Washington, July 11.—The peace treaty including the League LAWLESS ACTS Nations Covenant was laid before the Senate by President Wilson ay in an address accounting to the country for his part in the rotiations at Versailles.

"The League," declared the president, "is born of the conviction actically stated that an international concern had become a world cessity to end the old order and guarantee civilization." He asted that in such a concern the world looked confidently to the ited States for leadership, and added that while the treaty might t be exactly as the United States délegation would have written it, vital sacrifice had been made by necessary compromises.

President Wilson conferred with the newspaper correspondents d indicated gratification that the treaty of peace had been ratified promptly by the German National Assembly. The President ineated that trade relations between Germany and the associated tions should be resumed at the earliest possible moment.

Millions of dollars were spent in getting this spruce out and the results justified the expenditure. 

Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only. Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective

Pre-emptors must occupy-claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 3 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements less than 5 years, and improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence

of at least 2 years are required. Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made residence maintained on Crown

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 cres, may be leased as homesites; dential and improvement conditions. For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company. Mill, factory or industrial sites on

road, not exceeding half of purchase PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from for one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made re-

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on preemptions recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.
