The 200-inch reflector, as large as the floor of a good-sized room, will have four times the power of the 100-inch. For example, the canals 9:30-Moon Magic, KHQ, KGO, J. Campbell, 200; W. "What we hope to learn with the new telescope," the announcement says, "it should render possible the exploration of many 'island universes' beyond the milky way, the nearest two or three of which are now but slightly knows. It should tell us something about these spiral nebulae. millions of light-years distant, and much about the development of the stars of our own Galactic system, one of which is the sun with its encircling planets. It should solve many of the problems of physics of chemistry that depend upon the enormous mass or temperatures, or upon the immense density or extreme tenuity, exhibited by celestial bodies in which titanic experiments exceeding the capacity of any terrestrial laboratory are constantly in progress. Incidentally it should reveal hundreds of millions of stars and hundreds of thousands of nebulae beyond the range of existing tel-

The present most remote seen nebula is estimated to be at a distance of 100 million light years, a light year being the distance light travels in one year. There are fifty thousand of these nebuae now known. Among the itanic experiments," new light s expected upon Millikan's discovery of rays from space which he identifies as probably from the creation of the elements of which this world and other celestial bodies are made.

A possible axiliary, the announcement says, is a 40-foot Michelson stellar interferometer mounted on the telescope. This instrument measures the diameters of stars. Existing telescopes have just been large enough to permit measurement of a few star diameters, and doubling the capacity via the new instrument opens a field of spectacular pos-







MOST POWERFUL LOCOMOTIVE IN WORLD



The photographs show two views of the new 2,260 H.P., oil-electric locomotive designed by motive power engineers of the Canadian National Railways and now placed in service. The locomotive weighs 650,000 pounds and is designed to operate fast passenger and freight service where speed and power are required. Simplicity of operation and economy are features of this new monarch of the rails which marks such an evolution in the history of transportation that engineers believe it will prove to be the successor of the steam locomotive. It is capable of carrying longer trains for greater distances with less refueling than any type of locomotive now in use. The power developed by the oil engine is converted into electrical energy by the generator and then transmitted to the traction motors geared to the driving axles.
