## Peace Treaty is Laid Before United States Senate Along with the League of Nations

### President Wilson Confers with Newspaper Correspondents and Expressed Gratification at Action of Germany in Ratifying Treaty; Must Force Compliance with Military Terms.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
 Washington, July 11.—The peace treaty including the League Nations Covenant was laid before the Senate by President Wilson in an address accounting to the country for his part in the negotiations at Versailles.  
 "The League," declared the president, "is born of the conviction that an international concern had become a world necessity to end the old order and guarantee civilization." He stated that in such a concern the world looked confidently to the United States for leadership, and added that while the treaty might not be exactly as the United States delegation would have written it, vital sacrifice had been made by necessary compromises.  
 President Wilson conferred with the newspaper correspondents and indicated gratification that the treaty of peace had been ratified promptly by the German National Assembly. The president indicated that trade relations between Germany and the associated nations should be resumed at the earliest possible moment.  
 It was made clear that a follow through should be maintained in Germany until the Germans complied with all the military terms of the treaty. It was pointed out that there were several million German soldiers in Germany and munitions sufficient for them to create.

At this time the board gave the Borden Street school which was used as a hospital for the time. Following this the walls had to be repainted and everything fumigated for the safe return of the children.  
 Pleasure was expressed by Dr. McNeill at the successful draining and levelling of the King Edward school grounds. This has been a long-felt want by the pupils attending there. The hope was also expressed that the school room in the Hays building would be unnecessary during next term as the light was very bad for the children's eyes. That is an argument for a new school which can easily handle all the pupils with the proper facilities.

## LAWLESS ACTS IN TIPPERARY

### Text of Memorandum Proclaiming Sinn Fein Societies Out With The Law—Cables to New York.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
 New York, July 11.—A copy of the memorandum setting forth the alleged conditions in Tipperary County, Ireland, issued yesterday from Dublin Castle by the Chief Secretary for Ireland in outlawing all Sinn Fein organizations and Irish volunteers from Tipperary County, has been received here from British sources. Issuance of the memorandum was announced in yesterday's cable dispatches.

The memorandum recites a series of lawless acts reported to the different peace officers in Ireland and quotes from two documents said to have been seized by the British authorities in Ireland.

### Meeting Will be Held to Reorganize Trades and Labor Council Monday Next.

The Machinists Union announce that with the exception of one or two of their members they will stay by their international. W. H. Montgomery of the Longshoremen's Union says that with the exception of two or three the members of their union will drop the international and join the One Big Union.

A meeting of those interested in retaining international affiliation is called for Monday next, when it is expected that they will take steps to continue the charter of the local Trades and Labor Council with the Engineers, Machinists, Retail Clerks, Typographical Union and carpenters affiliated.

The semi-annual meeting of the St. Andrew's Society will be held tonight in the club rooms for the purpose of electing officers for the coming half year and other business. All members are requested to attend.

## NEW SCHOOL DISCUSSED BY SCHOOL BOARD

### Question of Water Supply for Building Simple—Playground is Important Feature.

At last evening's meeting of the school board there was considerable discussion in regard to the erection of the new school which has been decided upon. The only deterrent feature was the failure of the council to take action in the matter and to immediately have something done. There will be a joint meeting of the school board and the finance committee on Monday afternoon. A frame building is out of the question cause, according to the estimates, it would cost nearly \$50,000. The difference would not be saved in insurance alone and then they would not have to be continually repairing it as was the case with the Borden Street School.

The matter of water supply was dealt with and it was pointed out that installing a pump would be a mere trifle as it would only have to be used in case of emergency. The children would have an adequate water supply without it. The main reason for the school going up on the hill is that the children will get some real good from the city's \$30,000 asset, the recreation grounds. It has been recommended by the city health officer who condemned the proposal of the site on ninth Avenue. The final arrangements will be made upon the return of Dr. Kergin from the south.

## LT. McDONALD RETURNS HOME

### Greeted by Many Friends as He Arrives on Train—Leaves Log Behind.

A large number of friends were at the train last evening to greet Lieutenant Wilfred McDonald who has returned home after seeing four years' service with the Canadian forces in France. For the past month or so Lieut. McDonald has been visiting with friends in the east, having spent some time in Ottawa where he saw several other of the Prince Rupert boys.

Wilfred McDonald left this city with the Sixteenth Battalion under Lieut.-Col. Peck. While in the field he gained his commission for conspicuous gallantry while under fire. He returned to England for this and again went back to France after being severely wounded about a week before the signing of the armistice. It was at this time that he lost his leg, and it was rather a pathetic incident to see such an able bodied man having to hobble off the train with his crutches.

Lieut. McDonald has lived here since the early days when the city was in its infancy. He is a real old timer, having worked with Foley, Welch & Stewart in the days of construction. Another brother Ray also joined up, but he has now been back for a few months.

Among those going north from here on the Princess Mary yesterday were Jos. A. Rogers, accompanied by Kenneth Scherk who are going on a fur buying expedition into Alaska. Mr. Rogers will go as far as Skagway, but Mr. Scherk will proceed right to Skagway and does not expect to return for some time.

## WORKMEN RESENT CLOSING OF COAL MINES AT SYDNEY AND LOOK TO GOVERNMENT

### DELEGATION WAITS ON CITY COUNCIL ASKING FOR WORK OR RELIEF AND TELEGRAMS SENT TO BORDEN AND ROBERTSON DEMANDING ACTION

 Sydney, July 11.—Due to the closing down of the collieries at Sydney mines a serious situation is reported to exist in that town. Last night hundreds of steel workers and miners marched to the city council chamber and a committee of the men laid the case before the councillors demanding that either positions or relief be given them immediately.

Yesterday afternoon the men held a great demonstration at which J. B. McLachlin, secretary-treasurer of the United Mine Workers, was one of the principal speakers. The men were in an extremely determined mood and threatened drastic action if the situation was not relieved immediately. Already telegrams have been sent to the Prime Minister and to Hon. Gideon Robertson, minister of labor, informing them of existing conditions and demanding that the government take action to reopen the mines and steel works, as the latter are entirely closed down and only one mine is in operation and that at half time and 300 machinists are working only about two days a month.

Mr. Taylor, the government agent at Atlin, was among those passing through the city on the C. P. R. steamer yesterday.

Aileen Patmore and Rhona Saunders have gone to Vancouver on a holiday, leaving by the Prince George last evening.

Among those leaving for the south on the Grand Trunk steamer last evening after a brief visit in the city was Rev. J. D. Mullins, the secretary for the British Colonial and Continental Church Society of London.

There was a large party of Shriners aboard the Princess Mary yesterday who are making the round trip to Skagway. Many are prominent business men from the south and took time to inquire and obtain as much information as possible about the city.

It was decided at the school board meeting last night to re-deck the approaches to the King Edward school. The planks are nearly worn through in places and are not safe for the children. The road leading to the coal chutes will also be repaired as teams have been breaking through in many places.

The C. P. R. steamer Princess Mary arrived in port from the south shortly after 2 p. m. yesterday with a large number of passengers who are making the tourist trip to Skagway. The boat stayed till four and gave those on board time to go ashore and look over the city which looked its best in the bright sunshine.

Captain Ormison, late of the Princess Victoria, is piloting the Princess Mary on her northerly trip this week. A delightful passage was experienced all the way and both sounds were very smooth. Basking in the warm sunshine the passengers were quite content to sit on deck all day.

A large quantity of lumber was brought up from Vancouver by the Mary yesterday. A number of fish barrels were also unloaded for the Prince Rupert Fisheries. Many of the local merchants were disappointed as they had expected a cargo of fresh fruit and vegetables. The next shipment of fresh perishables will arrive by the Prince Rupert tomorrow.

Secretary Vance reported at the school board meeting last night that 61 applications had been received from teachers to fill the local vacancies. There were 26 first class and academic certificates, 19 second, 15 third and 1 domestic science. The names will be looked up by Inspector Lord who will wire up the credentials of the applicants as filed with the Department of Education.

Following the report made by the city of the survey of the Borden Street school grounds it was decided by the school board last night that no more excavating will be done there as the present grade is below street level. More cinders will be procured and strewn over the surface and covered with sand. A ditch will be dug across the higher side of the grounds which will prevent the washing away of the sand. The work will be done by the city.

## ANOTHER TEACHER FOR HIGH SCHOOL

At the school board meeting last night J. C. Brady asked that another teacher be procured for the high school for next term. He expects that there will be about sixty attending, which will require another room. This forces out a whole class from Borden Street which cannot be cared for elsewhere and already King Edward has every room occupied and rooms are being used by the public school classes in the Borden Street school which were never intended for class rooms.

The matter of the appointment of another teacher will be held over for a short time.

Forest Products Of the District.

In his speech to the Board of Trade on Wednesday some parts of the speech of American Consul Wakefield were held over because of lack of space. These parts will be used editorially from time to time during the next few days.

"During the progress of the war, now brought to a happy close, we all had an opportunity of appreciating the value of the forest products which will in future years provide the markets of the world with lumber, pulp and paper. It was discovered suddenly that spruce was the very best material for the wood required in aeroplane construction and that the B. C. spruce was quite the best in the market for the purpose.

Millions of dollars were spent in getting this spruce out and the results justified the expenditure. Just how far the expenditures were justifiable Germany prevented from becoming known by signing the armistice.

"What would have happened to Germany in another few weeks would have certainly convinced her that she slightly underestimated the power opposed to her and would have convincingly demonstrated that the world is not to be the football of any individual power in all the years to come.

"Today spruce lumber is being shipped from Prince Rupert and neighboring points to the eastern seaboard and the freight is equal to the cost of the lumber on the sticks here. Some demand for your spruce, is it not? And the industry is merely in its swaddling clothes. There is a mill down at Ocean Falls calling for an investment of over ten millions. Is that an infant industry? Some infant! Another at Swanson Bay with a very large plant as such plants are listed. With the almost inexhaustible supply of pulp wood in this vicinity and the ever-increasing demand for paper, is it likely that this field will be neglected? I'll say 'No.'

"I am sure you will all agree with me that the city is most fortunate in securing a firm such as that operating the mills at Seal Cove. This firm is a distinct addition to the business life of this city and you all heartily wish with me that the firm may long remain here."

Archbishop's Counsel Regarding Reforms.

Vast reforms do not come in a day. The great danger of the hour is impatience, says F. H. Du Vernet, archbishop of Caledonia. There will always be inequality in the distribution of wealth, but excessive inequality is a social injustice. Economic laws are not fixed by nature, they can be regulated by man. How to bring about a more equitable distribution of wealth is the problem which must be faced without delay, but it must be faced with wisdom.

The revisionary method aims at creating public sentiment through the agency of the press, the school, the union, and the church, which will bring such pressure to bear in a constitutional manner that our present inadequate laws will be revised and progressive legislation enacted which will gradually bring about a more equitable distribution of wealth.

The revolutionary method aims at the sudden overturning of the present capitalistic system. It is primarily a destructive policy and so of necessity comes at once into conflict with constitutional authority. It has no well defined constructive policy, and so even if successful in overthrowing the present order of things years of crude experimenting with visionary theories must lapse before a better order of things could be established upon a firm foundation.

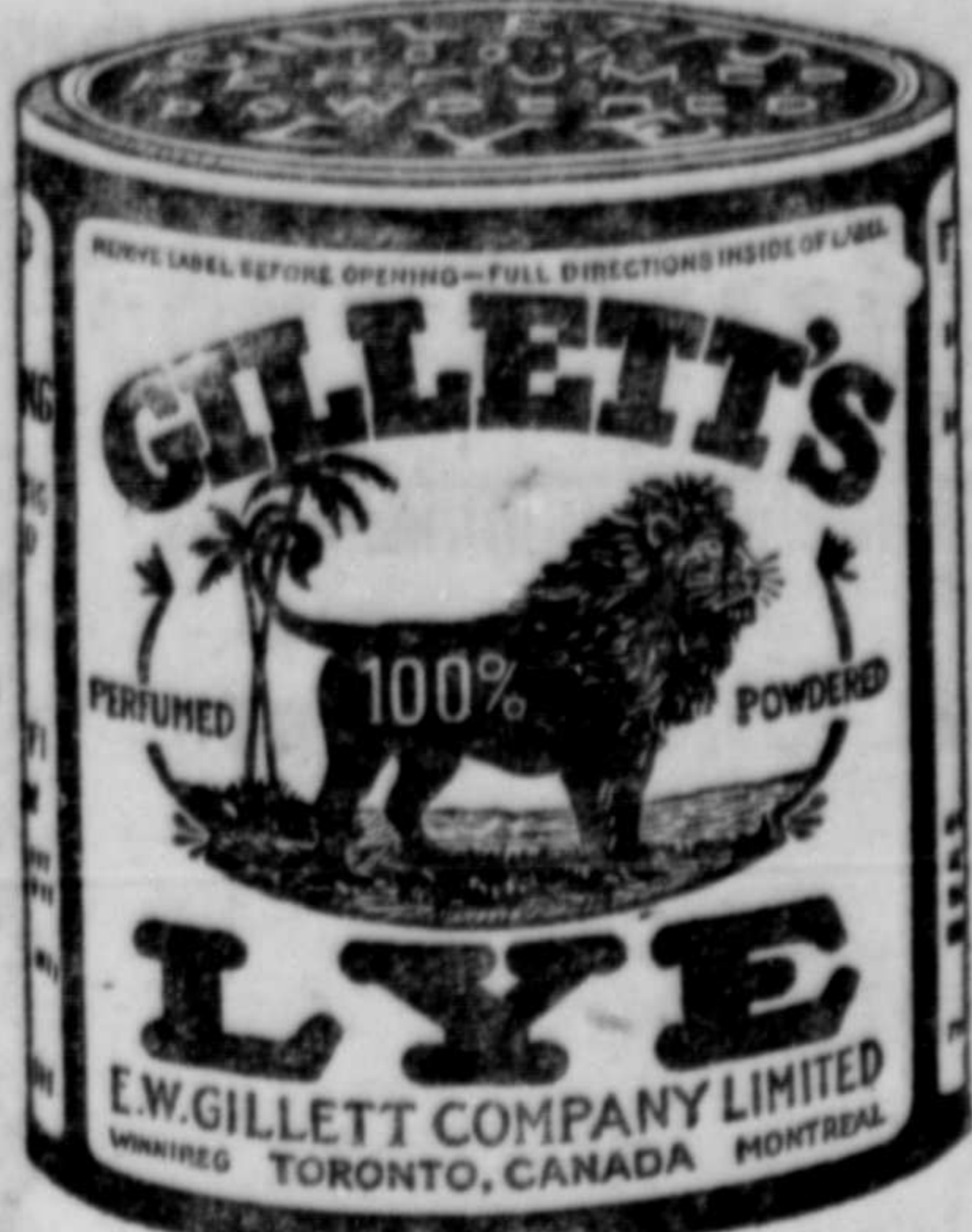

### NEW COMPANIES OF INTEREST TO PRINCE RUPERT

Langara Fishing and Packing Co. Has Head Offices in This City.

Two new companies incorporated recently, the notices of which appear in the British Columbia Gazette this week, are of interest to Prince Rupert people. One of these is the Langara Fishing and Packing Co. and the other the Great West Logging and Lumber Co.

The Langara Fishing and Packing Co., Ltd., is capitalized at \$50,000 and has its head office at Prince Rupert. One of the principal objects of association reads as follows:

"To purchase from Hume B. Babington and his associates all their right, title and interest in the fish-canning licence, site, buildings, and equipment, situate on Langara Island, in the Province of British Columbia, for the consideration of four hundred and ninety-eight shares of the par value of one hundred dollars each fully paid up in the share capital of the company."

The Great West Logging and Lumber Company, Ltd., has its head office at Vancouver and is capitalized at \$10,000. The objects in part are as follows:

"To acquire and take over certain logging equipment and machinery situate on Graham and Lyell Islands, in the Province of British Columbia, and with a view thereto to enter into the agreement referred to in clause 3 of the company's articles of association and to carry the same into effect with or without modification."

"To purchase, build and operate lumber, saw and shingle mills and factories for the manufacture of lumber, shingles, or other manufactures of wood and to carry on the business of logging, lumbering, timber merchants, sawmill proprietors, timber-growers, timber-cruisers, and to buy, sell, grow, and prepare for market, manipulate, export, import, and deal in timber, lumber, and wood of all kinds, and to manufacture and deal in articles of all kinds in the manufacture of which timber and wood are used or required, and to engage in and carry on logging operations and to traffic and deal in logs and timber of all kinds."

### Synopsis of

### Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$2.50 an acre. Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy-claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 3 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$200 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements

will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

### PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enlistment to March 21, 1920.

### SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

### GRAZING.

Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers raised; priority for established owners; stock-owners may form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.

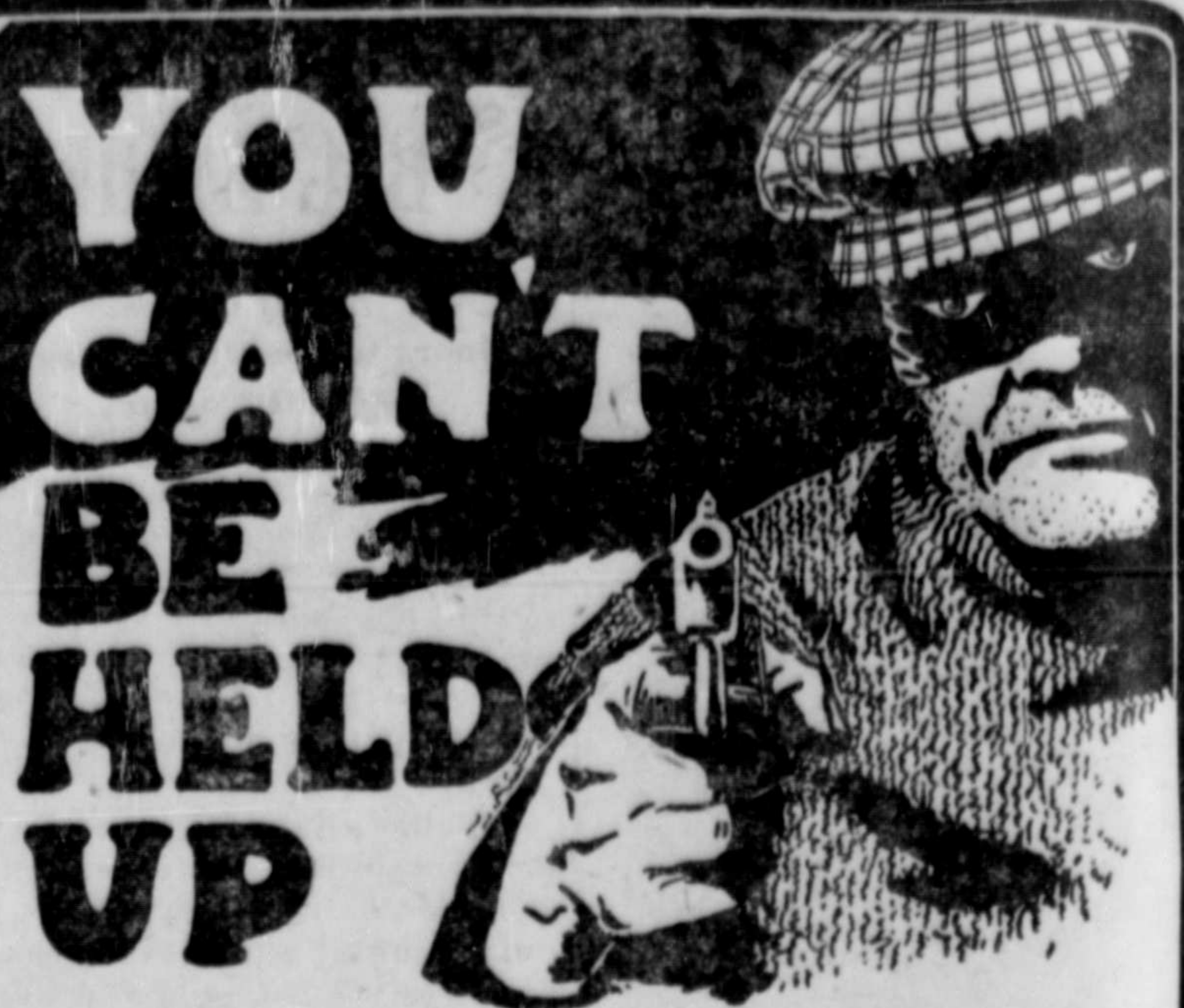
