LOOKS LIKE WIN FOR THE LIBERALS

DR. MALMGREN WAS LEFT BY COMPANIONS IN ICE GRAVE

Much Criticism of Dr. Malmgren Being Left Alive in Grave of Ice

Soviet Press Also Objects to Conduct of Expedition and to General Noble Being Rescued Before Others

MOSCOW, July 16.—Statements by companions of Dr. Finn Malmgren who survived the crash of the Italia, that he was left alive in a grave of ice caused a storm of criticism in Russia today.

They started from the scene of the crash across the ice for land on May 20. They suffered untold privations and for days drifted on floating ice.

Strong criticism also was expressed by the Soviet press of General Noble being rescued first and on the conduct of the Italia expedition.

MOSCOW, July 16.—The Russian aviator Chukhrovsky and four companions marooned by a forced landing near Cape Platen on July 12 were taken aboard the Krassin Sunday night.

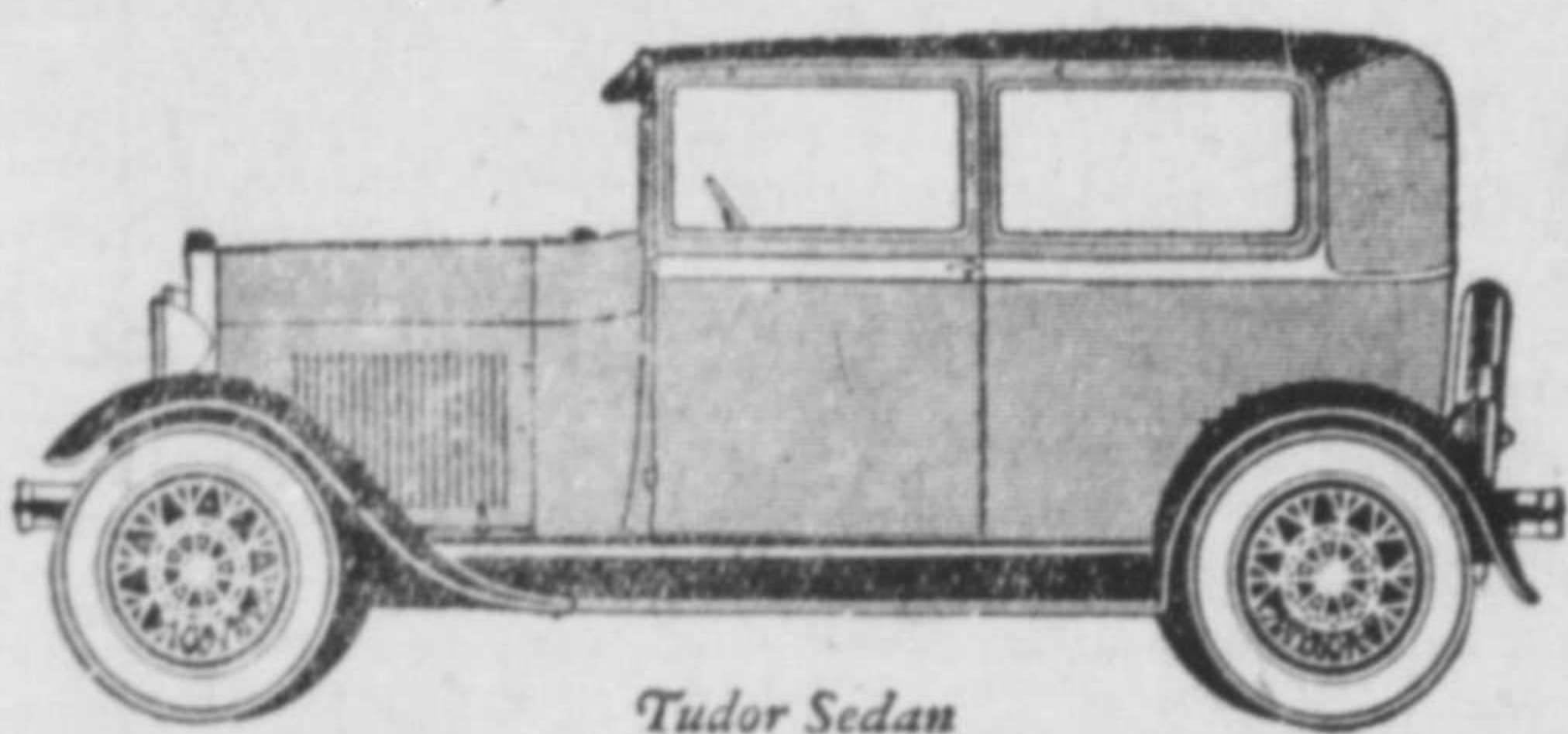

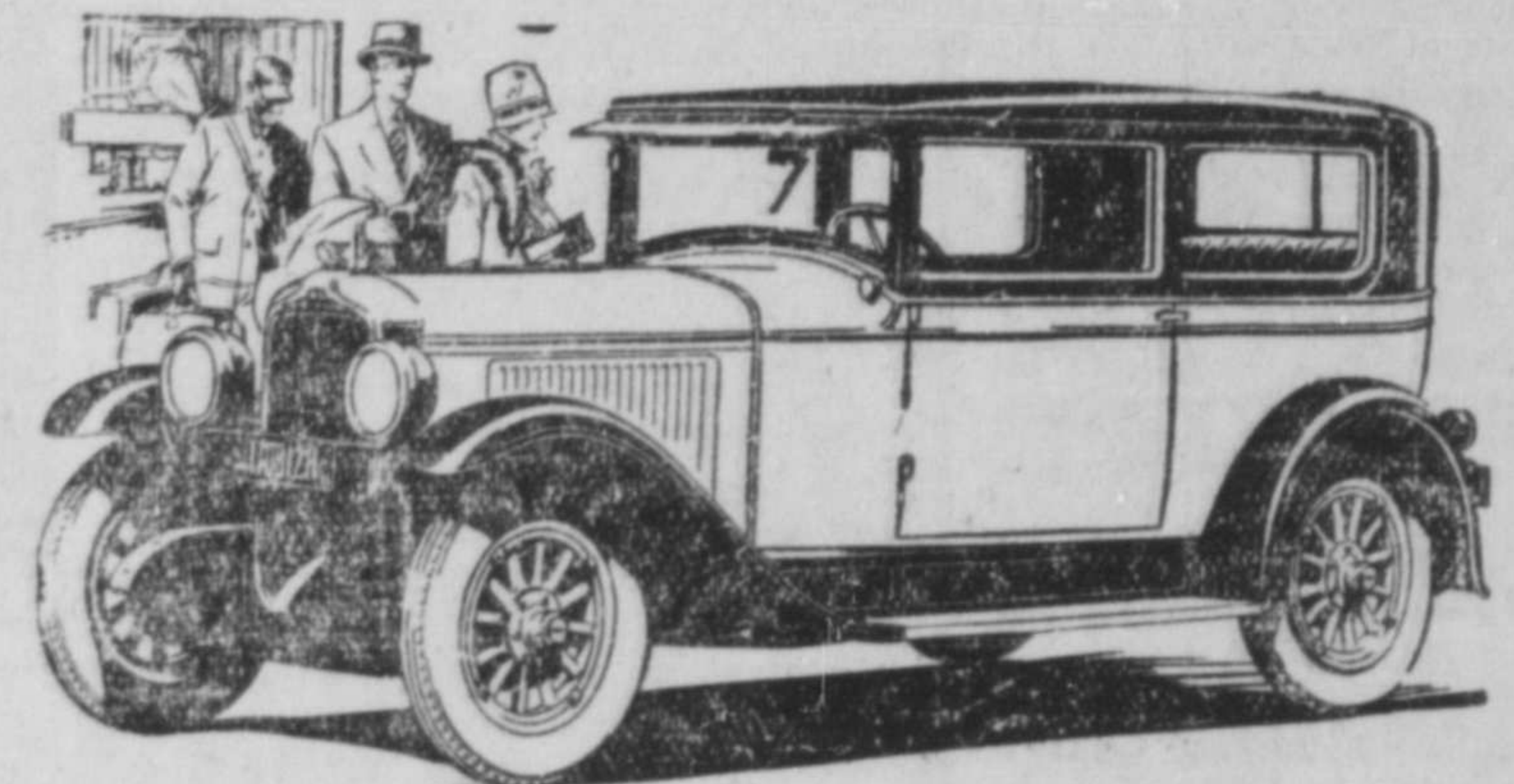
