Miss Jean Harrison, R.N., lady superintendent, reported that the hospital was now filled to capacity, every available bed being occupied by some sixty-

The house committee was authorized to equip a large ward in the basement at once to receive patients in an effort to relieve the congestion. A dozen beds will be installed and old furniture that has been stored there will be sold by the secretary.

The presence of several cases of tuberculosis in the hospital, which necessarily had to occupy private rooms, was partly responsible for the congestion. The matter of providing a glassedin sleeping porch for these patients was referred to the house committee for re-
