner Hill suggested that the police should be backed up in enforcing the law. The only objection he had against the raid was that it was done without the consent of the chief. If they did not uphold the police it was no use trying to enforce the law. When there was evidence against a man action should be taken.

No Interference.
Commissioner Macdonald said that the act under which the conviction was got was known to be going on. They were told that as long as the professional element was kept out there would be no interference. Blackjack was illegal, poker was not. Zarelli had been made a kind of a goat. Some of the aldermen had pointed out the fact that gambling was going on. All gamblers, however, do not play cards. Some gambled in real estate. A number of the aldermen had not sand enough to back up their feelings. He never intended to be the tool of the City Council.

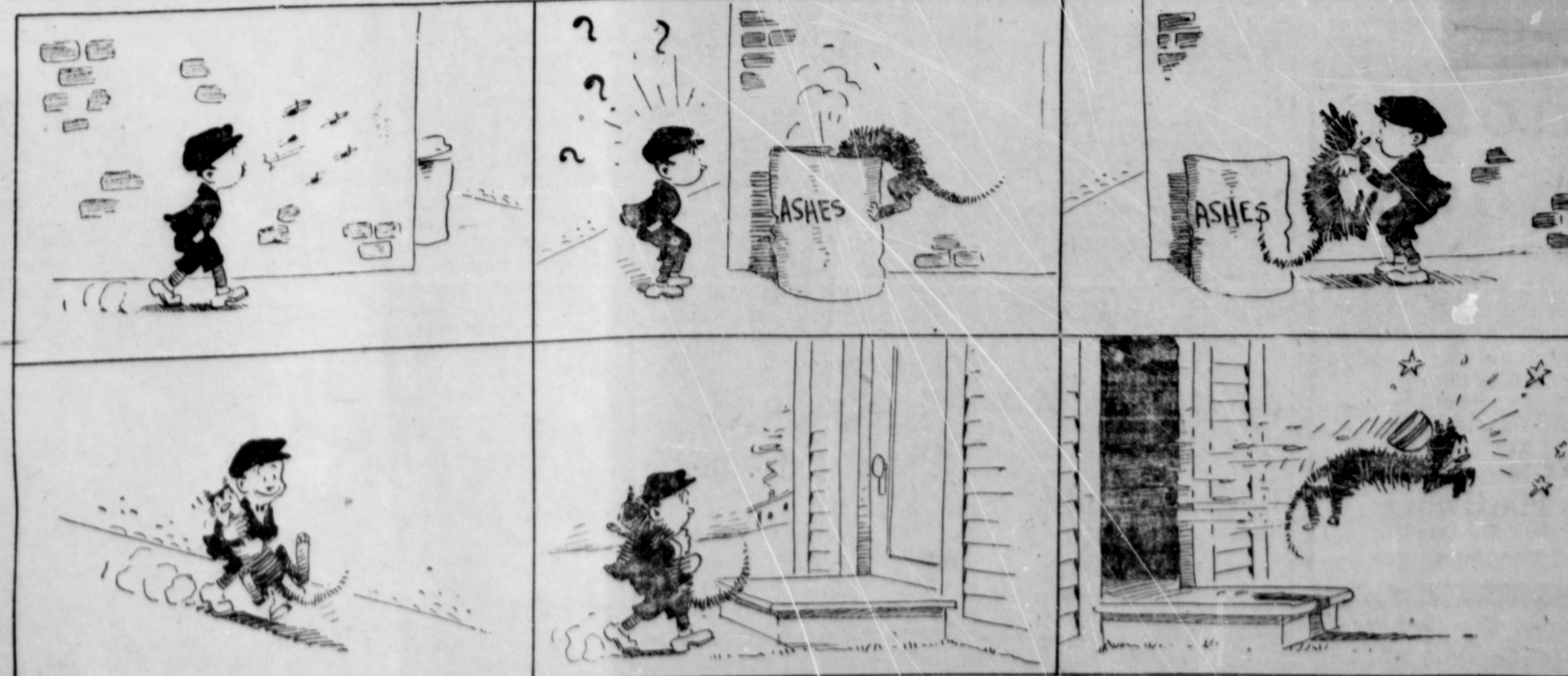

PLANS TO INCREASE COTTON PRODUCTION WITHIN THE EMPIRE

United States Bank Discusses Probable Action of British Colonies in Near Future.

New York, July 10.—Plans on the part of Great Britain to free itself from dependence upon the United States for cotton supplies are discussed by the National Bank of Commerce in its latest Monthly Review. India, Egypt and the African colonies are all producing cotton at present, although in comparative small quantities compared with the production of the southern States of the Union.

From these sources it is planned to increase most extensively the production of the raw cotton for the supplying of the textile mills, which form such a large industry in the midlands of England, and thus keep all the processes of production and manufacture within the British Empire. Japan is also aiming at being commercially self contained, so far as cotton is concerned, and is already actively engaged in making Korea the chief source of supply for her industries.

ITALIAN CITIES REPORTED IN THE HANDS OF SOVIETS

Paris, July 10.—Reports received here today from Italy indicate that a number of Italian cities are virtually in the hands of sovietists composed of radicals in some cases and conservatives in others.

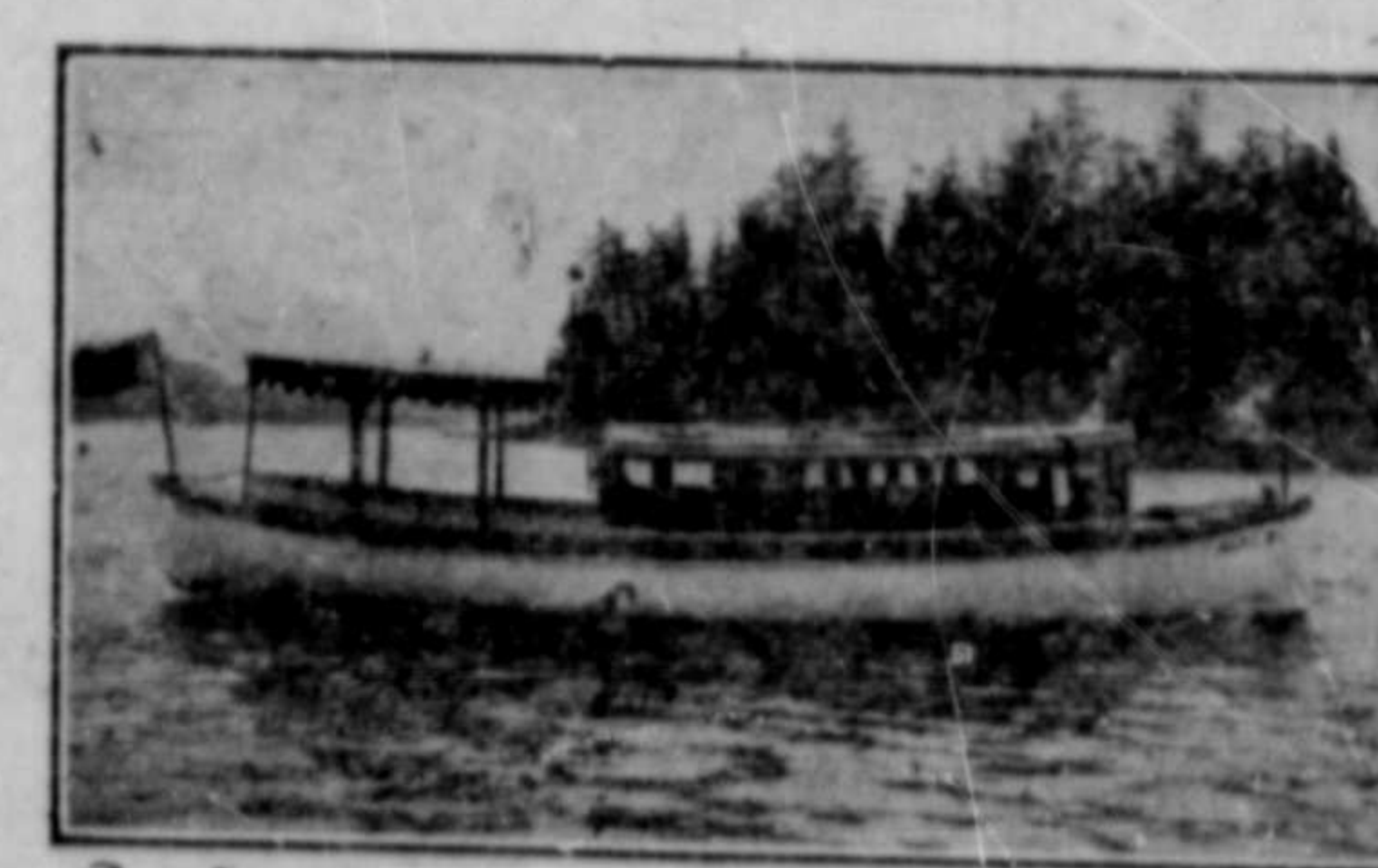
