NEW FOOTHOLD ON LIFE FOR KING SOUGHT

Four Hours Sleep Improves Condition of Patient at Buckingham Palace

LONDON, Dec. 15.—King George, worn by 25 days of illness, today was struggling bravely for a new foothold on life. After suffering somewhat of a setback yesterday following two operations Wednesday, the King succeeded in securing several hours' sleep last night and emerged today with a steady pulse and without further exhaustion. This morning's bulletin is regarded in palace circles as satisfactory.

The Queen did not leave the palace today and the Prince of Wales is now carrying on the work of his father. He lunched today with the Queen and Princess Mary.

The King's physicians issued the following bulletin this morning: "The King has had several hours of sleep. The local condition is so far satisfactory. There is no increase in the exhaustion and the pulse remains steady."

LONDON, Dec. 15.—Tonight's bulletin stated the King had a quiet day with some rest. Though the pulse remains steady and fever now moderate, the exhaustion persists. It has been decided to employ ray therapy as part of the treatment.

C. N. R. TRAIN STRUCK AUTO; KILLED FOUR

EDMONTON, Dec. 15.—Mary Watomaniuk, aged 15, Nick Zymbaliuk and Bill Kalyniuk were killed, Jacob Watomaniuk, the father, is dead from injuries, and a girl is seriously injured, as a result of a Canadian National passenger train crashing into their automobile at the level crossing near Smoky Lake, 90 miles northeast of Edmonton, late Thursday.

MINISTER SATISFIED IMMIGRATION SPEECH

OTTAWA, Dec. 15.—Hon. Robert Porke, minister of immigration, yesterday expressed himself satisfied with the explanation made by J. Bruce Walker, Canadian director of European immigration, in connection with a speech delivered by the latter in London, in which he was quoted as saying: "All present immigration schemes would not bear comparison with the magnitude of the problems."

WILL SETTLE WAR PROBLEMS

LUGANO, Dec. 15.—The fifty-third session of the council of the League of Nations concluded with public meetings this afternoon and then adjourned.

Foreign Ministers Chamberlain, Briand and Stresemann of Britain, France and Germany respectively, issued a communique stating that they were determined to do everything in their power to arrive quickly at a complete and final settlement of the difficulties arising out of the war.

ANXIETY FELT FOR SAFETY OF MISSION BOAT THOS. CROSBY.

SKIDEGATE, Dec. 15.—Considerable anxiety is felt here for the safety of the United Church mission launch Thomas Crosby with Rev. R. C. Scott and Capt. William Oliver on board. They went to Cape St. James and are now nine days overdue. The weather has been one continual storm since they left. It is hoped that the little vessel may be safely anchored in some bay or other point of shelter.

TOLMIE SEEMS QUITE PLEASED

OTTAWA, Dec. 15.—"We had a very friendly discussion on all aspects appertaining to the natural resources of British Columbia and reached an agreement with respect to many of the questions," declared Premier Tolmie, after conferences with Hon. Charles Stewart this morning. The premier said that although the present conferences were closed, there still remained certain work to be done, particularly in the nature of legislation, before the whole matter of returning natural resources to the province could be consummated.

PEZUTA CREW REACHES CITY

Water Rising and Falling in Hull of Log Carrying Barge Ashore in Skidegate Inlet

The captain and seven members of the crew of the log carrying barge Pezuta, which broke away from the tug Imbreccaria in Skidegate Inlet last Tuesday afternoon and drifted ashore near Tlell, arrived in the city from the Queen Charlotte Islands on the Prince John today and will proceed to Vancouver by the next boat which will be the steamer Catala on Tuesday afternoon.

The Pezuta, whose crew fears she will be a total loss, is now lying embedded in eight feet of sand and the water is flowing through the hull as the tide ebbs and flows. Owing to weather conditions, salvage of the barge can hardly be attempted at this time. The Prince Rupert Salvage & Towing Co., however, is stripping her of smaller fittings and equipment and an attempt will be made later to take off the larger machinery. The barge itself will probably be abandoned.

The Pezuta will be the third log carrying barge that the Pacific Coyle Navigation Co. has lost in recent years. A couple of years or so the Drumrock was lost in the Bella Coola district. Last year the Binghamon was lost in the vicinity of Victoria. The Binghamon, it will be remembered, was the barge which on her first trip four years ago this winter broke away from the tug Massett and drifted before a high gale with all on board for almost 50 miles and ended up in a safe anchorage at the Dundas Islands. All three barges were former sailing ships equipped with donkey engines and other machinery. While such vessels have been found advantageous for the carrying of large quantities of logs, it has also been found that very powerful tugs are necessary to hold them when there is stormy weather.

BRITAIN AND ITALY AGREE

LUGANO, Italy, Dec. 15.—According to Great Britain and Italy as to the procedure for carrying out an agreement for the settlement of the reparations problem and evacuation of the Rhine was the outstanding development at the meeting of the council of the League of Nations. The agreement was announced by Sir Austen Chamberlain, in which he said it was deemed important, since these two powers were named as guarantors of peace on the Rhine under the Locarno Pact.

UNABLE TO SEARCH MIDDLETON ISLAND

JUNEAU, Dec. 15.—Captain Jennings of the salvage tug Akutan radioed that he had made two futile attempts to land on barren Middleton Island to search for the twelve missing fishermen from the schooners Brunvol and Imperial. The Akutan is returning to Ketchikan because of shortage of fuel.

VICTORIA, Dec. 15.—A recount on the Victoria by-election was ordered this morning by Judge Lampman in the county court.

PENSION FUND FOR TEACHERS

Tat is Plan Virtually Decided On Four Per Cent of Salaries Going to Provide It

VICTORIA, Dec. 15.—A scheme has been virtually endorsed by which the teachers of British Columbia will contribute 4 per cent of their monthly salaries toward the fund providing for retiring allowances. The government will make up any shortage between the amounts available and the needs of the profession, an amount not expected to be large.

The teachers decided recently to establish a \$100,000 fund out of their first five months' contributions to provide for teachers retiring shortly before contributing substantially to the fund. Legislation to give effect to the scheme is expected to be brought down next session.

BRITAIN PAYS PART OF DEBT

Nearly Billion Dollars Already Paid Off Since Refunding by U. S.

LONDON, Dec. 15.—A payment of \$94,000,000 was made today by the British government to the United States on account of the war debt. Payment included \$27,000,000 principal, the balance being interest.

This payment brought the total turned over to the United States treasury since the funding of the debt to \$364,000,000, reducing the amount outstanding to about four and a half billion.

BUSY TIME AT THE LIBRARY

Large Number of Books Loaned Last Month Was Reported to the Board Last Night

The month of November was a busy one at the public library, the total output of books for the month being 4,023 an average of 201.1 each day, the librarian reported to the Board last night. While most of this was fiction there were in addition 498 non-fiction books, 897 juvenile and 192 in the duplicate department.

During the month books were added, one by gift and 88 by purchase, making a total collection after allowing for 23 discarded of 6,491 volumes. There are now 2726 borrowers, 36 new ones having taken out cards during the month and 22 being cancelled. The Board last night decided to close the library Christmas Day and New Year's Day.

After close financing it was reported by the secretary that the Board would end the year with a small balance to the good to offset a small overdraft last year. A good deal more money could have been spent with benefit to the institution but it was not available.

The Librarian reports that as the result of a considerable demand the library is carrying the telephone books from Calgary, Montreal, Seattle, Toronto, Vancouver, Victoria, Winnipeg and that more will be added for reference purposes.

The books on education provided by the Parent Teacher Association have arrived.

ORR REMOVED FROM CHURCH

It removes Mr. Orr from the office of minister of the Presbyterian Church in Canada and terms him "wholly unworthy and unfit to be a minister of the Gospel."

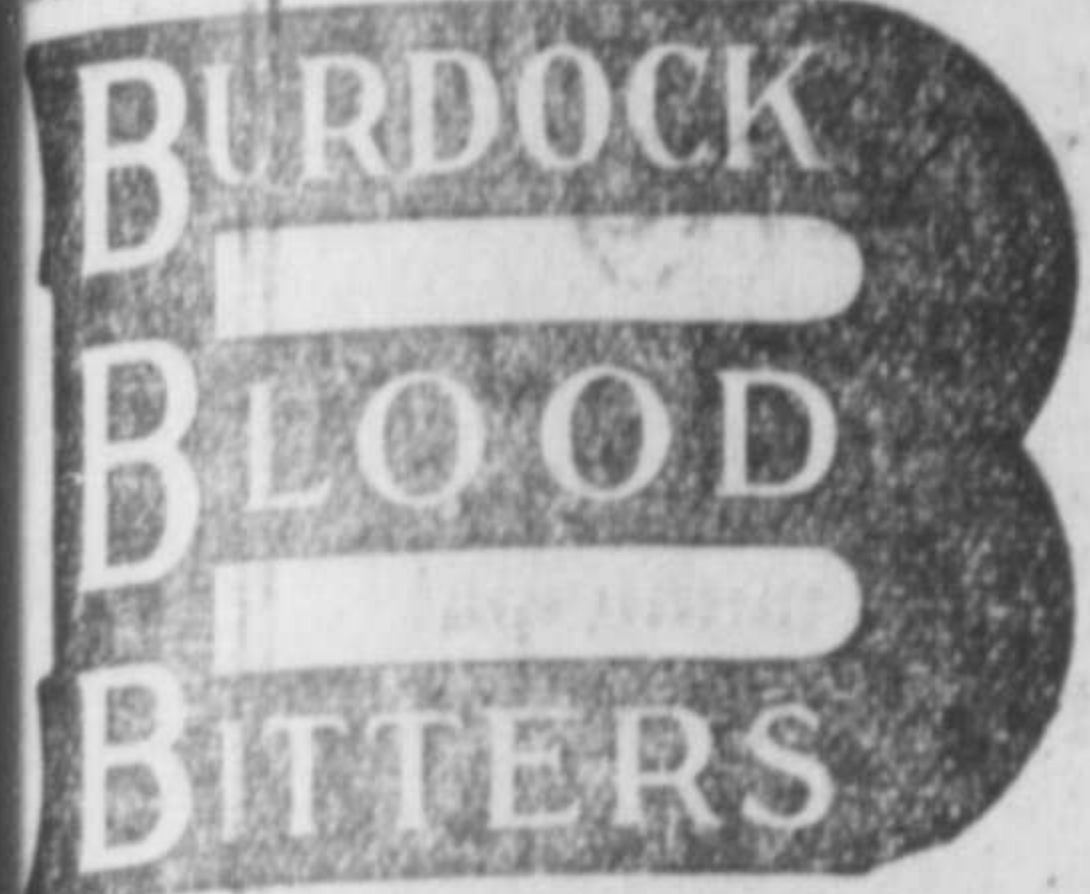

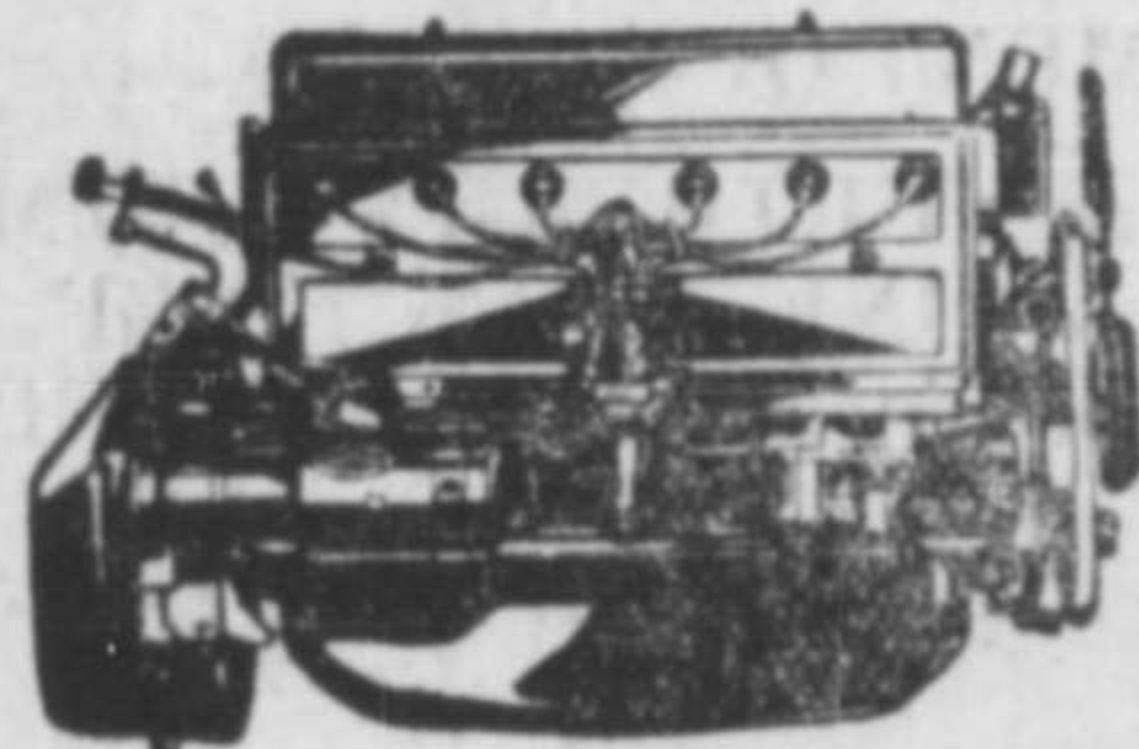

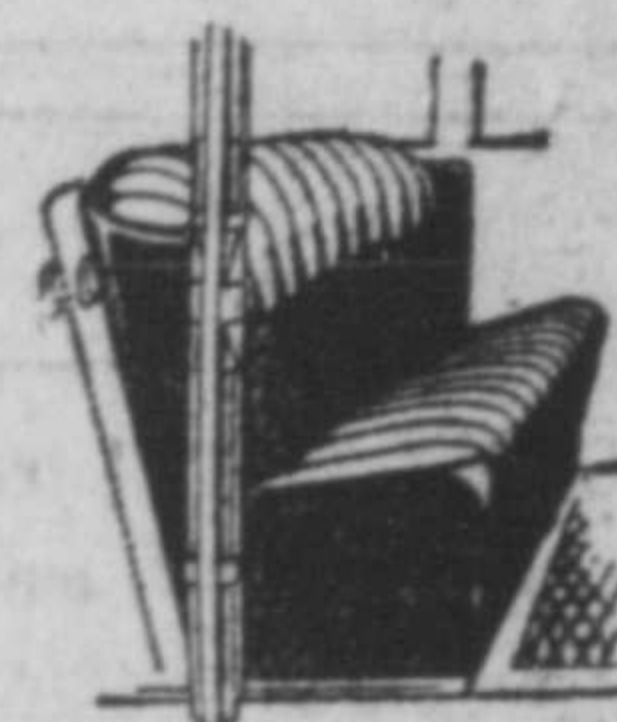

Confirming the arrangements made at a meeting held the 16th of November, 1928, at which you kindly gave Messrs. Rath and Shoard and the writer an audience, I now beg to submit herewith on behalf of American States Public Service Company of Los Angeles the following offer for the purchase of your hydro-electric system coupled with a development program along the lines following:

Lastly, I would point out for your consideration that should the company's offer be accepted Prince Rupert will be the largest undertaking in British Columbia and the point from which it must logically develop. From this it will follow that in such event the company must develop its operations in Prince Rupert to the utmost so as to protect its investment there, it being of course understood that the city's

present hydro-electric system, such additional power to be available to the city or other consumers in or about or in the vicinity of the city within the said period of two years.

PROVIDED HOWEVER that if in the opinion of the company's officers or engineers it may at any time appear more economical to develop power by means other than hydro then the company is to have the right to develop power by such means as to it may appear proper. development goes hand in hand with that of the company.

The foregoing offer and attendant explanation are respectfully submitted in the hope that they will prove acceptable and in the hope that the offer made will be accepted, in which event the company shall look forward to a continuance of its pleasant relations with yourselves and the city at large.

It is our understanding that all conditions upon due delivery of title to the company and upon receiving approval of the Water Branch of the Province of British Columbia in respect of the company's proposed undertaking.

Should the Council accept this offer, the company will require permission immediately to make an audit of the city's books relative to the hydro-electric system, so that in the event of approval by the electors no time will be lost in proceeding with the company's plans. I trust there will be no objection to this course being followed which is quite usual in circumstances such as these.

It is our understanding that the matter of this and other offers is to be finally considered on the 26th inst. or within a few days thereafter in which latter event I am to be notified by telegram, and it is our further understanding that all offers made will be considered at one and the same time. Gentlemen: In re-American States Public Service Company's offer to purchase Hydro-Electric Plant.

In further reference to our offer, I beg to point out the following: With regard to the street lighting program, this is generally contemplated by an existing Utility Company of any standing, but it has been our practice to deal with the actual matter in the franchise, which we think is the proper place for such an item.

In view of the present situation, I communicated with Mr. Rath, telling him that it was my understanding when discussing the matter with him that modern street lighting program would be carried out here, and that I had intended to cover this point in the franchise, if granted, my idea being that the price and development of further power were the important items.

Other matters being open for discussion on the preparation of a franchise.

In reply to my query, I have just received from Mr. Rath a wire reading, in part, as follows:

"You are correct in understanding. We contemplate modern street lighting equipment for entire City. In fact, after Council meeting I talked to one Councilman stating 'this would be our program. Thank you will recall incident.' 'Stop. Further, you are authorized to make a commitment to this effect in preparation of franchise details.'"

The Alderman that Mr. Rath refers to is Alderman Collart, who accompanied Messrs. Rath and Shoard and the writer to the street corner after the setting of November 16th.

We wish you to understand that this offer is not to be taken as an intention to increase our existing offer to the residents of outstanding bidders, but merely written in fairness to yourselves and ourselves with a view to placing ourselves on record as having already definitely contemplated a modern street lighting program such as you have in mind and I hope that this letter will be taken in the spirit in which it is sent and the motive therefor. Dear Sirs: On behalf of our client, the Power Corporation of Canada, Limited, of Montreal (hereinafter referred to as the Company), we offer to purchase all the assets of the Light and Power Department of the City of Prince Rupert, complete as going concern, free from all encumbrance (save as may hereinafter be set forth in the body of an agreement to be subsequently executed, mutually acceptable to both parties), consisting of but in no way limiting the generality of the foregoing description, the water rights, Dam, Penstock, Power Plants, Lands, Transmission Lines, Distribution Lines, Sub stations, Transformers, Meters, Stores and tools used exclusively for the benefit of and in connection with the Light and Power Department, accounts receivable, contracts and so forth, for the sum of Three Hundred and Seventy-Five Thousand (\$375,000.00) Dollars, payable in cash upon the execution by the City of the agreement above mentioned.

The conditions upon which this agreement is to be entered into are as follows, to wit:

1. All existing contracts made by the City covering Light, Heat and Power are to be carried out by the company.

2. The Domestic and Commercial Rates for Light, Heat and Power shall at no time directly or indirectly be increased during the lifetime of the franchise given by said agreement unless with the consent of the City, except that the Company may increase its rates to cover an increase in the cost of supplying the service due to any tax, license, royalty or other charge imposed by any Governmental authority, Federal or Provincial, if the Company is to be free to reduce rates if it so desires.

3. Street lighting rates are to remain as set forth in City of Prince Rupert Bylaw No. 494, or if preferred by the City the Company will offer in accordance with terms of Contract Form "A" attached herewith to furnish lighting for this purpose at the rate of \$15.00 per annum per 100 Watts or 100 candlepower supplied; the City to pay for all lamp renewals which will be furnished by the Company at cost, cost to be defined as actual invoice price plus freight delivered in Company's stores, Prince Rupert; and installed without further cost by the Company no fixture, to be installed for lamps

of less than 100 watts or 100 candlepower capacity. The Company shall further undertake upon demand of the city to install at its own expense in the business streets of the City fully modern ornamental system of high intensity street lighting fixtures; lighting to be charged for at the same proportionate rates above mentioned.

4. The Company agrees to complete within two years development having capacity of not less than 5,000 Horse Power and undertakes as, if and when required, to further continue development until 100,000 Horse Power or more shall be available for private and commercial use of the citizens and industries located within the City of Prince Rupert; six months grace or margin to be allowed on the two year period to take care of unforeseen contingencies, Acts of God, or the King's enemies, not included.

5. The City shall during a term of twenty-five (25) years from date of said agreement exempt the Company from all municipal taxes, licenses or other charges, and agrees that the equipment of the Company be deemed and considered movable and non-assessable by nature and determination and if any tax or other charge cannot be legally remitted, then such tax, etc. shall be added on to the charge for street lighting and be paid by the City; lands or buildings used for other purposes by the Company not to be included in this exemption to the extent or proportion in which they are used for other purposes.

6. The City agrees to purchase and take from the Company all the electric light, heat and power used by the City for any and all purposes during a period of twenty-five (25) years from the date of the said agreement and agrees that during this period it will not purchase or use any other electric light, heat and power, nor permit any other person, persons or corporations to use the public places of the City municipality for the purpose of distribution or sale of light, heat and power.

7. The Company is prepared to enter into an agreement with the City to take care of the segregation of the affairs of the Light and Power Department from those of the Telephone Department of the City; and to this purpose would suggest for the consideration of the City Council the existing standard joint pole agreement used by the Company with the Bell Telephone Company of Canada, Limited.

8. Nothing in this proposed agreement shall be interpreted or deemed to read so as to remove the operations of the Company from the jurisdiction of the Public Utilities Commission of the Province of British Columbia or its equivalent body, if, as and when formed.

9. This offer is further subject to satisfactory examination and report of City's title to said property, by counsel for the Company, and also subject to any further details as may be mutually agreed upon between the City and the Company.

It is particularly pointed out that the Company submitting this offer is controlled by Messrs. Nesbitt, Thomson & Company, Limited, Investment Bankers, Montreal, a wholly Canadian organization, and under which administration the intense industrial development which has taken place during the past eight or nine years in the Eastern townships of the Province of Quebec has been carried out—and the Company hereby pledges itself to place at the disposal of the City through its Council or Board of Trade, without charge, the services of the same industrial department which has operated with such phenomenal success wherever its activities have been directed in the past.

The Company is already heavily interested in British Columbia having purchased Hydro-Electric enterprises in East Kootenay and in Stewart, and having just recently purchased a controlling interest in the B. C. Electric Com-

pany at an investment of \$60,000,000.00.

Dear Sirs: Re our offer for the purchase of the City hydro-electric system dated November 26th and in reply to the telegram of your Mayor to me I now beg to say:

1. We are prepared to delete the item re Accounts Receivable.

2. We are prepared to waive our claim to exemption from taxation.

3. Re Period of Time for Completion of Work.

We agree to commence development within one week from the date of execution of the final agreement between us and the payment of the cheque, but inasmuch as the hazards of construction are a variable factor after consultation with our engineers it is felt that it would be imprudent to bind ourselves to complete the work in 750 days when this would have to be commenced in the winter period.

4. Federal and Provincial Taxation.

Inasmuch as the Company binds itself for a period of 25 years to supply service at rates fixed or lower and is assuming the ordinary risks of trade insofar as labor and costs of materials are concerned, it is compelled to ask for the same measure of protection as the city would have to take under the same circumstances. In the absence of a Provincial Utilities Commission or pending the formation of such, protection of this nature is necessary. If and when formed we will be quite content to place such matters entirely in their hands and not ask for any further protection from the City.

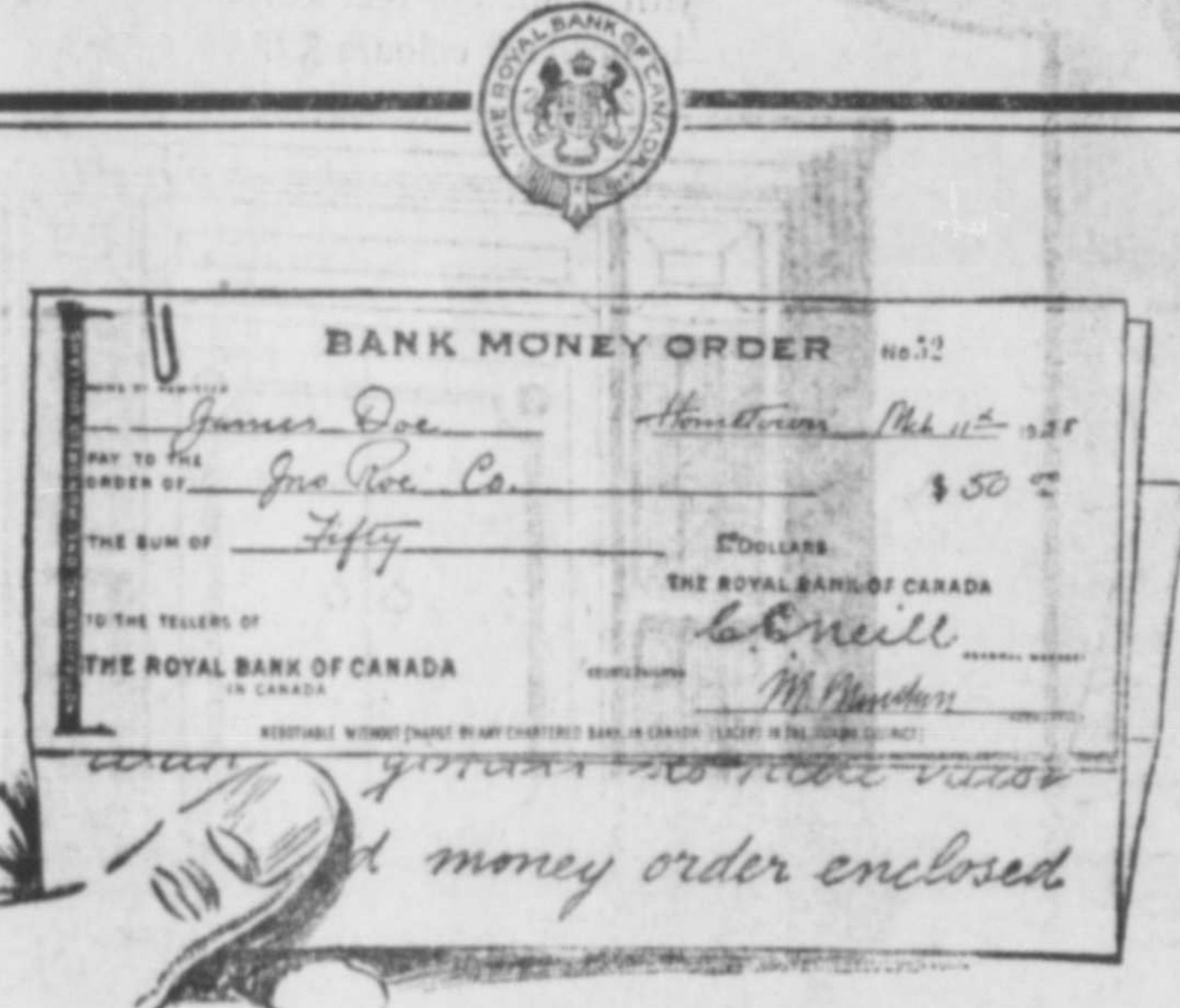

## Waterfront Whiffs

Considerable Activity in Overhauling Halibut Boats; Cedric Is Sold; Fox Farm on White Cliff Island

There is more than the usual pre-New Year activity in the matter of halibut boat overhauling at Prince Rupert and many boats are thus engaged just now. It has been usual in the past for the most of the boats to leave this work over until the latest date possible before the opening of the season, but such policy is not so much the case this year. This makes it better for those who follow the work of serving the fleet and it also assures that the boats, which are now taking occasion by the hand, will be already to go when the 1929 season opens on February 15. Work so far has been chiefly confined to engine overhauls.

Engine cylinders of the Edward Lipsett, Capt. Martin Johnson, are back from Vancouver, where they were reground, and the cylinders of the Cedric are being sent south for similar treatment.

New engine blocks and a dry exhaust are being installed by the Star Welding in the Cape Spear, which is owned by J. Spencer and whose skipper is Capt. William Parsons.

The crank shaft of the Ingrid H., Capt. Charlie Lundquist, has been built up. The engine of the Toodie, owned by Lawrence Newell and Pete Wold, is also being overhauled. Similar work on the Margalice, Capt. Jack Christiansen, and Southend, Capt. Anton Moen, has been completed.

Other boats to shortly receive engine overhauls at the Star Welding are the Dolphinen, Capt. O. W. J.; as well as the Pair of Jacks, Capt. Pete Leland.

The Prince Rupert dry dock has been awarded the contract for the installation of a new 36 h.p. Gardner Diesel engine in the local halibut boat Tern, Capt. Nel Petersen. The motor will arrive from Vancouver about the middle of next week and installation work will then be immediately started.

Anent the terrific storms which swept the halibut fleet on its last trip to the banks, the Ketchikan Chronicle says, cut down the catch about 500,000 pounds under last year, broke booms, smoke stacks, railings and windows, and carried away more gear than ever before lost by the fleet on a single trip. As the last half dozen of the 89 odd halibut boats were due to arrive at Ketchikan from the banks, skippers who disposed of their catches told of the fury of the storm, which practically stopped all fishing on November 13, two days before the close of the season. Some boats lost as high as 20 skates of gear, it was

reported. The McKinley lost two dories and nine skates of gear in the storm which broke her boom and railing. Every window in the pilot house of the Albatross was smashed by the heavy seas. Her smoke stack was destroyed and ventilators damaged. The railing of the Democrat was cut to pieces in the battle with the elements. Other boats suffered like damage. A total of about 1,500,000 pounds was brought in on the last trip this year, while last year the fleet's total for the last trip of the season was about 2,000,000 pounds.

#### Repairing Emblem

The Prince Rupert halibut boat Emblem, owned by Peter Brown and skippered by Capt. John Barseth, is on the McLean ways at Seal Cove just now undergoing extensive repairs made necessary through damage done when the vessel was struck by a giant roller on her final trip of the season. The hull and pilot house sustained considerable damage in the impact.

Alfred Anderson, Peter Anderson (owner of the Helen I.) and John Moen have purchased the American registered halibut boat Cedric, and, it is understood, are contemplating changing the vessel, which was brought recently from Alaska, to Canadian registry. Meantime, some considerable engine repairs, etc., are being made on the vessel.

The Cedric is a well known boat in Prince Rupert harbor. She is 56 feet long and is equipped with a 50 h.p. Atlas-Imperial engine. The hull is about ten years old and the engine two and a half years old.

Axel Olsen, owner of the Prince Rupert halibut boats Rose Spit and Oslo, has left for a trip to his native home in Norway and does not expect to return here until late next spring. Alex Duthie is slated to take command of the Oslo in place of Capt. Olsen during the early part of the next fishing season. The Rose Spit is undergoing an extensive program of repairs and alterations at the floats of the Prince Rupert Salvage & Towing Co., the work including the putting in of a new stern.

Capt. Bill Parsons of the local halibut boat Cape Spear is leaving for Porcher Island for a period of hibernation. Judging from the quantity of supplies which Bill was packing with considerable assiduity this week, his stay is apparently going to be of some extent. He may be counted upon, however, to be back in plenty of time for the opening gun of the new halibut season.

Capt. Chris Olsen has been busy this week with his halibut boat elma bringing in the effects of A. O. Morse, well known local troller, who recently moved to town from Porcher Island. A cow and other livestock has been included in the freighting job. After several years' residence on Porcher, "A. O." and family cannot keep away longer from the bright lights, enlightenment and fine weather of the city.

Capt. Pete Meuse, with a party, including Reg Webber of the F. E. Hunt Ltd. staff, left on Wednesday for a hunting trip to Porcher Island. The expedition is expected back by the end of this week and the geese will then hang high—if there are any—until Christmas dinner.

P. W. Anderson and Sid are busy making improvements to their pleasure cruiser Zenobia. Sid is exercising his talents on the engine, while Dad is carrying out various items of carpenter work to much advantage.

The Warke Canal fish packer Taplow II, is tied up at the floats of the Prince Rupert Salvage & Towing Co., while the owners, C. B. Flewin and G. E. Brown, are on a trip south. The Taplow II was built at the McLean yard here last winter and is said to have measured up well to her owners' requirements during the past season.

It was erroneously stated in these columns recently that the season for hunting geese and duck would close on December 31. It should have read January 31—not that it makes much difference anyway to the hunters, very few of whom venture forth after the New Year.
