Graf Zeppelin Airship Lands at Friedrichshaven Breaking Previous Records for Crossing the Atlantic

FRIEDRICHSAFEN, Nov. 1 .- Completing the first round trip of a commercial transatlantic flight, the Graf. Zeppelin landed at the aerodrome here at 7.06 this morning with passengers and mail from the United States.

The airship made the fastest crossing of the Atlantic by a lighter than air machine covering a distance of four thousand miles and reaching the home port 68 hours 56 minutes after leaving Lakehurst and touched ground after 71 hours 20 minutes had elapsed.

The British dirigible 34 which made the fastest previous crossing in the air 75 hours in a flight from Roosevelt Field, N.Y. to England in July 1919.


