Big Strike Settled at the Canadian Vickers Big Plant 1,800 Return to work Monday

**Others Who are Out Negotiating and Settlement Expected
Soon; Basic Trades Get 75c an hour and Laborers 45c
Under Revised Schedule with 47 hour Week.**

(Special to The News via G.T.P. Telegraphs.)

Montreal, July 12.—The strike at the shipbuilding plant of the Canadian Vickers, Ltd., which has caused 3,500 employees to be idle over five weeks, was called off today as far as the trades and laborers of the Marine Federation are concerned. From 1,750 to 1,800 men thus concerned resume work on Monday morning.

The vote taken was 78 per cent in favor of accepting the amended offer of the company.

The other 1,800 strikers, chiefly boilermakers and iron shipbuilders, are still negotiating with the company. It is believed they also will reach a settlement.

The schedule and conditions agreed to in the basic trades gives the men 75c. an hour or an increase of seven cents over the previous rate. Laborers are to get 45c. an hour, an increase of ten cents over the old rate. There is to be a 47-hour week of eight and a half hours every day but Saturday, when the time will be four and a half hours.

BIG BUILDING AS MEMORIAL IN LONDON

Proposal to Erect Edifice for the
Dominion at World's
Metropolis.

(Special to G.T.P. Telegraphs.)

London, July 11.—A joint Dominion and provincial building for Canada may be erected in London in the near future. Canadians here express their wish that some suitable monument to the Canadian dead and the part that the Dominion had taken in the war should be erected in the Empire's capital. They suggest a handsome building, prominently located would be the most suitable monument.

It is understood that the majority of the provincial agents in London look with favor on the scheme.

Sir George Perley, who returned to Canada on the Aquitania on Saturday, told a press representative that the matter was under consideration. His opinion is that such a building would be a magnificent memorial and a great asset to the Dominion and the provinces in London.

BRITISH GOVERNMENT CALLED UPON TO STOP PUBLIC EXPLOITATION

London, July 12.—The Government was called upon to give a definite pledge to reduce the cost of living or resign, in a resolution passed yesterday by the national executive of the Labor party.

The resolution declared that the Government had failed to prevent the "merciless exploitation of the public by profiteers" who are charged with taking ruthless advantage of the shortage of supplies and transport.

FORMER EMPEROR MAY NOT STAND HIS TRIAL

Ottawa, July 12.—A London dispatch says that the project to bring the former German Emperor to trial in England will be abandoned, is the constantly-growing sentiment. Virtually all the leading papers are denouncing the plan.

TITTONI WOULD HAVE AN ITALIAN PEACE, AND CALLS ON THE NATION TO BE CALM

**DELAY IN COMING TO SETTLEMENT WOULD BE DANGEROUS, SAYS FOREIGN MINISTER OF ITALY IN
ADDRESS TO CHAMBER OF
DEPUTIES**

(Special to The News via G.T.P. Telegraphs.)

Rome, July 12.—Foreign Minister Tittoni of Italy was loudly applauded today when he addressed the Chamber of Deputies, saying that it was his belief that negotiations going on in Paris would lead to a settlement in the course of the next week.

The case of Asia Minor, said M. Tittoni, had to be reserved until President Wilson had consulted with the people of the United States, but the Adriatic, colonial and economic questions would be settled at once. They had arrived at a point where a decision was absolutely necessary and every delay was dangerous.

The Foreign Minister in conclusion called upon the country and parliament to be calm pending a settlement of the negotiations, and exhorted them to give the Italian delegation support while making peace, so that when signed it would be a truly Italian peace.

HEAVY COST OF POLICE FORCE

**Winnipeg City Council Wrestles
With Estimates Approved
By Committee.**

(Special via G.T.P. Telegraphs.)

Winnipeg, July 12.—Winnipeg's city police force is to cost \$752,000 for 1919 and 1920 if the City Council approves the estimate passed by the finance committee yesterday.

The estimates were not passed without opposition from Aldermen Fowler and Fisher, both of whom contended that the estimate should be reduced by \$30,000. Alderman Fowler would also close Fort Argument police station, declaring that it would never have been reopened after being closed before if he could have stopped it. It was perfectly absurd to keep this expenditure up and before long the ratepayers would know it. "Wait until they met their tax bills," he commented.

Last year the estimate was \$404,000.

London, July 12.—The air ministry has received the following report from Ponta Delgada, Azores: "R-34 at 8:10 Greenwich time, which is 4:10 New York time, is 4,000 feet above clouds and despite disability going strong. Just about to descend to look at sea. All well."

BLOCKADE AGAINST GERMANY RAISED TODAY ON ORDER OF COUNCIL OF FIVE AT PARIS

(Special to The News via G.T.P. Telegraphs.)

Paris, July 12.—The Council of Five decided to raise the blockade today, it was announced last night.

The Council after receiving the report of the legal experts in an official document notifying the Council that the ratification of the treaty by Germany was in due form, decided to raise the blockade.

So far as the action of the Council concerns France, the measure will be effective only after the publication in the official journal of the decree annulling the former decree establishing the blockade.

RIVER CELEBRATION TO BE OMITTED AT JULY 19 BIG EVENT

**Special Festival for all Sea Ser-
vices to Take Place on
August 8.**

London, July 12.—The Admiralty announces that owing to traffic difficulties it has been found impossible to include in the peace celebrations of July 19 the river position on the Thames which had been contemplated in recognition of the part played in the great war by the sea services. The King, however, has graciously consented to a special festival for all the sea services to be held August 8 in the form of a procession on the Thames which will commemorate the lining up of the sea services on August 8, 1914.

OPPOSE OPEN MARKET FOR CANADIAN WHEAT

**Canadian Council of Agriculture
At Winnipeg Calls on Govern-
ment to Arrange for
Marketing.**

(Special via G.T.P. Telegraphs.)

Winnipeg, July 12.—Strong opposition to the opening of Canadian markets for unrestricted trading, in view of all the circumstances surrounding business in Canada and in view of the action of the United States Government, was voiced in a resolution adopted by the Canadian Council of Agriculture at its final session last night under the chairmanship of H. W. Wood, president. The Council called upon the Government without delay to take the same steps for marketing wheat that had been taken across the border.

POTTERY WHEEL AT EXHIBITION

**Will Be Seen in Action There—
Samples of Work From Vanarsdol Now in Town.**

One of the attractions at the coming fall fair will be the exhibition of a pottery wheel in action and samples of home made pottery moulded and baked by A. Ebring of Vanarsdol. The utensils are made of the clay which is on his ranch and when glazed gives a very rich color to the earthenware. For the fair Mr. Ebring will probably send to Scotland for some special clay with which the green leaves may be placed on the sides of the ornaments.

The machinery required for the operation of turning is very simple and all the finishing touches and shaping are put on by hand while the clay revolves. The baking and glazing requires more careful skill but very good work can certainly be accomplished, judging by the articles which are on display in the store next to the customs house on Second Avenue. There are teapots, sugar bowls and pitchers of all kinds which are very attractively finished. One especially fine article is a huge vase of old style which has acorns and leaves as trimmings.

**W. L. Brown and Ben Ferguson
Again Meet Old Friends
Here Today.**

Sergeant-Major W. L. Brown returned from the south by the Prince Rupert today after having been absent from the city for over four years. "Bill" left Prince Rupert with the 62nd Battalion and for some time was an instructor in England before going over to France where he was wounded towards the end of the fighting. While overseas Sergeant Brown got married and his wife accompanied him here. Both are heartily welcomed to their new home in Prince Rupert.

On the same boat today was Ben Ferguson, who is one of the earliest members to enlist from this city. While in France Ben did most of his fighting with the 47th and when first wounded in the Passchendaele sector received 22 pieces of shrapnel but these were not so serious as the one wound which he received while in the Cambrai sector which has put his right hand out of commission for some time.

Both men are well known members of the St. Andrew's Society, which has done so well in sending men to the front.

Minister of Lands Busy for District.

We have to thank the Minister of Lands who is also the member for the district for securing that extra twenty-five thousand dollars to be spent here in house building. The mayor and Council had made application for more but it lay for the member to give the cabinet that first hand information secured through his recent visit here as to the needs of the city in the way of housing. When the minister was here he said that he hoped to be able to secure more money for the project but all depended on how much was required for the other cities and municipalities.

With thirty houses built for returned soldiers and with the large number of new buildings which are being planned by private enterprise the city should be able to cope with the local situation. The Prince Rupert Housing, Ltd., is doing excellent work in financing a number of houses, but they still have more money to loan on new buildings, all of which it is expected will be taken before very long.

There will be a shortage of houses for some time to come, possibly for years, but it is satisfactory to see that so many residents have faith in the future here and are putting some of their savings into new houses.

Attack on Methodists Quite Unwarranted.

The July number of Resources, that excellent monthly which deals so efficiently with local developments, has an unwarranted slur on the Methodists of Canada. It criticises them for asking for the abolition of the Canadian Senate. It also criticises them for being Bolsheviks.

The Methodists are well able to take care of themselves and do not need a defender. It is fair, however, to draw attention to the fact that the Methodists responded to the call to arms at the opening of war with just as much alacrity as members of other churches, that the Methodist parsons are right up to date theologically and often rather in advance of the times; that they stand for the protection of the weak, especially against that insidious and dangerous enemy whiskey; that they are among the leaders in social and moral reform, and fearlessly advocate the changes which they think necessary, even from the pulpit; that they line up with the clergy of other denominations for all desirable improvements in every community; that if they look for a better form of government than that which we have here now, it is only what all other thinking persons are also looking for, and if they object to the old men's home, yeelpet the Canadian Senate, killing the two most useful bills of the session at Ottawa, they are fully justified and will be backed by a very large majority of the people of Canada in their efforts to have the Senate abolished.

ALD. PERRY FIRES BACK AT COMMISSIONERS

Says the Resolution They Passed Was Both Amusing and Interesting in Trying to Justify Inaction.

PLAY BATTLEDORE AND SHUTTLECOCK

Thinks Mutterings Were Dying Swan Sounds of Weakening Public Usefulness.

Alderman Perry has sent a reply to the police commissioners in connection with the question of gambling in the city and in it pours a broadside of hot shot into that worthy body. He says:

"In my letter to the Daily News of the 4th instant I explained for the benefit of the police commission and the public my remarks at the previous Monday's Council meeting concerning the police commission. I wish to add that I made no such statement concerning 'taint' as attributed to me. Had I considered it necessary to do so, however, I would not have hesitated to make use of even a stronger word. I much regretted at the time that the press report misquoted my actual remarks, and my letter to the press was to put this right. I offer no apology to the commission for what I did say at the meeting nor for the amendment to the proposed resolution concerning the revoking of licenses under certain conditions.

Amusing and Interesting.
"Your resolution of yesterday was both amusing and interesting to me, particularly as, it seems, the commission in trying to justify its inaction in the matter of making recommendation concerning the Zarelli license gets deeper and deeper in the mire of self-condemnation. The position taken by the commission, namely, that 'direct instructions have been given that whenever or wherever found, professional gamblers should be arrested or ordered out of town,' and at the same time reflecting on the constable who made the raid on Zarelli's on his own account and not under the instructions of the chief of police, is at once untenable, illogical and ridiculous. This fact, coupled with the fact that Alderman McRae (who acted as acting mayor at the time the commission dealt with the Zarelli raid and disagreed as to action thereon) at last week's Council meeting observed that a new chief of police is what is wanted, brings the question clearly to the front as to whether the Commission had given any instructions whatever to the chief of police in this connection. It is also obvious that painstaking efforts have been made to present Zarelli as a model card player and to throw cold water upon the actions of the constable who acted where the Chief of Police failed to carry out the instructions said by the Commission to have been given.

Funeral Notice.
"The reasoning of the Police Commission appears to be in the direction of finding new cases whereon to take action. Evidently the Commission thinks the Zarelli funeral notice published in The News of Wednesday will serve as a warning to others and thus make it more difficult for Alderman Perry to find another professional in town whose knowledge of the game is the 'protection' of the players. But my attention is to stay with the case in point.

"Submarine" Raid.
"I desire respectfully to show the Commission (who are quoted as having been told by the mayor that some of the aldermen did not know what they were talking about when they said they had the impression that the chairman was not one way or the other on the question of cancellation of the Zarelli license) that when the

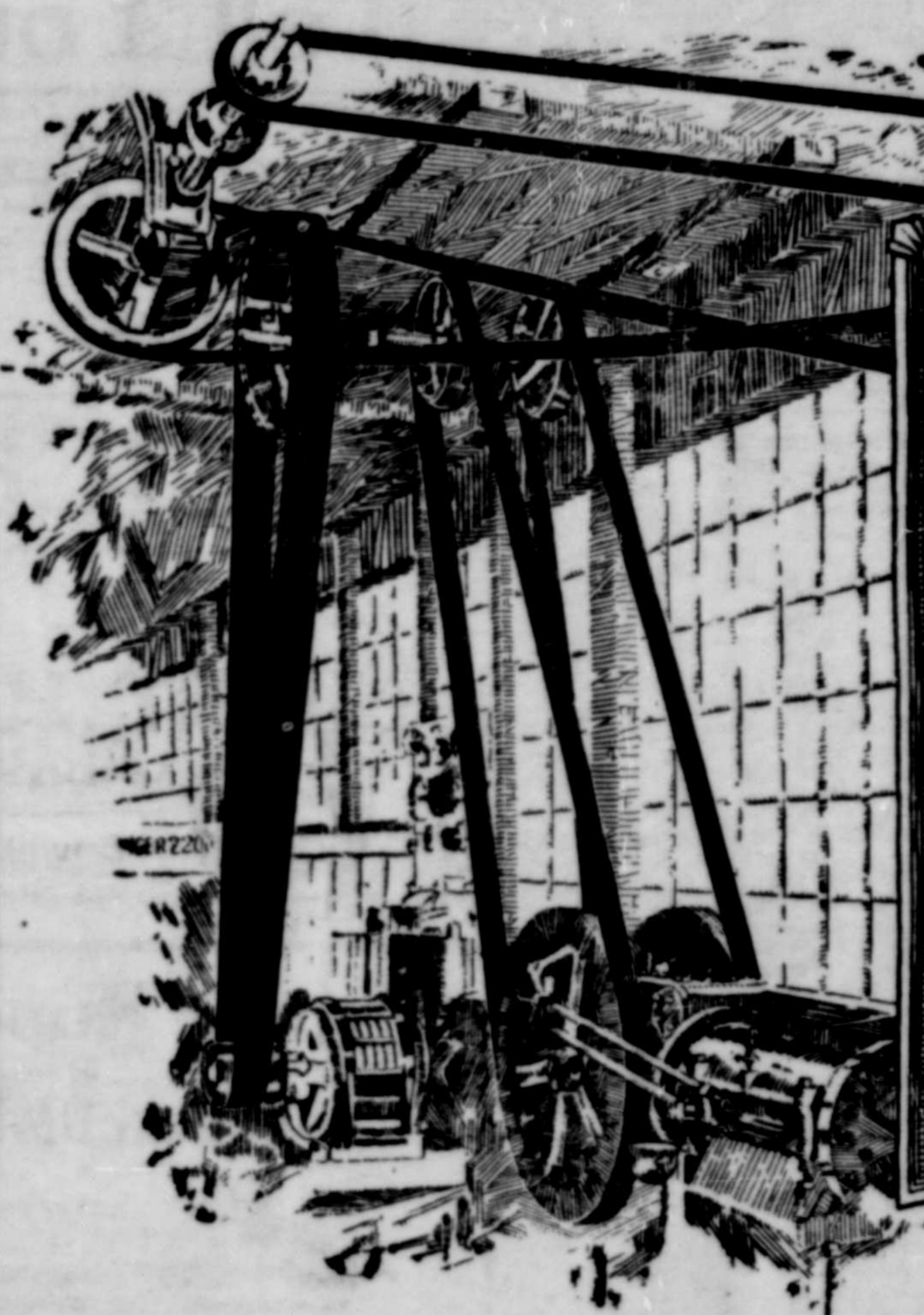

mayor says he took the stand against the cancellation because it looked like discrimination against Zarelli, the fact is, it appears to me, that the B. C. Social Club and not Zarelli was discriminated against, and that Zarelli received protection all the way through and might have been receiving protection today had not an efficient police officer raided the 'submarine,' as the mayor says: 'off his own bat.' I would qualify this by pointing out that on January 9th last Fotos of the B. C. Social Club was fined \$100 with an alternative of six months' imprisonment for 'being the keeper of a common gaming house,' after which conviction the Police Commission and Council moved heaven and earth to get the license cancelled, even to the extent of making the matter of cancellation one errand in the list on the mayor's visit to Victoria and the license was duly cancelled.

No Recommendation.

On April 4th Zarelli was fined \$100 with an alternative of six months' imprisonment for 'being the keeper of a common gaming house.' In addition no less than 31 men were arrested and fined \$5 each who were found by the police at the police at the same time and place. Yet no recom-

mendation appears to have been made to the Council to have this license cancelled, and no action is taken by the mayor except to make it appear that Zarelli and not Fotos was discriminated against. If there was any discrimination it appears to have been against Fotos.

"It also seems that if, as the Mayor says, one house was fined for playing 'blackjack' and the other for having played the game of poker, was immune from responsibility to the gambling law, there is an issue between the opinion of the commission and the finding of the magistrate who made the penalty the same in both cases. Both looked alike to the magistrate. The magistrate's decision was not appealed from, and it is a wonder to me the Commission did not appeal in Zarelli's behalf since it feels so strongly that he was discriminated against.

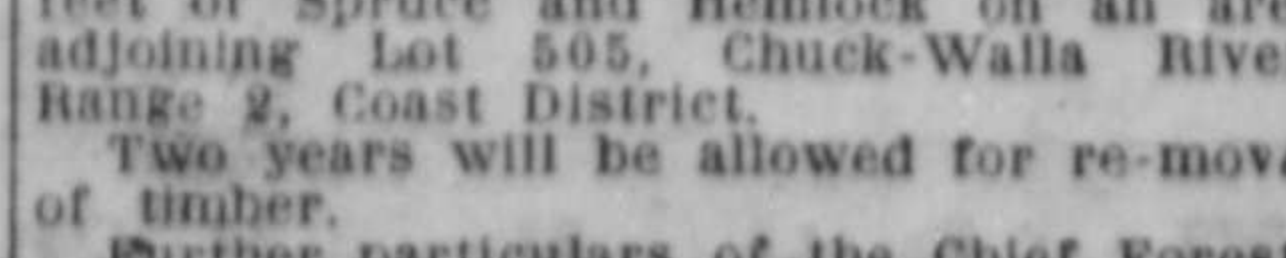
