# Dominion is to Give a Million Dollars to Construct New Highway

North and South to be Connected by Road From Golden to Mount Robson With Federal Aid

rICTORIA, March 29 .- Construction of an automobile highway up the big bend of the Columbia River from Golden to Mount British Columbia to Aiberta and open up the vast mineral and timber areas, will be undertaken by the British Columbia government in co-operation with the Federal government. Announcement to this effect was made by the Times here last evening.

The paper says it has learned that this scheme is part of a federal government program which is expected to include the taking over of Mount Robson and Mount Assiniboine Parks from the province.

Ottawa proposes to spend nearly a million dollars in assisting the province to construct the highway, the Times says.







Morrison Tells of Early Days in Nova Scotia and of Ancient Customs

Is the last day for filing returns of Income earned during the calendar year 1927.

Returns are required to be filed with the Provincial Assessor, Prince Rupert, B.C., from whom the necessary forms and full information may be obtained.

Those required to make returns are as follows:-

- 1. Every corporation or joint stock company (use Form No. 7).
- 2. Every partnership, and every person engaged in business of any kind, or practicing any profession (use Form No. 7B).
- 3. Every other person in receipt of income from salary, wages, commission, fees, bonus, perquisites, interest, dividends, rent, or other income from any sourse whatsoever, in excess of

(a) In the case of a married person, \$1800. (b) In the case of a single person, \$1200. (use Form No. 7A)

Individuals whose total income from all sources is less than the amount specified need not file a return unless requested by the Assessor to do so.

In the case of Provincial returns the amount of the tax is not payable until 60 days after the date upon which the Assessor mails a notice of assessment.

The public are earnestly requested to obtain the necessary forms and file returns promptly in order to avoid penalties. Assistance in the making up of returns will be gladly rendered
