Australia Wins Single Sculls Olympiad Today

United States wins and Cambridge University Takes Four Oared Without Coxswain from U. S.—Other Races.

AMSTERDAM, Aug. 10.—Bob Pearce, the Australian rower, won the single sculls Olympic championship today, defeating Kenneth Myers of Philadelphia by five lengths. Joe Wright and Jack Guest of Canada were defeated by the United States in the finals for doubles. The winning pair was Paul Costello and Charles McIlwaine. The time was 6.41 2-5 seconds for the winners and 6.51 seconds for the Canadians.

VILLAGERS ARE WIPED OUT ON FLORES COAST

BATAVIA, Aug. 10.—Three more villages on the coast of Flores Island were devastated as a result of the eruption of Rokindani volcano which yesterday caused the deaths of upwards of a thousand persons. The villages were swept by a tidal wave following a series of submarine earthquakes. Ten persons were reported killed and a number injured. The volcano is still belching smoke.

SHIPS LIQUOR TO DISTILLERS

CARGO OF CHRIS MOELLER BEING LOADED ON MOLDIVA FOR GLASGOW

VICTORIA, Aug. 10.—Five thousand cases of Scotch whiskey is being loaded on the steamer Moldiva here for the distillers in Glasgow.

The liquor was seized by customs officials here late in 1926 when the vessel Chris Moeller was about to sail for Mexico.

STRUCK ON JAW WOMAN DIES

SEATTLE, Aug. 10.—Struck in the jaw by an autoist who was angered apparently because she bumped her machine into his, Mrs. D. H. Brown of Tukwila died early this morning. Her unidentified assailant fled in a car just ahead of the city-wide alarm ordering the police to search for him.

B. C. CLINCHED CRICKET CHAMP

WINNIPEG, Aug. 10.—British Columbia held off Manitoba in the Western Canada cricket tournament by defeating Manitoba 184 to 120, thus virtually clinching the championship for another year.

Alberta defeated Saskatchewan 164 to 120.

LADYSMITH MAN HURT

VICTORIA, Aug. 10.—Robert Cruchy of Ladysmith was seriously injured when a truck he was driving was struck by a freight train at a grade crossing south of Chemainus. The truck was wrecked.

WHEAT POOL MAKING IMPROVEMENTS HERE TO ELEVATOR PLANT

The Alberta Wheat Pool is making considerable improvements at the Prince Rupert elevator this summer with a view to speeding up the handling capacity of the plant before the opening of the next shipping season. The most important work is the installation of three new disk separators which is now under way. The plant already has three of these machines and the additional ones will just double its separating capacity. G. H. Mitchell of Winnipeg arrived in the city on the Cardena today to supervise the installation of the machines.

MATRIC CLASS MAY BE FORMED

TWO MORE STUDENTS REQUIRED TO PLEDGE PAYMENTS BEFORE TEACHER APPOINTED

IMPERIAL STATUS IS ACCEPTED BY THE TRANSVAAL CONGRESS

PRETORIA, Aug. 10.—After a sharp debate the Transvaal Nationalist Congress, at the request of the federal council of the party, passed an amendment to Article 4, the so-called republican clause, accepting the status laid down at the 1926 imperial conference. The amendment was moved by Premier Hertzog, head of the Nationalist party.

PREPARING FOR CABINET CHANGE

TOILME STILL TIGHT AS CLAM AS TO WHO WILL BE IN NEW GOVERNMENT

VICTORIA, Aug. 10.—There is no change in the political situation here. The Liberal ministers are clearing up the detail of work which got somewhat out of hand during their absence for the elections and will be prepared to vacate next week.

Dr. Toimie is tight as a clam over his cabinet and people have aimed to elucidate as to who are to be given places in it. It is not expected the Premier will issue any statement of policy until the opening of the Legislature and even then it will be somewhat brief.

INSPECTION OF CHILDREN

QUESTION OF APPOINTING MEDICAL MAN FOR SCHOOLS WAS DISCUSSED LAST NIGHT

The suggestion was made last night at the schoolboard meeting by Chairman Rochester that if no medical officer would undertake the inspection of the school pupils they should employ a school nurse. He said he had one in mind whom he thought would act and she would be just as good as a medical man. A good nurse was better than a doctor anyway for that purpose.

Trustee Gilchrist thought the children were entitled to the services of a medical man. A nurse could not diagnose a case like a doctor. S. D. Johnston said he thought the doctors wanted the work on a better basis. There never had been a proper detailed examination as required by the department.

It was finally decided to wait until the arrival of Dr. Carson, who was taking over Dr. Egger's practice. He might be willing to act and in the meantime Trustee Gilchrist said he would get in touch with the local doctors and find out why none of them applied for the position.

HUGGINS SECURES FRED HEIMACH AND WINS GAME YESTERDAY

NEW YORK, Aug. 10.—Purchased from St. Paul of the American Association to bolster Huggins' tottering pitching staff Fred Heimach, formerly with the Philadelphia Athletics and Boston Red Sox, pitched the champion to a four hit seven to one victory over the Red Sox yesterday in the first start of a comeback trial.

Philadelphia lost no ground, beating Washington. In the National, St. Louis lost a little more of their advantage over the Giants by losing to Pittsburgh. It was the Pirates' eighth victory in a row and their 24th in the last 31 games.

REDUCTION IN FISH TRAPS

FEWER TO BE USED NEXT YEAR IN ALASKA REPORTS FISHERIES COMMISSIONER

KETCHIKAN, Aug. 10.—A further reduction in the number of fish traps in Alaskan waters will be necessary in the immediate future, Henry O'Malley, U. S. Commissioner of Fisheries, states.

Mr. O'Malley is here returning from a trip to the westward. In southeastern Alaska, the commissioner said, conditions on the whole were favorable.

Mr. O'Malley also reported that more than 30,000 seal skins had been taken on the Pribilof Islands and Secretary of Agriculture Jardine is expected to arrive here today.

PLANE CRASHES TWENTY KILLED

SIGHT SEEING AMPHIBIAN DROPS AT GRAVENHURST, ONTARIO, FATAL RESULTS

GRAVENHURST, Ont., Aug. 10.—When the amphibian plane used for sightseeing purposes in the Muskoka district crashed from a height of 80 feet Thursday, Captain Charles Haines, pilot of Miami, Florida and Robert Irving and eighteen passengers from Pittsburgh were killed and five other passengers injured.

HICKMAN TO HANG OCTOBER EIGHTEENTH

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 10.—William E. Hickman, murderer of the little girl Marion Parker was yesterday sentenced to hang on October 19, all appeals in his behalf having failed.

BACTERIA AND DAIRY INDUSTRY

PROFESSOR SADLER DISCUSSES LATEST APPLICATION OF SCIENCE TO BUTTER AND CHEESE MAKING

The application of Bacteria to the Dairy Industry was the subject of a most interesting address by Professor Wilfrid Sadler of the University of B.C. at the weekly luncheon of the Rotary Club in which the speaker elaborated the outline given by Professor Harrison the previous week, applying the science particularly to the producing of flavors in butter and cheese.

The speaker referred to the wonderful work done in Denmark by Emil Hansen in connection with yeast culture and the efforts of other scientists to apply the principles worked out in the brewing industry to the making of butter and cheese. It had been definitely ascertained that the work of micro-organisms have the special flavors to different kinds of cheese and this had been particularly applied in the making of a special brand of Swiss cheese in Denmark. In Butter the Danes had also applied the principles so as to produce a butter which had captured the British market.

In the manufacture of the special Swiss cheese it had been found that the culture would develop when used in connection with yeast. The yeast required air in its development and the other cultures required very little so they prospered well together. The culture had to die in order to flavor the live mixed cultures.

Professor Sadler spoke of the interdependence of the laboratory and industry, stating that each was necessary to the other for the best results. What they were working for now in the butter and cheese industry was quality and uniformity so that the industry could produce every time exactly the flavor that the public demanded.

BUCHANAN BOYS PAY VISIT HERE EN ROUTE NORTH THIS MORNING

George E. Buchanan, Detroit philanthropist, and party of fifty boys, making a tour to Alaska with his financial assistance, passed through the city on the Princess Charlotte this morning bound north. They will spend a week in the Atlin district before returning south at the end of next week.

After visiting a number of the more important cities on the way west, the boys spent Wednesday in Vancouver "doing" that city and that night two of them delivered brief talks over the radio from the Georgia Hotel broadcasting station. After leaving here for the cruise along the Alaska coast to Skagway, the boys will visit White Horse, Atlin and the Muir Glacier and will be returning south a week from this Saturday afternoon aboard the steamer Princess Louise.

Besides the education and experience of the trip, Mr. Buchanan also offers two gold medals—one for the boy who has conducted himself best on the trip and another for the boy who has been most helpful to the rest of the party. The disposition of these medals is decided by vote of the boys themselves. The Canadian Pacific Railway also gives a gold medal to the boy who writes the best essay on the trip. The total cost of the trip from Detroit this year is \$125 of which the boys must earn one-third while his parents puts up one-third and Mr. Buchanan provides the other third also taking care of addition expenses.

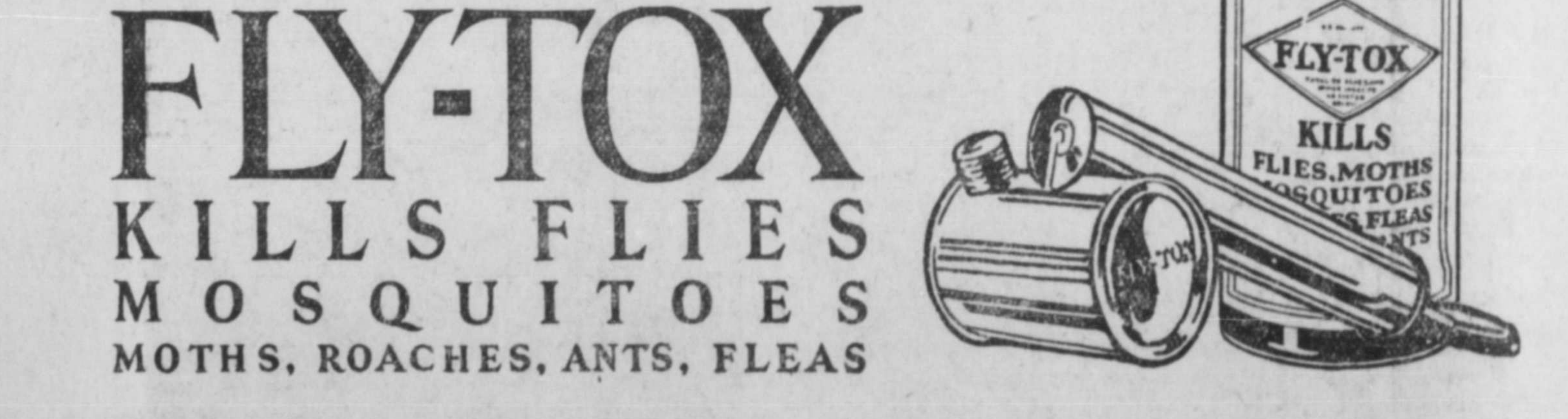
