## Mining Magnates Here tell of Stewart and Alice Arm Dolly Varden to Ship Soon

**Sir Donald Mann says Stewart will be a Rich and Permanent  
Camp; Big Missouri too Good to Talk About; A.J.  
Taylor Discusses Plans on Dolly Varden.**

Several groups of mining men passed through here last night on the Prince Rupert after visiting the mines at Alice Arm and Stewart, and all were enthusiastic over the prospects for those districts.

Sir Donald Mann, head of the concern that has the bond on the Big Missouri group of claims, has just been up and examined that mine and says that he would not like to tell what he saw. Without further development it would not be wise to talk about it. He was well pleased, however, he said, and he will be back again before long. In the meantime he is sending in another expert from the east. Mr. Evans who is now in charge of the development work is a mining engineer of long experience and is doing excellent work with the small gang of twelve men employed. What they need is a road to enable them and others in the neighborhood to get their material in and their ore out.

Sir Donald said that the Stewart camp was destined to be a rich one, just how rich they could not yet say, as only one mine had been actually proved. The prospects of a number of others were, however, wonderfully good. He looked to see a great camp there, and a permanent one. The development of this and the other camps of the north naturally meant a great deal to Prince Rupert as this was the base of operations.

### The Dolly Varden.

A. J. Taylor and the other directors of the Dolly Varden mine and railway have been examining the Dolly Varden and Wolfe mines and they are extremely optimistic over the prospects. The Dolly Varden is a real mine, not a prospect, differing in this respect from the Big Missouri. An immense lot of development work has already been done and they expect to commence shipping about August.

Mr. Taylor said that there was yet a mile of railway to build and the aerial tramway to be completed, but that would be all ready by the end of the month. Two weeks later they would be shipping ore, and they expected to keep it up as long as the weather would allow. Next year they would build the railway on to the Wolfe mine.

All the directors of the Dolly Varden were up on the trip but R. P. Butchart and one or two others returned on the Prince George, all well pleased with their visit and especially struck with the wonderful scenery of the district.

J. S. Cowper, M. L. A., who was in the party, said that the prosperity of the district depended on the Dolly Varden Railway which would be in operation directly. There were something like thirty groups of claims that were tributary to it and on some of them a lot of development work had been done and they would be shipping directly.

### Premier.

The superintendent of the Bush mine also went south last night and he is pleased with the results that have been obtained on his mine so far.

## FEED SCARCITY IN MUCH OF ALBERTA

## AUSTRALIAN GOVERNMENT FIXES PRICE

**Controls Wages Paid to Miners  
and Rates at Which Output  
is Sold.**

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Melbourne, July 14.—Regulations have been passed under the War Precautions Act putting under the control of the Prime Minister the entire coal output of the Australian commonwealth, a measure empowering the Australian Federal Government to fix wages, and conditions of employment in mines and establish the price of coal.

Acting Prime Minister Watt, in announcing the new regulations, pointed out that the step was taken in order to avoid a strike of the miners in New South Wales, through which the output of that state would have been stopped and many industries of the commonwealth paralyzed.

A number of the directors of the Dolly Varden Mines were on board the Prince Rupert on the way south last evening, having returned from a visit of inspection to their properties. Included in the party were A. J. T. Taylor, president of the company; C. M. Rolson, of the Imperial Oil Co.; Hall C. Chien, chartered accountant, and J. S. Cowper, M. P. P.

## TURKISH MINISTERS ARE CONDEMNED TO DEATH BY MILITARY COURT MARTIAL

Constantinople, July 14.—Enver Pasha, Talaat Bay and Djemal Pasha, leaders of the Turkish Government during the war, were condemned to death today by a Turkish court martial which has been investigating the conduct of the Turkish Government during the war period.

Enver and two leading associates in the Young Turkish Government fled from Turkey several months ago and their whereabouts is unknown. Djemal Bay, former minister of finance, Alaha Metssa Kiazim, and former Speaker Ulislam were sentenced to fifteen years hard labor.

The court martial acquitted Rifaat Bey, former president, and sentenced Hamis Bey, the former Minister of Posts and Telegraphs.

## MAMMOTH DIRIGIBLE GETS HOME FROM NEW YORK IN ABOUT SEVENTY-FIVE HOURS

**LANDS AT PULHAM, NORFOLK, EARLY SUNDAY MORNING  
AFTER EVENTLESS VOYAGE—FOUR HUNDRED  
MEN AIDED IN LANDING MAMMOTH AIR-  
SHIP ON HER ARRIVAL**

Pulham, Norfolk, England, July 14.—Great Britain's mommoth dirigible R-34 arrived at the air station here at 6:56 a. m. Sunday, Greenwich time, completing the return trip from the British Isles to the United States and return.

The R-34 poked her nose out of the clouds to the northeast of this village and after circling the flying field several times glided gently to the ground and ten minutes later was housed in the dirigible shed.

The voyage from Long Island was without particular interest and was completed in approximately 75 hours. Soon after day-break 400 men stationed at the airdrome were roused from sleep to prepare for the landing of the big dirigible, and were in readiness to snugg her to anchor while the wireless operators prepared to pick up messages. The sun rose bright, but soon afterwards was obscured by clouds. There was no wind and those on watch were confident that the dirigible would arrive on time.

There was a shout from those who greeted the first sight of the long great body on the horizon. As the R-34 approached the field she dropped from a height of 5,000 feet to 2,000 feet. The men who were to aid the airship in landing were ordered to their positions and waited silently as the ship circled the field, dropping lower and lower.

## FEELING OF DESPAIR AT CONSTANTINOPLE

## SIR EDWARD CARSON GIVES DIRECT TALK TO STATES ON INTERFERENCE IN IRELAND

**TELLS AMERICA TO MIND HER OWN BUSINESS; CHARGES  
THAT COUNTRY WITH TRYING TO  
STIR UP STRIFE**

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Belfast, Ireland, July 14.—The Twelfth of July celebrations were carried out Saturday on a large scale. Sir Edward Carson speaking at the Orange demonstration at Holywood, Belfast, said:

"There is a campaign going on in America at the present moment, fostered by the Catholic Church, which will soon be joined by the Germans and their funds, in order to create a great anti-British feeling. I want to see a good feeling between America and this country as I believe the future of the whole world depends upon the relationships existing between the United States and ourselves, but I am not going to submit to this kind of a campaign, whether for friendship or any other purpose."

"I seriously say to America today, 'You attend to your own affairs, we will attend to ours; you look after your own questions at home, we will look after ours. We will brook no interference in our own affairs by any country however powerful. It is not for that we waged the great war of independence which has just been concluded.'"

"What right had an American mission to come to this country, to come here in breach of the hospitality of one nation towards another, to attempt to stir up strife in which they were not connected."

## Fish Industry Of the Port.

"We may live without luxuries, most of us have to these days, but food is an item without which we may not exist," said the American Consul at the Board of Trade luncheon recently. No form of food is more sustaining and attractive in the main than good fish. And in all this wide world there is probably no more prolific fishing ground than this section of the Pacific Ocean. Do you appreciate its importance? Do you realize the consideration this interest deserves, I wonder?

"Now of course it is understood that you are not at liberty to criticise my views as to the best means of putting this city on the map permanently, and I am using my best efforts so that if I fail it is my misfortune but not my fault. Get me?"

"In the month of May nearly one hundred carloads of fresh fish were shipped from this port to eastern points. That is a very big item of trade. No trivial details should be permitted to hamper the development of this trade to its fullest extent."

## Shipping Prospects For Prince Rupert.

"Until a line of shipping is established there can be no real development as a port of magnitude. During the war there was such a dearth of vessels that little or no consideration could be given ordinary commerce. The needs of the armies of the Allies and the necessity of supplying food to their civilian population was the first consideration. Now, however, things are rapidly changing, ships are being returned to their usual line of commerce and new ships being constructed for the world's requirements. Let us venture to hope that this port will receive the attention which its strategic position seems to warrant. Gentlemen who should be in a position to know have stated that cargoes could be found if the ships were available. It is the duty of Prince Rupert citizens to keep harping on the one string until the ships are secured."

## Lost Marketing Of much Halibut.

Prince Rupert lost the marketing of at least three million pounds of halibut as a result of the strike. Much of the money received for that catch would have been spent here under normal circumstances. As it was, scarcely any of it came here. It went to Ketchikan, Seattle and Vancouver, while some of it was never realized because the fishing boats tied up. That is one of the penalties of the present method of dealing with labor disputes.

The fishpackers at Vancouver remained at work throughout and at Victoria none but the longshoremen were out more than a few days. The men there suffered little loss. Here many have been set back more than a year and even then will not have recovered the lost ground.

## SMOKER FOR RETURNED MEN

Interesting Program of Speech and Song at Central Hotel Saturday Night.

The smoking concert for returned men held in the Central Hotel on Saturday night was a happy reunion of veterans who, among them, have shared in all the strenuous fighting from the second battle of Ypres to the glorious finish at Mons. The speeches were short and appropriate, full of high purpose and tone. The program of songs and recitations was an excellent one, and the singing of the male voice quartette and the selections by the Westholme orchestra were particularly enjoyable features of the evening. Piper Alex. MacDonald made glad the hearts of the Scotsmen present with several stirring strains on the bagpipes. The liberal catering by Mr. and Mrs. Black was particularly appreciated by the boys. Tom Silversides presided whilst Vaughan Davies officiated at the piano.

### The Program.

Among the contributors to the program were Messrs. Rosa, Dennis, Parkley, Clapperton and Tom Black and the male quartette composed of Clapperton, Lancaster, Waddell and Davies. Short addresses were made by Canon Rix, Judge Young and Mr. Williams of the Soldiers Settlement Board.

In opening the proceedings the president outlined the work of the G. W. V. A. and called upon the support of all returned men.

### Canon Rix.

Canon Rix in his speech, with customary eloquence, called upon the government to do full justice to the claims of the widows, orphans and disabled men, pointing out the inadequacy of \$40 per month to the former and desiring \$100 per month as a minimum. Speaking in regard to the \$2,000 grant proposed, the Canon said it was far less than the pecuniary total of \$4,800 in four years. Some of the boys went to fight because they had red blood in their veins, but the majority went with the specific purpose of making the world a better place to live in. The speaker pointed out the power of the returned soldiers and called upon them to maintain the same spirit of comradeship and high ideals in their civilian capacity. He claimed the attitude of the veterans had in great measure saved Canada from anarchy.

### For Canadian Club.

Judge Young, as president of the Canadian Club, outlined the objects of the club and claimed that the interests and aims were identical with those of the G. W. V. A. and that united were a strong factor in the making of Canada. He paid tribute to the civilians, especially to the work of the women.

The event on Saturday night was the first of its kind since the return of most of the men and its success will probably bring others.

## SMITHERS IS TO HAVE FALL FAIR

A fall fair is scheduled to be held in Smithers on September 30, the first at that point and it is proposed to make it a real hum-dinger, according to the residents of that Bulkley Valley centre.

The fair is to be a general gala day and the people from all the country round, including some from Prince Rupert, are expected to be in attendance for the occasion.

## GUN-A-NOOT WAS COMMITTED FOR TRIAL

Simon Gun-a-Noot, the Indian who recently gave himself up at Hazelton and who is charged with murder, has been committed for trial and will remain in custody until the case comes before a higher court.

## MARINE FIREMEN TIE UP NEW YORK SHIPS

New York, July 14.—More than 200 coastwise vessels were reported tied up in New York last night as a result of a strike of marine firemen, water tenders and oil-men.

## Sport

There are considerable numbers of salmon in the harbor just now and at Shagwats several have been caught at the foot of the falls.

In the long summer evenings "putting the shot" ought to be a favorite pastime with the men of the city. There is not much space required and it is not necessary to climb all the way up to the Acropolis Hill in order to have a little exercise. A pitch can be fixed up in anyone's back yard.

Should weather conditions prove favorable there will be a baseball match tonight between the "Hungry Nine" and the Colts. The former team is made up from several of the other teams which have broken up since the close of the school term.

In the early days the men who were fond of target practise could go across the bay to the butts to have their sport. Those days are gone and many of the young fellows who were good shots at McNicholl Creek were made snipers in the Great War and have had to pay the extreme penalty. However, the boys who have returned and the men who had to stay at home would all be glad to have the butts opened up again in order to prove their skill as marksmen.

It is likely that a gun club will soon be formed in the city which can look into the matter of rifle ranges and will also try to foster trap shooting as there are lots of places on the island where traps might be set up.

THE Government has developed a liberal and broad plan to help soldiers settle on farms. It is securing land. It is granting substantial loans. It is obtaining advantageous prices on equipment, implements, building materials and live stock. It is providing agricultural training and farming supervision.

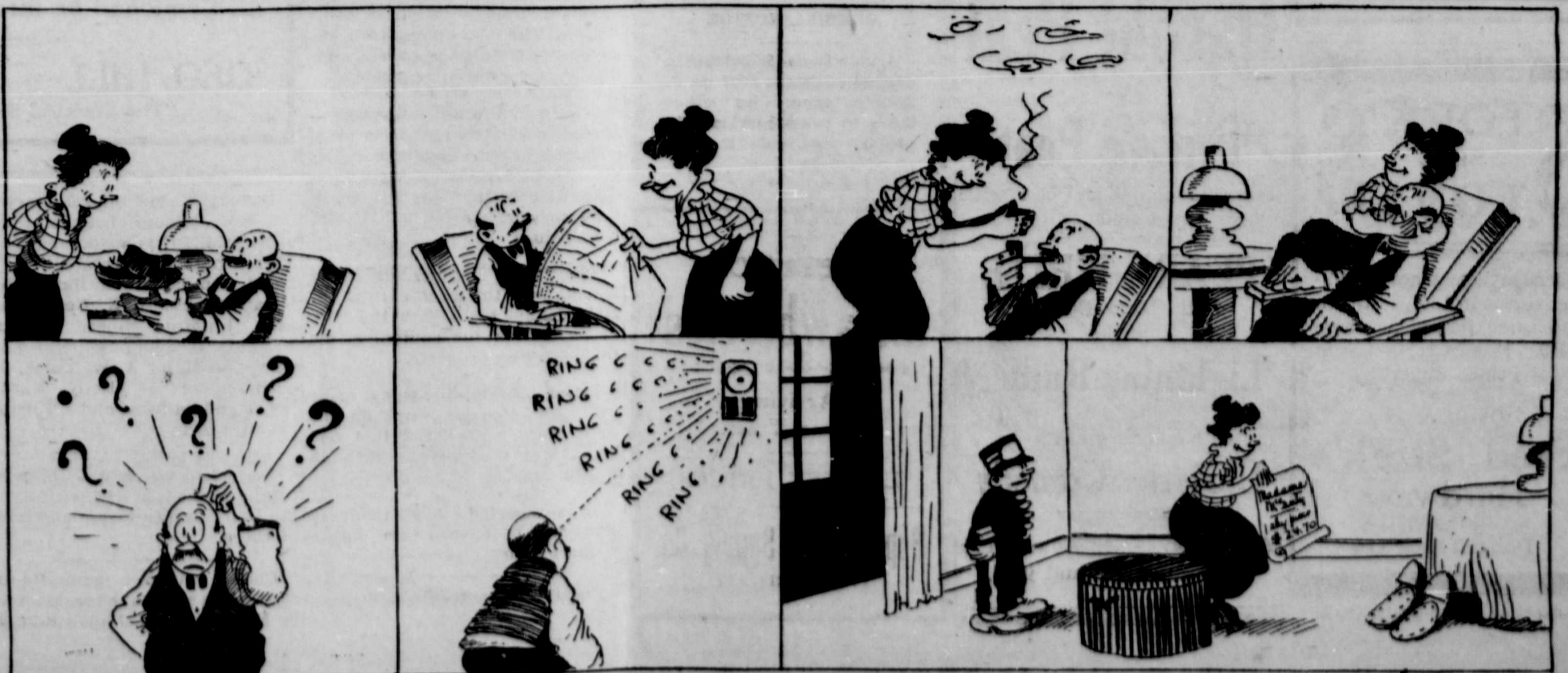
